15	Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:
16	Section 1. Section 78-3a-104 is amended to read:
17	78-3a-104. Jurisdiction of juvenile court Original Exclusive.
18	(1) Except as otherwise provided by law, the juvenile court has exclusive original
19	jurisdiction in proceedings concerning:
20	(a) a minor who has violated any federal, state, or local law or municipal ordinance or a
21	person younger than 21 years of age who has violated any law or ordinance before becoming 18
22	years of age, regardless of where the violation occurred, excluding traffic laws and ordinances;
23	(b) a person 21 years of age or older who has failed or refused to comply with an order of
24	the juvenile court to pay a fine or restitution, if the order was imposed prior to the person's 21st
25	birthday; however, the continuing jurisdiction is limited to causing compliance with existing
26	orders;
27	(c) a minor who is abused, neglected, or dependent, as those terms are defined in Section

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1 78-3a-103;

2 (d) the determination of the custody of a minor or to appoint a guardian of the person or
3 other guardian of a minor who comes within the court's jurisdiction under other provisions of this
4 section;

(e) the termination of the legal parent-child relationship in accordance with Part 4,
Termination of Parental Rights Act, including termination of residual parental rights and duties;

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(f) the treatment or commitment of a mentally retarded minor;

8 (g) a minor who, in defiance of earnest and persistent efforts on the part of his parents and 9 school authorities as required under Section 53A-11-103, is a habitual truant from school;

(h) the judicial consent to the marriage of a minor under age 16 upon a determination of
voluntariness or where otherwise required by law, employment, or enlistment of a minor when
consent is required by law;

(i) any parent or parents of a minor committed to a secure youth corrections facility, to
order, at the discretion of the court and on the recommendation of a secure youth corrections
facility, the parent or parents of a minor committed to a secure youth corrections facility for a
custodial term, to undergo group rehabilitation therapy under the direction of a secure youth
corrections facility therapist, who has supervision of that parent's or parents' minor, or any other
therapist the court may direct, for a period directed by the court as recommended by a secure youth
corrections facility;

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(j) a minor under Title 55, Chapter 12, Interstate Compact on Juveniles;

(k) the treatment or commitment of a mentally ill child. The court may commit a child to
the physical custody of a local mental health authority or to the legal custody of the Division of
Mental Health in accordance with the procedures and requirements of Title 62A, Chapter 12, Part
2A, Commitment of Persons Under Age 18 to Division of Mental Health. The court may not
commit a child directly to the Utah State Hospital; and

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(l) the commitment of a minor in accordance with Section 62A-8-501.

(2) In addition to the provisions of Subsection (1)(a) the juvenile court has exclusive
jurisdiction over any traffic offense committed by a minor under 16 years of age and concurrent
jurisdiction over all other traffic offenses committed by a minor 16 years of age or older, except
that the court shall have exclusive jurisdiction over the following traffic offenses committed by
a minor under 18 years of age:

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1	(a) Section 76-5-207, automobile homicide;
2	(b) Section 41-6-44, operating a vehicle while under the influence of alcohol or drugs;
3	(c) Section 41-6-45, reckless driving;
4	[(d) Section 41-1a-1311, unauthorized control over a motor vehicle, trailer, or semitrailer;]
5	[(e)] (d) Section 41-1a-1314, unauthorized control over a motor vehicle, trailer, or
6	semitrailer for an extended period of time; and
7	[(f)] (e) Section 41-6-13.5, fleeing a peace officer.
8	(3) The court also has jurisdiction over traffic offenses that are part of a single criminal
9	episode filed in a petition that contains an offense over which the court has jurisdiction.
10	(4) The juvenile court has jurisdiction over questions of custody, support, and visitation
11	certified to it by the district court pursuant to Section 78-3a-105.
12	(5) The juvenile court has jurisdiction over an ungovernable or runaway minor who is
13	referred to it by the Division of Child and Family Services or by public or private agencies that
14	contract with the division to provide services to that minor where, despite earnest and persistent
15	efforts by the division or agency, the minor has demonstrated that he:
16	(a) is beyond the control of his parent, guardian, lawful custodian, or school authorities
17	to the extent that his behavior or condition endangers his own welfare or the welfare of others; or
18	(b) has run away from home.
19	(6) This section does not restrict the right of access to the juvenile court by private
20	agencies or other persons.
21	(7) The juvenile court has jurisdiction of all magistrate functions relative to cases arising
22	under Section 78-3a-602.
23	Section 2. Repealer.
24	This act repeals:
25	Section 41-1a-1308, Injuring or tampering with motor vehicle, trailer, or semitrailer
26	Class C misdemeanor.
27	Section 41-1a-1311, Unlawful control over motor vehicles, trailers, or semitrailers
28	Penalties Effect of prior consent Accessory or accomplice.
