Enactment of this legislation likely will not result in direct, measurable costs for local governments.

Individuals & Businesses

Individuals who intentionally violate the section of this bill regarding lobbying as a foreign agent could face an administrative penalty of up to \$1,000 for each violation and up to \$5,000 for each subsequent violation within 24 months.

Regulatory Impact

Enactment of this legislation could result in a small increase in the regulatory burden for Utah residents or businesses.

Notes on Notes
