Enactment of this legislation could cost the Legislature \$75,000 ongoing from the General Fund beginning in FY 2023 to contract with a third party to monitor federal law for possible implications on the principles of federalism. Enactment could also cost the Office of Legislative Research and General Counsel \$10,800 ongoing from the General Fund for additional staff time to support the increased duties of the Federalism Commission; this cost can be absorbed.
