Enactment of this legislation could increase revenue to the Qualified Production Enterprise Fund by \$24,000 ongoing beginning in FY 2025 from Closed-door Medical Cannabis Pharmacy Licenses. This legislation could also increase revenue to the Qualified Patient Enterprise Fund by \$1,200 one-time in FY 2024, \$34,800 one-time in FY 2025, and by \$56,400 ongoing beginning in FY 2026 from additional registrations for Pharmacy Medical Providers and patients, as well as additional transaction fees.

Enactment of this legislation could cost the Department of Agriculture and Food \$26,300 one-time in FY 2024 and \$22,000 ongoing from the Qualified Production Enterprise Fund for rule changes and closed door pharmacy inspections. This legislation could also cost the Department of Health and Human Services \$500 one-time in FY 2024 and \$3,600 ongoing beginning in FY 2025 to process additional registrations and payments.

Enactment of this legislation likely will not result in direct, measurable costs for local governments.

Individuals & Businesses

Enactment of this legislation could cost individuals and businesses who choose to open or patronize a Closed-door Medical Cannabis Pharmacy \$1,200 one-time in FY 2024, \$58,800 one-time in FY 2025 and \$80,400 ongoing beginning in FY 2026 for business licenses, patient registrations, and product transaction fees.

Regulatory Impact UCA 36-12-13(2)(d)

Enactment of this legislation likely will not change the regulatory burden for Utah residents or businesses.

This bill does not create a new program or significantly expand an existing program.
