6	This act modifies the State System of Higher Education Code by modifying provisions
7	relating to the Utah College of Applied Technology. This act changes terminology of the
8	Utah College of Applied Technology's college campuses, campus presidents, and campus
9	boards of directors. This act repeals a required report of the State Board of Education.
10	This act amends definitions. This act modifies some governance provisions within the
11	Utah College of Applied Technology and its campuses as well as provisions relating to
12	governance by the State Board of Regents. This act allows market cost tuition for adult
13	students of the Utah College of Applied Technology. This act authorizes certain Utah
14	College of Applied Technology campus leases. This act makes technical corrections. This
15	act takes effect on July 1, 2003.

104	(1) (a) There is appropriated to the State Board of Education for the fiscal year
105	beginning July 1, 2002, \$50,242,712 (23,566 weighted pupil units) to pay for approved applied
106	technology education programs and the comprehensive guidance program.
107	(b) Included in the appropriation is \$908,232 (426 weighted pupil units) for summer
108	applied technology agriculture programs.
109	(c) The money appropriated in this Subsection (1):
110	(i) shall be allocated to eligible recipients as provided in Subsections (2), (3), and (4);

- (4) (a) Monies remaining after the allocations made under Subsections (2) and (3) shall be allocated using average daily membership in approved programs for the previous year.

- (c) one member representing business and industry from the regional board of each regional applied technology college appointed by a majority vote of the business and industry members of the regional board; and
- (d) one business or industry representative appointed by the governor with the consent of the Senate from nominations submitted by the speaker of the House of Representatives and president of the Senate.

Establishment of Snow College South -- Supervision and 902 administration -- Transition -- Institutional mission. 903 (1) There is established a branch campus of Snow College in Richfield, Utah, hereafter 904 referred to as Snow College South. 905 (2) Snow College shall administer the branch campus under the general control and 906 supervision of the State Board of Regents as an integrated part of Snow College's mission, 907 programs, and curriculum. 908 (3) (a) Snow College shall: 909 (i) maintain a strong curriculum in applied technology and technical courses of a 910 general nature at Snow College South which can be transferred to other institutions within the 911 higher education system, together with lower division courses of a general nature and courses 912 required for associate degrees in science, arts, and applied science; and 913 (ii) work with local school districts in developing an aggressive concurrent enrollment 914 program in cooperation with Snow College South. 915 (b) The institution shall coordinate offerings of applied technology education with the 916 Central Applied Technology College Campus to provide for open-entry, open-exit applied 917 technology education programs at Snow College South that emphasize short-term job training 918 or retraining for immediate placement in the job market. 919 (c) Snow College shall make provisions for students, including high school students, to 920 take classes at Snow College South for which college credit is not awarded, together with 921 appropriate fees for taking such classes. 922 (d) The State Board of Regents or the president of Snow College may waive any board 923 rule or institutional policy that would prevent or inhibit Snow College South from achieving its 924 performance goals, unless approval of the request would conflict with state or federal law or

put the institution out of compliance with matters related to health, safety, civil rights, and

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insurance.

927 Section 20. **Effective date.**

928 This act takes effect on July 1, 2003.
