Enactment of this legislation could increase revenue to the General Fund revenue by \$5,000 ongoing beginning in FY 2025 due to new fines in this bill. This combined with the expenses listed below could also decrease the annual transfer to the General Fund from the Commerce Service Account by \$1,800 one-time in FY 2025 and \$14,300 ongoing beginning in FY 2025 as a result of the expenditures below.

Enactment of this legislation could cost the Department of Commerce \$1,800 one-time in FY 2025, and \$19,300 ongoing beginning in FY 2025 from the Commerce Service Account to review certifications.
