Enactment of this legislation could reduce costs for the School Activity Eligibility Commission established in House Bill 11, 2022 General Session, by \$4,400 ongoing beginning in FY 2023. To the extent that a person is sued in court for enforcing Utah Code Annotated Title 53G, Chapter 6, Part 11, and to the extent that the person is defended and indemnified by the state, enactment of this legislation could cost the Attorney General and the State Risk Management Fund unknown amounts for legal defense costs, court costs, plaintiff attorney fees, and settlements or damages. Certain of those costs, should they be incurred, can be paid from the Budgetary Reserve Account. Enactment of this legislation appropriates \$500,000 one-time from the General Fund to the Attorney General in FY 2023.
