Enactment of this legislation could increase fine and fee revenue to: (1) the General Fund by about \$3,900 in FY 2021 and \$31,500 ongoing beginning in FY 2022; and to (2) the Court Security Account by about \$500 in FY 2021 and \$3,600 ongoing beginning in FY 2022; and (3) dedicated credits of approximately \$100,000 ongoing beginning in FY 2023 to the Department of Public Safety.

Enactment of this legislation could cost the Department of Public Safety the following amounts to implement and operate the 24-7 sobriety program: (1) \$157,300 one-time in FY 2022 and \$57,300 ongoing beginning in FY 2023 from federal funds; (2) \$100,000 ongoing beginning in FY 2023 from dedicated credits; (3) \$28,100 one-time in FY 2021 from the TFR - Public Safety Account; and (4) \$7,500 one-time in FY 2020 and \$214,500 one-time in FY 2021 from the General Fund. Lastly, Enactment of this bill could cost (5) the Courts about \$2,300 one-time in FY 2021 and \$18,100 ongoing beginning in FY 2022 from the General Fund due to increased case processing.

Local Government

Enactment of this bill could increase cases in justice courts by approximately 93 annually; this could increase revenue to local governments by approximately \$25,000 in aggregate for fines and fees, and could also cost justice courts an unknown amount in court processing costs.

Individuals & Businesses

To the extent that individuals violate provisions of this bill, it could cost certain offenders up to \$680 per case; with an estimated aggregate impact of approximately \$60,100 per year. This bill could cost individuals an additional total of approximately \$100,000 ongoing beginning in FY 2023 to participate in the 24-7 sobriety program.

Regulatory Impact

Enactment of this legislation could result in a small increase in the regulatory burden for Utah residents or businesses.

Notes on Notes

They do not measure a bill's benefits or non-fiscal impacts like opportunity costs, wait times, or inconvenience. A fiscal note is not an appropriation. The Legislature decides appropriations separately.
