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INTRODUCTION

This *Digest of Legislation* provides long titles of bills and resolutions enacted by the 55th Legislature in the 2003 General Session, the 2002 Veto Override Session, and the 2002 Third, Fourth, Fifth, and Sixth Special Sessions. The First and Second Special Sessions were reported in the *Digest of Legislation* published in April 2002. The digest lists the sponsor, sections of the Utah Code affected, effective date, session law chapter number for each bill enacted, and whether the bill was studied and approved by an interim committee (in italics). Bills vetoed by the governor are also identified, summarized, and presented with the governor's veto message. Bills and resolutions not passed are indexed by subject. Statistical summary data and a staff listing of the Office of Legislative Research and General Counsel are found at the end of the digest.

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PASSED LEGISLATION - 2003 GENERAL SESSION

Appropriations Act (Ron Bigelow) This act funds appropriations and reductions for the operation of state government for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2003 and ending June 30, 2004. The act provides budget increases and decreases for the use and support of certain state departments and agencies of state government and for other purposes as provided in this act. This act provides an effective date.

Minimum School Program Act Amendments (Gordon E. Snow) This act modifies the State System of Public Education Code by providing funding for the Minimum School Program and school building aid programs. This act establishes a ceiling for the state contribution to the Minimum School Program for fiscal year 2003-04 of \$1,611,343,274, which includes a one-time appropriation of \$5,000,000 for classroom supplies. This act establishes the value of the weighted pupil unit at \$2,150. This act appropriates \$27,288,900 for school building aid programs. This act establishes the maximum funding level for the School LAND Trust Program. This act dedicates a portion of the interest and dividends received from the investment of monies in the Permanent State School Fund for teachers' classroom supplies. This act provides an effective date. This act provides a coordination clause.

Viatical Settlements (Brent D. Parker) This act modifies the Insurance Code by allowing viatical settlements regardless of whether the viator is terminally ill. The act provides for licensing and examinations of producers and providers of viatical settlements. The act provides guidelines in relation to viatical settlements for reporting, disclosure, advertising, fraud, and other general requirements. The act provides criminal penalties for violations. The act modifies the Securities Division - Real Estate Division Code by defining a viatical settlement interest as a security. (Business and Labor Interim Committee)

Special Group License Plate Revisions (David L. Hogue) This act modifies the Motor Vehicle Code by revising and amending the special group license plates provisions. This act establishes categories for special group license plates. This act provides that the Motor Vehicle Division must receive a start-up fee for production and administrative costs as established by the division prior to issuing any new type of special group license plates or a legislative appropriation to cover this fee. This act limits organizations that can obtain any new type of special group license plates, without legislative action to tax-exempt 501(c)(3) organizations that collect 200 applicants and that pay the start-up fee. This act allows a redesign fee to be established by the division for the redesign of special group license plates. This act repeals a \$50 initial license plate fee and its exemptions and a \$10 renewal fee and its exemptions and in their place establishes a \$5 initial license plate fee applicable to all special group license plates. This act provides for an immediate effective date. (Transportation Interim Committee)

HB 9 Competency to Stand Trial Amendments (Scott Daniels) This act modifies the Code of Criminal Procedure to allow the examiners of a defendant whose competency to stand trial has been raised access to all relevant information, including mental health records. (Judiciary Interim Committee)

HB 12 Utah Optometry Practice Act Amendments (*Katherine M. Bryson*) This act modifies the Utah Optometry Practice Act by changing the definition of "contact lens prescription." The act conforms state law to federal regulations on standards for privacy of individually identifiable health information. The act requires a provider who prescribes a private label contact lens for a patient to include on the prescription the name of the manufacturer, the trade name of the private label brand, and, if applicable, the trade name of the equivalent national brand.

Chapter 270, Laws of Utah 2003

Transportation Corridor Preservation Amendments (Marda Dillree) This act modifies the Transportation Code to extend the period for which real property may be acquired for the preservation of a future transportation corridor from 20 years to 30 years in advance. This act requires the Department of Transportation to give the original grantor first right of refusal of the highest offer for unused parcels of real property acquired for transportation corridors and provides for notification and 90 days to accept the offer. This act makes technical changes.

HB 14 Tourism Promotion Programs (Sheryl L. Allen) The act provides an exception to the growth factor requirement for an appropriation to the Tourism Marketing Performance Fund.

HB 15 State Armory Board Amendments (Don E. Bush) This act modifies the Militia and Armories title by requiring the State Armory Board to notify the Legislature and receive its recommendations before legally binding the state to purchase or sell real property. This act requires legislative approval before the board may take an option to purchase real property under lease. This act repeals obsolete sections. (Government Operations Interim Committee)

HB 16 Equal Employment Opportunity - Technical Changes (*Eli H. Anderson*) This act modifies provisions relating to equal employment opportunity. This act requires the Department of Human Resource Management to prepare an equal employment opportunity plan instead of an affirmative action plan and makes technical corrections. (*Government Operations Interim Committee*)

Agricultural Products Dealer's Act Amendments (Craig W. Buttars) This act modifies the Agricultural Products Dealer's Act by increasing the ceiling on the amount of the surety bond or other security agreement required before a license is issued to a dealer. The act allows the commissioner of the Department of Agriculture and Food to increase original bond requirements for a dealer's license if the original bond is inadequate. The act gives the commissioner the authority to call a bond if renewal is not made. The act requires the filing of annual reports by dealers with the department. (Natural Resources, Agriculture, and Environment Interim Committee / Agricultural Sustainability Task Force)

Dealers in Agricultural Products (Craig W. Buttars) This act modifies the Agricultural Product Dealer's Act by requiring the issuance of a Product of Agriculture Receipt to a producer by a dealer who receives a product of agriculture for sale, storage, or consignment from the producer.

Employment Security Act Modifications (*Merlynn T. Newbold*) This act amends the Employment Security Act by providing for additional unemployment benefits for individuals who have exhausted their regular benefits. The act provides specific requirements to receive the additional benefits and a limit on the amount of benefits an individual can receive. The act sunsets Section 35A-4-402.5 on July 1, 2004.

HB 21 State Building Ownership Authority Recodification and Revision (Neil A. Hansen) This act modifies provisions governing the State Building Ownership Authority. This act removes the State Building Board as the State Building Ownership Authority and designates the governor, state treasurer, and chair of the State Building Board as the State Building Ownership Authority. This act requires the Division of Facilities Construction and Management to perform certain duties formerly directed to be performed by the State Building Board. This act recodifies the State Building Ownership Authority sections into the Bond title and makes other technical corrections. (Government Operations Interim Committee)

Property Tax Relief (*Wayne A. Harper*) This act modifies provisions relating to Property Tax Relief. The act amends the definition of household income and defines terms. The act amends provisions relating to eligibility to claim a homeowner's credit or renter's credit. This act makes technical changes. This act has retrospective operation to January 1, 2003.

(Political Subdivisions Interim Committee)

Extension of Timing for Creating a Local District (*David L. Hogue*) This act modifies Limited Purpose Local Government Entities provisions to change the date before which no local district may be created. (*Political Subdivisions Interim Committee*)

HB 26 State General Obligation Bond Act (Ron Bigelow) This act modifies provisions governing bonding by creating a master act for issuance of general obligation bonds and general obligation bond anticipation notes. This act establishes issuance requirements, repayment requirements, investment requirements, tax exempt status, and legal investment status for general obligation bonds and bond anticipation notes. This act establishes other requirements governing the issuance of general obligation bonds and general obligation bond anticipation notes. This act

takes effect immediately. (Government Operations Interim Committee)

The act provides for an Education Budget Reserve Account. The act makes technical corrections. (Government Operations Interim Committee)

Oil and Gas Severance Tax Amendments (Gordon E. Snow) This act amends provisions relating to the Oil and Gas Severance Tax. The act extends the time period for a taxpayer to claim a tax credit for a workover or recompletion, and modifies provisions relating to claiming the tax credit. The act requires the Tax Review Commission to review the oil and gas severance tax on or before the October 2008 interim meeting and prescribes the scope of the review. This act repeals obsolete language and makes technical changes. The act provides for retrospective operation. (Revenue and Taxation Interim Committee)

Fees and Taxes on Oil and Gas (Gordon E. Snow) This act amends provisions relating to Mines and Mining and the Oil and Gas Severance Tax. This act modifies the due dates for making quarterly payments of fees deposited into the Oil and Gas Conservation Account and requires the fees to be reported on forms provided by the State Tax Commission. The act modifies the requirements for making quarterly payments of the oil and gas severance tax. The act modifies provisions relating to claiming a tax credit for a workover or recompletion. The act repeals obsolete language and makes technical changes. This act provides for retrospective operation. This act provides a coordination clause. (Revenue and Taxation Interim Committee / Tax Review Commission)

Public Transit Districts Annexation Amendments (David N. Cox) This act modifies provisions relating to Limited Purpose Local Government Entities and to Revenue and Taxation. The act requires voter approval of an annexation to a local district in which the counties, cities, and towns impose a sales and use tax for transit district purposes and clarifies that the election approving the annexation and imposition of the sales and use tax satisfies the voter approval requirement for imposition of the sales and use tax. The act makes technical changes. (Political Subdivisions Interim Committee)

The act provides for an appeal from an initial department determination of overpayment. The act makes certain technical changes and provides a repealer. The act has a July 1, 2003 effective date.

Vehicle Impound Fee for Driving Under the Influence Cases (Joseph G. Murray) This act modifies the Motor Vehicles Code by allowing a wavier or refund for the \$200 DUI administrative impound fee if written evidence is presented to the State Tax Commission that the Driver License Division did not suspend or revoke the person's driver license or that the vehicle was stolen. This act increases the administrative impound fee to \$230 and increases current distributions to the Motor Vehicle Division, the Department of Public Safety, and the General Fund proportionately. (Transportation Interim Committee)

Amendments to Child Welfare Legislative Oversight Panel (Michael T. Morley) This act amends the Human Services Code. The act directs the panel to consider the concerns of all parties to a case it discusses and makes technical changes.

This act modifies the elements to be considered by the Private Activity Bond Review Board when allocating the state's private activity bond volume cap and modifies the powers of housing authorities. This act modifies the allowable uses of the Olene Walker Housing Loan Fund. This act allows the Department of Community and Economic Development and the Utah Housing Corporation to give consideration to projects that increase the supply of accessible housing. This act provides definitions. (Health and Human Services Interim Committee)

Restructure Spend down Provision for Medicaid (Rebecca D. Lockhart) This act modifies the Medical Assistance Act. The act defines terms and directs the Health Department to use 100% of the federal poverty level as the income standard when determining if the aged, blind, or disabled have spent down enough excess income to be eligible for Medicaid benefits.

Gowans) This act modifies the Uniform Commercial Code by deleting a provision requiring the Division of Corporations to annually report to the Administrative Rules Review Committee regarding the operation of the filing office. Repeal of Education Reports and Duties (Margaret Dayton) This act modifies provisions relating to the State System of Public Education by eliminating requirements to submit certain reports to the Legislature. This act modifies certain duties and responsibilities of the State Board of Education and the superintendent of public instruction. This act consolidates several reports into the state superintendent's annual report. This act eliminates the requirement for the State Board of Education to submit separate budget recommendations for U-PASS and professional development plans. This act eliminates the State Board of Education's responsibility to annually determine the estimated total cost of the minimum school program for each district. This act repeals the Modified School Week Pilot Program and the Arts in Elementary Schools Pilot Program. This act contains a repealer. This act makes technical amendments.

Notice of Intent to Sell Nonpublic Personal Information (Douglas C. Aagard) This act modifies the Commerce and Trade title to enact the Notice of Intent to Sell Nonpublic Personal Information Act. This act defines terms, requires a notice be given by a commercial entity under certain circumstances, and establishes the liability of a commercial entity for violating the act. This act takes effect on January 1, 2004.

This act increases curriculum and graduation requirements for grades 9 through 12 in language arts, mathematics, and science. This act requires the State Board of Education to study, make recommendations, and report to the Education Interim Committee on an enumerated list of strategies to improve public education. appropriates \$150,000 for fiscal year 2002-03 only to the Office of Legislative Research and General Counsel to allow the Education Interim Committee to issue a specified request for proposals. This act requires the Public Education Appropriations Subcommittee to study and report on specified funding issues. This act requires the State Board of Regents to study and report on specified issues. This act authorizes additional legislative committee meetings during the 2003 interim and appropriates \$24,500 from the General Fund, for fiscal year 2002-03 only, to cover the additional meeting expenses. This act appropriates \$4,000,000 from the Uniform School Fund, for the fiscal year beginning on July 1, 2003, to the State Board of Education to begin implementing competency-based education processes. This act authorizes a State Education Summit Meeting, requires certain reports for the summit, enumerates its participants, and specifies its purpose. This act makes technical corrections.

Hillyard*) This resolution modifies Senate Rules governing quorums by exempting certain members of majority and minority leadership from being counted in determining a quorum in certain circumstances. This act takes effect immediately.

SR 5 Senate Rules Resolution - Witness Oaths (Lyle W. Hillyard) This resolution modifies Senate Rules governing committee responsibilities and public hearings by allowing the committee chair or a majority of the committee to require a witness to swear or affirm an oath to tell the truth. This resolution takes effect immediately.

Senate Rules Resolution - Senate Confirmation Process (Lyle W. Hillyard) This resolution modifies Senate Rules by modifying procedures governing the Senate Judicial Confirmation Committee. This resolution requires each judicial appointee to be interviewed by the confirmation committee. This resolution establishes requirements for the distribution and review of appointees, resources, application materials, and other related documents. This resolution takes effect immediately.

Amends SR-24.04; Repeals and Reenacts SR-24.04.1

VETOED BILLS - 2003 GENERAL SESSION

Internet Privacy and Security Amendments (Wayne A. Harper) This act modifies the Information Technology Act to enact the Governmental Internet Information Privacy Act. The act mandates that the Legislative Management Committee direct the Utah Information Technology Commission to study and make recommendations to the Legislature related to Internet privacy and security. The act takes effect July 1, 2003. This act provides a coordination clause.

Enacts 63D-1-401, 63D-1-402, 63D-1-403

"This is to inform you that on March 24, 2003, I decided, after careful consideration and study, to veto H.B. 105, INTERNET PRIVACY AND SECURITY AMENDMENTS, and have transmitted it to the Lieutenant Governor for filing.

We live in an age of rapid technological change. The Internet has changed and will continue to change our society dramatically. One of the important goals of my administration is to use this powerful tool to provide government services online. E-government transactions cost less, are more convenient, take less time to process, and do not require travel to a government office. They are also available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

With all of these advantages, however, there is potential for misuse. The privacy and security of Internet transactions is important to the success of e-government. The same can be said of private Internet transactions. House Bill 105 attempts to address this important topic. I share the sponsor's desire to protect the security and privacy of these transactions.

In it original form, the bill mandated a number of restrictions on Internet Service Providers ("ISPs") as well as on state government. In the course of debate, the Legislature ultimately opted to drop the restrictions on ISPs and engage in further study. I am vetoing this bill because the restrictions it imposes on state government also deserve further study. In their current form, I believe these restrictions are somewhat impractical and will increase the costs and burdens of e-government unnecessarily.

I have a high degree of confidence in the present security of our state system and the privacy of the transactions we now process. I pledge to engage in further study of this topic and to seek continuous improvements in the privacy and security of e-government."

HB 168 Filling Midterm Vacancies in the Legislature (Ralph Becker) This act modifies provisions of the Election Code concerning filling midterm vacancies in the Legislature.

Amends 20A-1-503, 20A-8-401

"This is to inform you that on March 24, 2003, I decided, after careful consideration and study, to veto H.B. 168, FILLING MIDTERM VACANCIES IN THE LEGISLATURE, and have transmitted it to the Lieutenant Governor for filing.

House Bill 168 started out as a technical clean up. An amendment changed the bill's character to remove from the governor the right to fill midterm vacancies in the Legislature and confer that right instead on the speaker of the House and president of the Senate for vacancies in the House of Representatives and Senate, respectively.

The founders of our nation rightly recognized the potential for one branch to seek to increase its authority at the expense of another. Human nature being what it is, the founders provided us with checks and balances. The success of our democracy depends on continuous, unbending allegiance to separation of powers and checks and balances. Because H.B. 168 takes a step -- even a relatively small step -- in the wrong direction, I feel compelled to veto.

I do not want to overstate possible negative motives legislators may have had in passing this bill. I have come to recognize that my ability to appoint new legislators is largely ceremonial. The governor appoints new legislators selected by the party leaders and delegates who selected the prior holder of the seat for candidacy.

However, the governor's appointment authority has importance in one significant way: The governor is a neutral party with respect to the internal governance of the legislative chambers. Put more directly, the gubernatorial appointment of a new legislator is unlikely to influence internal leadership politics. The net effect of this bill is, in contrast, to strengthen the political base of the sitting chairs of the House and Senate. The governor's ability to appoint new legislators to vacant seats is clearly a check on the power of the chair.

A lesson can be drawn from the appointment of judges. Our system of checks and balances provides that the executive selects a judge, subject to Senate approval; not one but both of the other branches thus provide a check on the judiciary. If sitting judges appointed new judges, they would be able to perpetuate their own, perhaps erroneous, viewpoints and build allegiances to one another that would make politics, not the law, the supreme consideration in court.

For similar reasons, sitting legislative leaders should not be able [to] perpetuate their own leadership base by appointing new legislators. I feel it is my duty to exercise my check on the legislative branch by vetoing this bill."

SB 165 Gubernatorial Nominee Amendments (Lyle W. Hillyard) This act modifies provisions relating to the information the Senate receives regarding gubernatorial judicial appointees.

Amends 67-1-2

"This is to inform you that on March 24, 2003, after careful study and consideration, I decided to veto S.B. 165, GUBERNATORIAL NOMINEE AMENDMENTS, and have transmitted it to the Lieutenant Governor for filing.

Senate Bill 165 requires the governor, when making a judicial appointment, to 'immediately provide' to the Senate a variety of information, most of which is acceptable to me and which I already supply. One aspect of the bill, however, is unacceptable. It is a provision that requires me to forward 'the name, address, and telephone number of each person who gave information to the governor or his staff about the judicial appointee,' whether the information was solicited or not.

I consider this requirement to be akin to an impediment on free speech, both mine and of those who comment on judicial candidates.

I am certain legislators would react negatively if I adopted a rule that before I sign a bill they must forward to me a complete list, including names, addresses and telephone numbers, of all lobbyists and constituents who have expressed an opinion on the bill.

The objective of reviewing candidates for judicial office is to get the best information possible. This proposed change in the law will have a chilling effect on my ability to do that. Those who comment to me or my staff have an expectation of confidentiality. Some comments come from sitting judge who may have to work with the person about whom they are commenting. Others are members of the bar who could well have to appear before that person in court. Many others who comment are members of the Legislature. The very act of commenting about a judicial candidate provides a premise for later prejudice. While I am confident the Senate would intend to keep my list of contacts confidential, I believe they are as equipped as I to receive or solicit comments. They have 60 days within which to review my choice of a single appointee. I have only 30 days within which to review the five to seven nominees forwarded to me by the judicial nominating commission.

I feel a heavy responsibility to make selections for judicial office after most careful consideration. It is in my interest to be as helpful as possible during the Senate's confirmation process as well. I thought the recent Supreme Court confirmation process went very well, considering it was a new -- and consequently somewhat tense -- experience for all concerned. I congratulate the Senate for its good work. The public benefitted from the Senate's careful review. I invite the Legislature to respect my selection process, as I respect their confirmation process, and work cooperatively toward the best choices possible. In the spirit of cooperation I am willing to comply voluntarily with the other provisions of S.B. 165 and would consider the bill's

reenactment with the requirement for names, address and phone numbers. However, I do not think of any of the three branches of government benefits from that proposed additional constraint on candor and discretion."

SB 251 Firearms Revisions (Beverly Ann Evans) This act modifies provisions dealing with weapons by prohibiting the discharge of a firearm or dangerous weapon in the direction of a house, dwelling, occupied vehicle, or building in a manner that threatens the safety or property of others.

Amends 76-10-508

"This is to inform you that on March 24, 2003, I decided to veto S.B. 251, FIREARMS REVISIONS, at the request of the bill's sponsor and have transmitted it to the Lieutenant Governor for filing.

Under current law, it is a criminal offense to shoot a gun from a vehicle; shoot at road signs; shoot railroad equipment; shoot power poles or utility property; shoot in or around state-owned campsites, picnic sites, beaches, and golf courses; or shoot within 600 feet of private dwellings, barns and other buildings without permission of the owner.

Senate Bill 251, as intended by the sponsor, added that it would also be unlawful to discharge a weapon in the direction of occupied vehicles and dwellings.

In the course of debate, the bill was amended to require that for all these offenses a prosecutor must prove that the offender acted 'knowingly and intentionally.' In lay terms, 'knowing and intentional' may seem only to mean 'on purpose.' In criminal law, however, these additional words increase the standard of proof considerably. To get a conviction for any of the above acts, a prosecutor would need to prove the state of mind of the offender with objective evidence beyond a reasonable doubt. In effect, the bill as passed decreases the enforceability of the current law substantially. I agree with the bill's sponsor that this bill should not become law."





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2002 VETO OVERRIDE SESSION

The Utah State Legislature, for the first time in 11 years, called itself into session to override the governor's veto of the passed legislation below.

The Utah State Legislature successfully voted to override the governor's veto of House Bill 136, Judicial Conduct Commission Amendments.

HB 136 JUDICIAL CONDUCT COMMISSION AMENDMENTS (Katherine M. Bryson)

This act modifies provisions relating to the Judicial Conduct Commission and the Elections Code. It changes the composition of the commission to include a member of the Utah Court of Appeals. It adds the requirement to decide whether certain information alleging misconduct should be investigated. It also requires the commission to immediately refer an allegation involving criminal conduct to the Utah Supreme Court. It also establishes an eight year term limit on commission members. In addition, this act provides that the burden of proof shall be a preponderance of the evidence, and that certain information shall be included in the record when the commission sends any order to the Supreme Court for review. It reiterates the Supreme Court's ability to modify any order of the commission, and also requires that the Supreme Court provide a written summary for publication in the Voter Information Pamphlet.

HB 6001

Supplemental Appropriations Act V (Jeff Alexander) This act funds appropriations and reductions for the operation of state government for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2002 and ending June 30, 2003. The act provides budget increases and decreases for the use and support of certain state departments and agencies of state government and for other purposes as provided in this act.

I have come to this decision with some difficulty. I am a proponent of restricting budgets in these difficult economic times. The Legislature and I have agreed on a large number of budget cuts for the 2002 and 2003 fiscal years. I understand the difficulty the Legislature faces. These are hard decisions. I applaud legislators for preserving education and essential programs for the most needy during the special session.

Moreover, I have made every effort to figure out how to implement these cuts in a rational way. I have asked budget analysts and agency officers to consider and analyze every feasible alternative to make them work. I note that some of these line items contain one-time add backs. Some of the cuts could be mitigated by using nonlapsing money or carry-over money from last fiscal year. But, nonlapsing funds are inadequate to cover some critical cuts, and some funds are in inaccessible restricted accounts. In short, these are not sufficient remedies.

Despite my efforts to make these cuts work, I have come to the conclusion that these line items result in unacceptable cuts to critical programs. I am confident that they translate into letting 400 prisoners back onto the streets, simultaneously taking 130 sworn officers off of the streets, and then making it tougher to administer justice by cutting 30 more jobs in the court system. These cuts make no sense to me when better funding alternatives exist. We have to balance the budget another way. The state does not have to be soft on crime. We can keep vital services going by delaying road projects and reducing water subsidies instead.

I look forward to a healthy discussion of these important issues in the general session."

HB 6003

Use of Tobacco Permanent Trust Fund (*Karen W. Morgan*) This act appropriates \$21,135,000 from the permanent state trust fund created and operated under Utah Constitution Article XXII, Section 4 to the General Fund, for fiscal year 2002-03 only. VETOED BILL 2002 SIXTH SPECIAL SESSION

SB 6004

Use of Attorney General Fund (*John L. Valentine*) This act modifies the Criminal Code and Title 67, State Officers and Employees, by amending and renumbering the provision regarding the Attorney General Litigation Fund. This act amends the fund to allow the attorney general to use fund monies to carry out the office's responsibilities under state and federal law. This act relocates the amended provision from the antitrust prosecution area of the code to Title 67, Chapter 5, Attorney General. This act has an immediate effective date.

Renumbers and Amends 76-10-922 to 67-5-19

"This is to inform you that on January 4, 2003, I decided, after careful consideration and study, to veto S.B. 6004, USE OF ATTORNEY GENERAL FUND, and have transmitted it to the Lieutenant Governor for filing.

Two principles lie at the heart of my decision.

First, the bill gives the attorney general an economic incentive to win legal victories rather than to do justice. It does so by awarding the first \$2,000,000 annually from the proceeds of judgments and settlements to the attorney general rather than to the citizens of the state. Over the course of years, this system could create a soldier-of-fortune mentality. Public lawyers could be enticed to seek the spoils of victory to fund their own pay increases, bonuses and personal projects. This is like a police department being allowed to spend whatever it takes in from writing tickets. The potential for ulterior motivation is obvious. Public lawyers exercise enormous discretionary powers. They do so with the backing of the laws, the resources and, most importantly, the trust of the people. This bill undermines that trust by creating an inappropriate incentive - in essence, a contingency fee for successful prosecution. Public lawyers must be about doing justice, not simply winning. They must do the people's business, not their own.

Second, the bill bypasses the Legislature's important duty to appropriate public monies. Instead, it confers upon the attorney general total discretion to spend the first \$2,000,000 from legal victories - this in addition to all other funds appropriated to the attorney general. While I am strongly in favor if increasing the discretion of managers to shift resources to manage within budgets, this discretion must be guided by legislatively approved priorities that are reviewed annually and are subject to public scrutiny. Senate Bill 6004 violates sound budget principles, erodes system safeguards and eliminates a fundamental check and balance.

This bill has a history. In 1979 the Legislature created a restricted account to fund antitrust lawsuits out of the proceeds of those suits. In the 2002 General Session, the Legislature passed S.B. 191, LAW ENFORCEMENT REVOLVING ACCOUNT, which broadened the attorney general's authority to pay for criminal prosecution costs out of the account as well. In hindsight, I should have vetoed that bill, because it was a step in the wrong direction. But I believed at the time, as did many legislators, that the revenues going into the account were limited to the proceeds of antitrust and criminal actions and that they would be used to pay for the costs of those actions exclusively.

Senate Bill 6004 is another step in the wrong direction, this time too far. The bill takes an innocuous restricted account created for a specific purpose, moves it out of the Utah Antitrust Act into the general provisions of the law, designates the funding source as all recoveries of any type in which the attorney general had a hand, and then allows the attorney general unprecedented discretion to spend it. This \$2,000,000 general purpose slush fund bears no resemblance to its original parent and is contrary to my sense of responsible democracy.

For the reasons stated, I feel compelled to veto S.B. 6004."
