5	A JOINT RESOLUTION OF THE LEGISLATURE URGING LOCAL GOVERNMENTS TO
6	ENFORCE ORDINANCES GOVERNING PEDESTRIAN ACCESS AND RIGHT-OF-WAY.
7	Be it resolved by the Legislature of the state of Utah:
8	WHEREAS, in 1997, 39 pedestrians were killed on Utah's public streets and highways in
9	accidents involving a motor vehicle;
10	WHEREAS, in 1998, 52 pedestrians were killed in accidents involving a motor vehicle,
11	an increase of 25%;
12	WHEREAS, important steps should be taken to prevent this escalation of pedestrian danger
13	and reduce the number of tragedies;
14	WHEREAS, pedestrians are granted the right-of-way on public roads;
15	WHEREAS, pedestrians have the right to use public roads and public transportation in
16	safety;
17	WHEREAS, pedestrians have the right to protection from hasty and careless motorists,
18	particularly when using crosswalks;
19	WHEREAS, crosswalks that are well lighted increase pedestrian safety;
20	WHEREAS, increasing the number of sidewalks on public streets would increase
21	pedestrian safety;
22	WHEREAS, motorists need to slow down and increase their awareness of pedestrians;
23	WHEREAS, green lights should be long enough to allow pedestrians to safely cross the
24	street; and
25	WHEREAS, dedicated efforts by local governments to increase the safety of pedestrians
26	is needed to stem the tide of suffering from these needless tragedies:
27	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislature of the state of Utah urge

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- 28 local governments to enforce local ordinances governing pedestrian access and right-of-way so that
- 29 deaths and accidents involving pedestrians and motor vehicles can be reduced and, where possible,
- 30 prevented.
- 31 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be sent to each of Utah's city
- 32 councils and county commissions, and to each city and county's chief law enforcement official.
