Enactment of this legislation could cost the Lt. Governor's Office \$3,000 one-time from the General Fund in FY 2024 to research, write, solicit public input, and finalize state rules establishing standards and specifications. The agency indicates they can absorb this cost. State agencies could incur costs to purchase new state flags at approximately \$20 per flag. The aggregate cost for ordering new flags is unknown.
