Enactment of this legislation could cost the Courts \$10,200 ongoing from the General Fund beginning in FY 2025 due to increased staff support needed to address resolving pecuniary damages. Additionally, enactment of this legislation could increase costs to the Statewide Association of Prosecutors and Public Attorney's by \$750 per case beginning in FY 2025, though the aggregate is unknown.
