Enactment of this legislation could increase revenue to the newly created Property Loss Related to Homelessness Compensation Fund from the General Fund by \$300,000 one-time in FY 2025.

Enactment of this legislation would appropriate \$300,000, one-time in FY 2025, from the General Fund to the Property Loss Related to Homelessness Compensation Fund (fund) created in this bill. Enactment of this legislation could cost the Department of Workforce Services \$155,000, one-time, from the General Fund in FY 2025 to develop a system to manage claims and payouts from the fund and \$148,000 ongoing in FY 2025, also from the General Fund, to administer the new fund, manage claims and payouts, and pay staff, per diem, and travel reimbursement of advisory committee members. Enactment of this legislation could provide \$300,000, one-time in FY 2025, from the fund, to provide compensation and loans to individuals as described in the bill. Enactment could also cost the Department of Government Operations \$800, one-time from the General Fund in FY 2025 to create the Property Loss Related to Homelessness Compensation Fund in the state's financial system.
