16	meritorious or impecunious resident students to an amount not exceeding 10% of the total amount		
17	of tuition which, in the absence of the waivers, would have been collected from all Utah resident		
18	students at the institution.		
19	(2) (a) Each academic year the president of each of the following institutions may waive		
20	all or part of the resident portion of the tuition in behalf of the additional number of meritorious		
21	nonresident students set forth below who are not current recipients of the waiver:
