Enactment of this legislation could cost General Fund \$800 one-time in fiscal year 2022 and \$1,600 ongoing beginning in fiscal year 2023 for per diem costs related to members of the Legislature serving on the Cybersecurity Commission. Enactment of this legislation could cost General Fund \$150,000 one-time in fiscal year 2022 and up to \$450,000 beginning in fiscal year 2023 for the Department of Public Safety to provide staff and support to the Cybersecurity Commission.
