Enactment of this legislation could increase revenue to Courts in the following amounts: \$383,300 in ongoing General Fund revenue beginning in FY 2023 and \$14,600 in ongoing revenue to the Court Security Account beginning in FY 2023 due to the transition of approximately 1,480 cases from justice courts to district courts.

Enactment of this legislation could cost Courts approximately \$104,800 one-time in FY 2022 and \$629,000 ongoing beginning in FY 2023 for increased case processing costs due to the transition of approximately 1,480 cases from justice courts to district courts.

Local Government UCA 36-12-13(2)(c)

Enactment of this legislation could decrease local government revenue by approximately \$398,400 ongoing beginning in FY 2023 due to the transition of approximately 1,480 cases from justice courts to district courts.

Individuals & Businesses

UCA 36-12-13(2)(c)

To the extent that individuals violate provisions of this bill, this could cost certain offenders approximately \$820 in additional fines per case; the aggregate amount is unknown.

Regulatory Impact UCA 36-12-13(2)(d)

Enactment of this legislation likely will not change the regulatory burden for Utah residents or businesses.

Performance Evaluation

JR1-4-601

This bill does not create a new program or significantly expand an existing program.

Notes on Notes
