

Representative Patricia W. Jones proposes the following substitute bill:

**ELEMENTARY SCHOOL VENDING MACHINE  
SALES**

2003 GENERAL SESSION

STATE OF UTAH

**Sponsor: Patricia W. Jones**

**This act amends the State System of Public Education. The act provides that after a certain time period elementary schools may sell only certain food products through vending machines on premises accessible to students.**

This act affects sections of Utah Code Annotated 1953 as follows:

ENACTS:

**53A-15-1001**, Utah Code Annotated 1953

*Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:*

Section 1. Section **53A-15-1001** is enacted to read:

**Part 10. Promoting Nutrition**

**53A-15-1001. Vending machines.**

(1) After the date specified in Subsection (2), if an elementary school chooses to locate a vending machine on premises accessible to students, the food products sold in the vending machine may not be foods of minimal nutritional value as defined by the United States Department of Agriculture.

(2) The requirements of Subsection (1) shall be met upon ~~the~~ **the first to occur of the following:**

~~(a)~~ the natural expiration or earlier termination of a school's contracts in force with vending machine suppliers ~~;~~ **or**

~~(b) May 5, 2006~~ ~~;~~ **or**
