Enactment of this legislation could increase dedicated credits revenue for the Department of Public Safety \$200,000 ongoing beginning in FY 2024 with a one time reduction in FY 2024 of \$100,000 as a result of fees charged to individuals paying to use the new traffic school program.

Enactment of this legislation could cost Courts \$70,500 one time from the Justice Court Technology, Security and Training Restricted Account in FY 2024 to develop a system to receive notification of traffic school completion, implement processes to verify if an individual is eligible to have their case dismissed, and modify processes to dismiss cases based on the new criteria for deferred prosecution. Enactment of this legislation could also cost the Department of Public Safety \$200,000 ongoing dedicated credits revenue beginning in FY 2024 to develop and manage the online traffic school program with a one time reduction of \$100,000 in FY 2024 to account for the system not coming online until partially through the fiscal year.

Local Government

UCA 36-12-13(2)(c)

Enactment of this legislation could lead to an average cost reduction of \$350 a case for county and municipal prosecutors when the defendant chooses to use traffic school to defer prosecution. As the exact number of cases that will utilize this new process is unknown, the total savings cannot be determined.

Individuals & Businesses

UCA 36-12-13(2)(d)

Enactment of this legislation could cost individuals who choose to participate in the new traffic school. As the fee has not yet been determined, the actual amount to an individual is unknown but could total \$100,000 in FY 2024 and \$200,000 ongoing beginning in FY 2025 with fees set accordingly to reach that amount.

Regulatory Impact

Enactment of this legislation likely will not change the regulatory burden for Utah residents or businesses.

Performance Evaluation

JR1-4-601

This bill does not create a new program or significantly expand an existing program.

Notes on Notes
