Enactment of this bill could cost Department of Public Safety \$40,000 one-time and \$5,000 ongoing from the General Fund beginning in FY 2022 to develop and provide online training for domestic violence for law enforcement officers statewide. In addition, beginning in FY 2022, this could cost the Commission on Criminal and Juvenile Justice Services (CCJJ) \$62,000 ongoing from the General Fund for data collection, analysis, and reporting of which they report that they can absorb up to about \$12,000. Implementing the bill could also cost CCJJ \$15,000 one-time in FY 2022 from the General Fund to create a data collection instrument.
