

2003 General Session Fifty–Fifth Legislature

The 2003 General Session of the Fifty–Fifth Legislature will likely stand out as one of the more challenging sessions of the past decade. The legislature had the difficult task of balancing the budget with less money than has been available in some 15 years. Adding to the tension were some very sensitive pieces of legislation dealing with tuition tax credits, hate crimes, holding therapy, and amendments related to financial institutions. These issues generated a great deal of citizen participation, and this involvement is what truly makes our process work.

Senate Bill 172 created a task force to study radioactive and hazardous waste storage, including evaluation of fees and taxes imposed on these wastes. It also placed a moratorium on acceptance of Class B or C radioactive waste through February 15, 2005.

Despite the budget constraints, the legislature increased public education funding by \$20 per pupil and avoided a general tax increase. Overall, I am pleased with the progress made during this session and the bipartisan effort to pass legislation that would be most beneficial to Utahns as a whole.

The Senate bid farewell to five retiring senators: Alicia Suazo (District 2), L. Steven Poulton (District 9), Millie M. Peterson (District 12), D. Edgar Allen (District 18), and Terry R. Spencer (District 22).

The Senate also welcomed five new senators: James Evans (District 1), Patrice Arent (District 4), David L. Thomas (District 18), Gregory S. Bell (District 22), and Thomas Hatch (District 28).

The governor's appointment of two new Supreme Court Justices provided an opportunity for the Senate to review its confirmation process before voting to confirm the appointees. The changes made significantly strengthened the process of evaluating judicial appointees and will better ensure the appointment of highly qualified judges who possess all the attributes necessary to perform this important service for the people of Utah.

I am very honored to have been elected to a second term as President of the Senate. I appreciate the confidence of the good men and women of the Fifty-Fifth Legislature, and I look forward to my continued association with them.





CLEAN SPECIAL FUEL TAX CERTIFICATE - EXEMPTION

S.B. 4 David H. Steele

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE REVENUE AND TAXATION CODE BY CLARIFYING THAT GOVERNMENT VEHICLES ARE EXEMPT FROM PURCHASING THE CLEAN SPECIAL FUEL TAX CERTIFICATE. THIS ACT MAKES TECHNICAL CORRECTIONS, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

RETIREMENT AND INDEPENDENT ENTITIES COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS

S.B. 5 Beverly Ann Evans

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE INDEPENDENT ENTITIES CODE BY CHANGING THE NAME OF THE **LEGISLATIVE** ENTITIES COMMITTEE OUASI-GOVERNMENTAL AND LEGISLATIVE INDEPENDENT ENTITIES COMMITTEE TO THE RETIREMENT AND INDEPENDENT ENTITIES COMMITTEE. RETAILER REQUIREMENTS IN PRINTING FINANCIAL TRANSACTION CARD RECEIPT

S.B. 6 Carlene M. Walker

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE COMMERCE AND TRADE CODE BY ENACTING PROVISIONS PROHIBITING A PERSON FROM PRINTING MORE THAN THE LAST FIVE DIGITS OF A FINANCIAL TRANSACTION CARD ACCOUNT NUMBER OR THE EXPIRATION DATE ON A FINANCIAL TRANSACTION CARD RECEIPT. THIS ACT TAKES EFFECT ON JANUARY 1, 2004, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

AUTOMOBILE HOMICIDE AMENDMENTS

S.B. 7 Carlene M. Walker

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE CRIMINAL CODE BY STATING THAT ONE OF THE ELEMENTS OF THE OFFENSE OF AUTOMOBILE HOMICIDE

MAY BE THAT THE OPERATOR HAS A MEASURABLE AMOUNT OF SCHEDULE I OR II CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES IN THE BODY. THIS ACT ALSO PROVIDES AN AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE IF THE CONTROLLED SUBSTANCE WAS INVOLUNTARILY INGESTED OR WAS BEING TAKEN PURSUANT TO A PRESCRIPTION, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

SENTENCING IN CAPITAL CASES AMENDMENTS

S.B. 8 David L. Gladwell

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE CRIMINAL CODE BY PROVIDING THAT PERSONS FOUND BY THE COURT TO BE MENTALLY RETARDED ARE NOT SUBJECT TO THE DEATH PENALTY. THIS ACT DEFINES MENTAL RETARDATION AS APPLICABLE TO DEATH PENALTY CASES. THIS ACT SPECIFIES PROCEDURES FOR THE EXAMINATION OF DEFENDANTS ALLEGING MENTAL RETARDATION AND PROCEDURES FOR THE JUDICIAL HEARING TO DETERMINE MENTAL RETARDATION. THIS ACT IS IN RESPONSE TO THE RECENT U.S. SUPREME COURT CASE ATKINS V. VIRGINIA WHICH PROHIBITS EXECUTION OF THE MENTALLY RETARDED. THIS ACT ALSO PROVIDES DEFENDANTS WITH SPECIFIED SUBAVERAGE FUNCTIONING ARE NOT SUBJECT TO THE DEATH PENALTY IF THE DEFENDANT'S CONFESSION IS NOT SUBSTANTIALLY CORROBORATED. THIS ACT HAS AN IMMEDIATE EFFECTIVE DATE, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

COMPREHENSIVE HEALTH INSURANCE POOL AMENDMENTS

S.B. 9 Gene Davis

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE COMPREHENSIVE HEALTH INSURANCE POOL ACT. THE ACT AMENDS DEFINITIONS. THE ACT AMENDS THE NUMBER OF BOARD MEMBERS REQUIRED FOR A QUORUM, THE POWERS OF THE BOARD, AND THE DUTIES OF THE POOL ADMINISTRATOR. THE ACT AMENDS ELIGIBILITY FOR THE POOL AND THE APPLICATION OF PREEXISTING CONDITIONS IN ORDER TO BE IN COMPLIANCE WITH FEDERAL LAW AND TO INCORPORATE PROVISIONS OF THE PRIMARY CARE NETWORK WAIVER FOR THE STATE MEDICAID PROGRAM. THE ACT AMENDS PROVISIONS RELATED TO COPAYS, DEDUCTIBLES, AND CANCELLATIONS OF COVERAGE. THE ACT AMENDS THE FREQUENCY WITH WHICH PREMIUMS MAY BE ADJUSTED. THE ACT AMENDS BENEFIT

REDUCTION AND IMMUNITY PROVISIONS. THE ACT MAKES TECHNICAL CHANGES, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

PRENEED FUNERAL ARRANGEMENT AMENDMENTS

S.B. 10 Patrice M. Arent

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE PRENEED FUNERAL ARRANGEMENT ACT BY REQUIRING PRENEED CONTRACTS TO PROVIDE THE BUYER WITH THE OPTION TO FURNISH A DISCLOSURE OF THE PRENEED CONTRACT TO ANOTHER PERSON, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

CHILD CARE AMENDMENTS

S.B. 11 Beverly Ann Evans

THIS ACT MODIFIES PROVISIONS RELATED TO CHILD CARE IN UTAH. THE ACT MODIFIES DEFINITIONS RELATED TO PROVIDING CHILD CARE SERVICES. IT MODIFIES THE FUNCTIONS AND DUTIES OF THE OFFICE OF CHILD CARE AND REOUIRES AN ANNUAL REPORT BY THE OFFICE ON THE STATUS OF CHILD CARE IN THE STATE. THE ACT INCREASES THE MEMBERSHIP OF THE CHILD CARE ADVISORY COMMITTEE AND PROVIDES SPECIFIC RESPONSIBILITIES FOR THE COMMITTEE. THE ACT MODIFIES THE ROLES AND RELATIONSHIPS OF INDIVIDUALS AND **ENTITIES** WHO HAVE RESPONSIBILITIES RELATED TO THE CHILD CARE EXPENDABLE TRUST FUND AND MAKES CERTAIN TECHNICAL CHANGES, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

INDUSTRIAL ASSISTANCE FUND AMENDMENTS

S.B. 12 Beverly Ann Evans

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE QUALIFICATIONS FOR APPLICANTS TO RECEIVE FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FROM THE INDUSTRIAL ASSISTANCE FUND, INCLUDING APPLICANT COMPANIES CREATING AN ECONOMIC IMPEDIMENT. THIS ACT PROVIDES FOR GRANTS TO BE MADE FROM THE FUND, REQUIRES AGREEMENTS WITH SPECIFIC TERMS AND CONDITIONS BETWEEN THE ADMINISTRATOR OF THE FUND AND SUCCESSFUL APPLICANTS, AND MAKES CERTAIN TECHNICAL CHANGES, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

DUI PLEA RESTRICTIONS

S.B. 13 D. Chris Buttars

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE MOTOR VEHICLE CODE BY PROVIDING RESTRICTIONS ON WHEN A COURT CAN ACCEPT A PLEA OF GUILTY OR NO CONTEST IN A DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE OF ALCOHOL OR DRUGS CASE. THIS ACT REQUIRES THAT A COURT RECEIVE VERIFICATION THAT THE PROSECUTOR AGREES TO THE PLEA, THE PROSECUTOR FILES A CRIMINAL INFORMATION, OR THE COURT RECEIVES VERIFICATION OF NO PRIOR OFFENSES FROM A LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCY, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

GOVERNOR'S OFFICE OF PLANNING AND BUDGET RECODIFICATION AND REVISIONS

S.B. 14 Ron Allen

THIS ACT MODIFIES UTAH CODE PROVISIONS GOVERNING THE STATE BUDGET OFFICE AND OFFICER AND THE STATE PLANNING COORDINATOR. THIS ACT RECODIFIES THOSE SECTIONS TO CREATE THE GOVERNOR'S OFFICE OF PLANNING AND BUDGET. THIS ACT MAKES TECHNICAL CORRECTIONS, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

WORKFORCE SERVICES AMENDMENTS

S.B. 15 Scott K. Jenkins

THIS ACT MODIFIES PROVISIONS RELATED TO THE EMPLOYMENT SECURITY ACT BY REMOVING THE PART-TIME EMPLOYEE LIMITATION ON THE CHAIR OF THE WORKFORCE APPEALS BOARD. THE ACT MODIFIES THE DEFINITION OF EMPLOYER TO BE CONSISTENT WITH STATE AND FEDERAL WITHHOLDING REQUIREMENTS AND ALSO MAKES CERTAIN TECHNICAL CHANGES, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

MASTER STATE HIGHWAYS AMENDMENTS

S.B. 16 David H. Steele

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE TRANSPORTATION CODE BY DELETING SR-223 THE SPORTS PARK ROAD AND THE BEAR HOLLOW ROAD

FROM THE STATE HIGHWAY SYSTEM, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

SALES AND USE TAX – EXEMPTION FOR SEMICONDUCTOR FABRICATING OR PROCESSING MATERIALS

S.B. 17 Curtis S. Bramble

THIS ACT AMENDS THE SALES AND USE TAX ACT TO EXTEND THROUGH JUNE 30, 2007 THE EXEMPTION FOR A SALE OR LEASE OF SEMICONDUCTOR FABRICATING OR PROCESSING MATERIALS, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR CERTIFICATION OF SPECIAL DISTRICT AND LOCAL DISTRICT ANNEXATIONS, WITHDRAWALS, AND DISSOLUTIONS

S.B. 18 David L. Gladwell

THIS ACT MODIFIES SPECIAL DISTRICT AND LOCAL DISTRICT PROVISIONS TO PROVIDE A PROCEDURE FOR LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR CERTIFICATION OF ANNEXATIONS, WITHDRAWALS, AND DISSOLUTIONS FOR CERTAIN SPECIAL DISTRICTS AND FOR LOCAL DISTRICTS. THE ACT REQUIRES THE APPROPRIATE LOCAL BODY TO SEND NOTICE OF THE ANNEXATION, WITHDRAWAL, OR DISSOLUTION TO THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR AND REQUIRES THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR TO ISSUE A CERTIFICATE OF ANNEXATION, WITHDRAWAL, OR DISSOLUTION AND TO SEND A COPY OF THE APPLICABLE CERTIFICATE TO SPECIFIED STATE AND LOCAL AGENCIES. THE ACT ALSO MAKES TECHNICAL CHANGES, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

VEHICLE HISTORY INFORMATION

S.B. 19 Dan R. Eastman

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE MOTOR VEHICLE CODE BY ALLOWING THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY TO DISCLOSE VEHICLE ACCIDENT HISTORY INFORMATION, EXCLUDING PERSONAL IDENTIFYING INFORMATION, IN BULK ELECTRONIC FORM, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

FACILITATION OF E-GOVERNMENT

S.B. 20 David H. Steele

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE UNIFORM ELECTRONIC TRANSACTIONS ACT AND CONSTRUCTION STATUTES TO FACILITATE GOVERNMENT

AGENCIES PROVIDING SERVICES ELECTRONICALLY AND TO MAKE TECHNICAL CHANGES, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

AMENDMENTS TO THE INTERLOCAL COOPERATION ACT

S.B. 21 Leonard M. Blackham

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE INTERLOCAL COOPERATION ACT INCLUDING MAKING TECHNICAL CHANGES. THE ACT ADDS DEFINITIONS AND MODIFIES PROVISIONS RELATED TO PROJECT ENTITY AND GENERATION OUTPUT REQUIREMENTS. FOR PURPOSES OF THE PAYMENT OF FEE IN LIEU OF AD VALOREM PROPERTY TAX, THIS ACT PROVIDES THAT A FEE BASE FOR A PROJECT CAN BE DETERMINED BY AGREEMENT. THIS ACT PROVIDES FOR VALUATION BY THE STATE TAX COMMISSION IF A FEE BASE IS NOT DETERMINED BY AN AGREEMENT, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

TELECOMMUNICATIONS RELATED TAXES, FEES, AND CHARGES

S.B. 22 Curtis S. Bramble

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE SALES AND USE TAX ACT TO EXPAND WHAT TELEPHONE SERVICES ARE SUBJECT TO THE SALES AND USE TAX AND TO PROVIDE AN EXEMPTION FROM SALES AND USE TAXES UNDER SPECIFIED CIRCUMSTANCES FOR CERTAIN TELEPHONE SERVICES USED BY CALL CENTERS AND FOR PURCHASES OF MACHINERY OR EOUIPMENT PRIMARILY USED TO PROVIDE TELEPHONE SERVICES TO THE GENERAL PUBLIC. THIS ACT PROVIDES FOR DIVERSION OF SALES AND USE TAXES AS DEDICATED CREDITS TO BE USED TO FUND THE POISON CONTROL CENTER. THIS ACT ADDRESSES HOW BUNDLED TRANSACTIONS ARE TAXED UNDER THE SALES AND USE TAX ACT. THE ACT ADDRESSES CUSTOMER REMEDIES FOR OVER-PAYMENT OF SALES AND USE TAXES. THIS ACT MODIFIES THE PUBLIC UTILITIES TITLE TO ELIMINATE THE SURCHARGE FOR TELECOMMUNICATION DEVICES ASSISTING HEARING OR SPEECH IMPAIRED PERSONS. THIS ACT REPEALS THE EMERGENCY SERVICES TELEPHONE CHARGE THAT FUNDS THE POISON CONTROL CENTER. THIS ACT MAKES TECHNICAL CHANGES. THE ACT TAKES EFFECT ON JULY 1, 2003, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

STATE AND LOCAL TAXES, FEES, AND CHARGES RELATED TO TELECOMMUNICATIONS

S.B. 23 Curtis S. Bramble

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE UTAH MUNICIPAL CODE TO ENACT THE MUNICIPAL TELECOMMUNICATIONS LICENSE TAX ACT AND TO MAKE TECHNICAL CHANGES. AS ENACTED. THE MUNICIPAL TELECOMMUNICATIONS LICENSE TAX ACT AUTHORIZES MUNICIPALITY TO LEVY AND COLLECT MUNICIPAL Α TELECOMMUNICATIONS LICENSE TAX BY ORDINANCE. THE ACT THE COLLECTION. ADMINISTRATION. THIS ACT PROVIDES FOR REPORTING OF TAX RATE RELATED INFORMATION. THIS ACT ADDRESSES CUSTOMER REMEDIES. THE ACT ADDRESSES HOW BUNDLED TRANSACTIONS ARE TAXED UNDER THE MUNICIPAL TELECOMMUNICATIONS LICENSE TAX ACT. THIS ACT ADDRESSES RIGHTS-OF-WAY PROVISIONS. THIS ACT MODIFIES PROVISIONS RELATED TO THE CHARGE THAT MAY BE IMPOSED FOR EMERGENCY TELEPHONE SERVICES. THIS ACT ADDRESSES HOW THE LOCATION OF A TRANSACTION FOR TELEPHONE SERVICE AND MOBILE TELECOMMUNICATIONS SERVICE IS DETERMINED UNDER THE SALES AND USE TAX ACT. THIS ACT PROVIDES AN EFFECTIVE DATE. was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

LOCAL HUMAN SERVICES AUTHORITIES AMENDMENTS

S.B. 24 Scott K. Jenkins

THIS ACT MODIFIES PROVISIONS RELATING TO LOCAL SUBSTANCE ABUSE AUTHORITIES AND LOCAL MENTAL HEALTH AUTHORITIES. THE ACT RENUMBERS THOSE PROVISIONS AND MAKES TECHNICAL CHANGES, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

COMMITMENT AND CUSTODY OF ADULTS AND MINORS AMENDMENTS

S.B. 25 Scott K. Jenkins

THIS ACT MODIFIES PROVISIONS OF THE UTAH HUMAN SERVICES CODE RELATING TO COMMITMENT PROCEEDINGS. THE ACT

CLARIFIES THE CIRCUMSTANCES UNDER WHICH PROCEEDINGS FOR THE COMMITMENT OF A CHILD MAY BE COMMENCED. THE ACT PROVISIONS RELATING TO THE **INVOLUNTARY** COMMITMENT OF ADULTS AND CHILDREN AND SPECIFIES THAT THEY MAY BE COMMITTED TO LOCAL MENTAL HEALTH AUTHORITIES ONLY AFTER A COURT COMMITMENT PROCEEDING. THE ACT ELIMINATES PROVISIONS RELATING TO THE COMMITMENT OF A CHILD TO THE LEGAL CUSTODY OF THE DIVISION OF SUBSTANCE ABUSE AND MENTAL HEALTH AND CLARIFIES THAT CERTAIN COMMITMENT PROCEEDINGS APPLY TO THE COMMITMENT OF A CHILD TO THE PHYSICAL CUSTODY OF LOCAL MENTAL HEALTH AUTHORITIES. THE ACT CLARIFIES THAT A COURT DETERMINATION IS NECESSARY FOR A PERSON TO BE COMMITTED TO THE STATE HOSPITAL. THE ACT MAKES TECHNICAL AND CONFORMING CHANGES, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

SUNSET ACT REAUTHORIZATIONS

S.B. 26 Patrice M. Arent

THIS ACT REAUTHORIZES CERTAIN STATE ENTITIES AND PROGRAMS THAT WOULD OTHERWISE SUNSET BEFORE THE 2004 ANNUAL GENERAL SESSION OF THE UTAH LEGISLATURE, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

INVOLUNTARY COMMITMENT AMENDMENTS

S.B. 27 Leonard M. Blackham

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE PROCESS BY WHICH ADULTS ARE INVOLUNTARILY COMMITTED TO MENTAL HEALTH PROGRAMS. IT ELIMINATES THE "IMMEDIATE DANGER" STANDARD AND PROVIDES FOR A "SUBSTANTIAL DANGER" STANDARD FOR THE PURPOSES OF INVOLUNTARY COMMITMENT, DEFINES SUBSTANTIAL DANGER, SHORTENS THE TIME PERIOD BEFORE A HEARING WHEN A PERSON IS BEING DETAINED PENDING A HEARING, AND REQUIRES A REPORT TO THE HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES INTERIM COMMITTEE. IT ALSO MODIFIES THE DEFINITION OF MENTAL ILLNESS, LIMITS THE NEW DEFINITION SOLELY TO INVOLUNTARY COMMITMENTS, AND REQUIRES EXAMINERS TO INFORM PATIENTS OF SPECIFIC RIGHTS, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

INITIATIVE AMENDMENTS

S.B. 28 John W. Hickman

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE ELECTION CODE PROVISIONS RELATING TO STATEWIDE INITIATIVES. THIS ACT MODIFIES SIGNATURE REQUIREMENTS, MODIFIES CERTAIN DISCLOSURE REQUIREMENTS, AND MODIFIES THE TIME PERIOD DURING WHICH SPONSORS MAY GATHER SIGNATURES. THIS ACT ESTABLISHES A MORATORIUM BEFORE AN INITIATIVE THAT FAILED MAY BE RECIRCULATED. THIS ACT MODIFIES THE INITIATIVE PETITION FORM TO REQUIRE CERTAIN DISCLOSURES AND CERTIFICATIONS ON THE PETITION AND SIGNATURE SHEETS. THIS ACT REQUIRES THAT THE PETITION SPONSORS HOLD PUBLIC HEARINGS ON THE PETITION IN GEOGRAPHICALLY DIVERSE AREAS OF UTAH AND ESTABLISHES NOTICE AND PROCEDURAL REQUIREMENTS FOR THOSE PUBLIC HEARINGS. THIS ACT MODIFIES POLITICAL ISSUES COMMITTEE AND CORPORATION FINANCIAL DISCLOSURE REQUIREMENTS. THIS ACT MAKES IT A CRIME FOR PERSONS TO PAY SOMEONE TO SIGN OR REMOVE THEIR SIGNATURE FROM AN INITIATIVE PETITION AND MAKES IT A CRIME FOR PERSONS TO ACCEPT PAYMENT FOR SIGNING OR REMOVING THEIR NAME FROM AN INITIATIVE PETITION. THIS ACT INCLUDES A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE. THIS ACT MAKES TECHNICAL CHANGES, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

DRIVER EDUCATION COURSES

S.B. 32 Carlene M. Walker

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE STATE SYSTEM OF PUBLIC EDUCATION BY REQUIRING SCHOOL DISTRICTS TO FUND DRIVER EDUCATION PROGRAMS SOLELY THROUGH THE AUTOMOBILE DRIVER EDUCATION TAX ACCOUNT AND STUDENT FEES, EXCLUDING THE FULL—TIME EQUIVALENT COST OF A TEACHER WHEN THE PROGRAM IS TAUGHT DURING REGULAR SCHOOL HOURS. THIS ACT ALSO REQUIRES SCHOOL DISTRICTS TO ESTABLISH STUDENT FEES THAT ARE REASONABLY ASSOCIATED WITH THE COSTS OF DRIVER EDUCATION PROGRAMS. THIS ACT ALLOWS SCHOOL DISTRICTS TO BE REIMBURSED BY THE AUTOMOBILE DRIVER EDUCATION ACCOUNT FOR THE COSTS OF FEES WAIVED FOR THE DRIVER EDUCATION PROGRAM. THIS ACT ALLOWS A SCHOOL DISTRICT TO PROVIDE THE CLASSROOM PORTION OF DRIVER EDUCATION

THROUGH HOME STUDY OR THROUGH THE ELECTRONIC HIGH SCHOOL AND ALLOWS THE SCHOOLS TO PROVIDE MATERIAL FOR PARENT INVOLVEMENT IN DRIVER EDUCATION. THIS ACT ALLOWS A SCHOOL DISTRICT TO OFFER THE CLASSROOM PORTION OF DRIVER EDUCATION AND THE BEHIND-THE-WHEEL PORTION TO BE OFFERED BY PRIVATE PROVIDERS. THIS ACT REQUIRES THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO ESTABLISH MINIMUM STANDARDS FOR SCHOOL-RELATED DRIVER EDUCATION PROGRAMS. THIS ACT TAKES EFFECT ON JULY 1, 2003, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

FEES FOR SHERIFF

S.B. 33 Mike Dmitrich

THIS ACT MODIFIES PROVISIONS RELATING TO COUNTIES TO INCREASE THE AMOUNT OF FEES THAT A SHERIFF RECEIVES FOR THE PERFORMANCE OF CERTAIN DUTIES AND SERVICES, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

TUITION TAX CREDITS

S.B. 34 D. Chris Buttars

THIS ACT MODIFIES CORPORATE FRANCHISE AND INCOME TAXES AND THE INDIVIDUAL INCOME TAX ACT TO PROVIDE FOR NONREFUNDABLE TAX CREDITS FOR CONTRIBUTIONS MADE TO A SCHOLARSHIP GRANTING ORGANIZATION TO BE USED FOR TUITION GRANTS FOR A QUALIFYING STUDENT TO ATTEND A PRIVATE SCHOOL, OR NONREFUNDABLE TAX CREDITS FOR AMOUNTS PAID FOR TUITION TO A PRIVATE SCHOOL ON BEHALF OF A QUALIFYING STUDENT. THE ACT PROVIDES DEFINITIONS AND ESTABLISHES PROCEDURES AND REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMINISTERING THE TAX CREDITS. THE ACT ESTABLISHES DUTIES OF SCHOLARSHIP GRANTING ORGANIZATIONS AND PROVIDES PENALTIES. THE ACT AUTHORIZES THE STATE TAX COMMISSION TO MAKE RULES. THIS ACT AUTHORIZES THE DIVISION OF CONSUMER PROTECTION TO ENFORCE CERTAIN PRIVATE SCHOOL REQUIREMENTS. THIS ACT HAS RETROSPECTIVE OPERATION FOR TAXABLE YEARS BEGINNING ON OR AFTER JANUARY 1, 2003, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

REDEVELOPMENT OF SUPERFUND SITES

S.B. 35

D. Chris Buttars

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE REDEVELOPMENT AGENCIES ACT. THE ACT EXPANDS THE CRITERIA FOR BLIGHT TO INCLUDE A SUPERFUND SITE. THE ACT MAKES AN EXCEPTION TO A SIZE RESTRICTION ON PROJECT AREAS FOR THE CASE OF A SUPERFUND SITE. THE ACT AUTHORIZES THE USE OF TAX INCREMENT FUNDS FOR A SUPERFUND SITE WITHOUT TAXING ENTITY APPROVAL, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

MINERAL LEASE FUND AMENDMENTS

S.B. 36 Beverly Ann Evans

THIS ACT MODIFIES PROVISIONS ON MINERAL LEASE FUNDS. THE ACT EXPANDS THE PUBLIC ENTITIES THAT MAY RECEIVE MONIES FROM THE MINERAL LEASE ACCOUNT TO INCLUDE PUBLIC INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

TASK FORCE STUDY OF IMPACT OF GRAVEL PITS

S.B. 37 Peter C. Knudson

THIS ACT CREATES A TASK FORCE TO STUDY THE OPERATIONS OF GRAVEL PITS IN THE STATE AND THEIR IMPACT ON THE SURROUNDING ENVIRONMENT AND INFRASTRUCTURE. THE ACT ESTABLISHES THE MEMBERSHIP OF THE TASK FORCE AND PROVIDES FOR COMPENSATION OF LEGISLATIVE MEMBERS. THE ACT PROVIDES FOR THE DUTIES OF THE TASK FORCE. THE ACT MAKES A ONE–TIME APPROPRIATION OF \$29,500 FROM THE GENERAL FUND FOR FISCAL YEAR 2002–03 TO PAY FOR TASK FORCE EXPENSES. THE ACT PROVIDES A REPEAL DATE, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

CHILD ACCESS TO FIREARM PREVENTION AMENDMENTS

S.B. 38 Paula F. Julander

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE UTAH CRIMINAL CODE. THE ACT CREATES A CRIME FOR NEGLIGENT STORAGE OF A FIREARM WITH EXCEPTIONS. THE ACT REQUIRES A LICENSED FIREARM DEALER TO

PROVIDE WRITTEN WARNING OF POSSIBLE PROSECUTION AND CIVIL SUIT FOR NEGLIGENT STORAGE OF A FIREARM AND PROVIDES A CRIMINAL PENALTY TO DEALERS WHO VIOLATE THIS REQUIREMENT. THE ACT CREATES A CIVIL CAUSE OF ACTION FOR NEGLIGENT STORAGE OF A FIREARM. THE ACT DEFINES TERMS. THE ACT PROVIDES DISCRETION FOR A PROSECUTOR AND AN ARRESTING OFFICER. THE ACT ESTABLISHES A DAMAGE CAP AND PROVIDES A STATUTE OF LIMITATION, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

AMENDMENTS TO THE UTAH ANTIDISCRIMINATION ACT

S.B. 39 *Ed P. Mayne*

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE UTAH ANTIDISCRIMINATION ACT TO CLARIFY THAT A PERSON EMPLOYING SIX OR MORE EMPLOYEES MAY NOT DISCRIMINATE UNDER THE UTAH ANTIDISCRIMINATION ACT, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

PAY PLAN - SALARY SURVEY AMENDMENTS

S.B. 40 Mike Dmitrich

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE PERSONNEL MANAGEMENT ACT BY ELIMINATING THE REQUIREMENT THAT SALARY SURVEYS FOR PEACE OFFICERS, CORRECTIONAL OFFICERS, AND PUBLIC SAFETY DISPATCH PERSONNEL INCLUDE A SURVEY OF BENEFITS. THIS ACT ALSO ELIMINATES THE REQUIREMENT THAT THE DIRECTOR CONSIDER INTERNAL COMPARISONS AND OTHER FACTORS WHEN DETERMINING COMPENSATION. THIS ACT TAKES EFFECT JANUARY 1, 2004, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

CLANDESTINE LAB RACKETEERING AMENDMENT

S.B. 41 Patrice M. Arent

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE CRIMINAL CODE BY INCLUDING CLANDESTINE DRUG LAB ACT OFFENSES AS UNLAWFUL ACTIVITY WHEN DETERMINING A PATTERN OF UNLAWFUL ACTIVITY UNDER THE STATE'S RACKETEERING PROVISIONS, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

FRAUDULENT USE OF CREDIT CARD NUMBER

S.B. 42 Carlene M. Walker

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE CRIMINAL CODE BY PROVIDING THAT POSSESSION OF A FINANCIAL TRANSACTION CARD NUMBER OR

RELATED INFORMATION WITH THE INTENT TO DEFRAUD IS A THIRD DEGREE FELONY. THIS ACT ALSO PROVIDES THAT A PERSON WHO OBTAINS THE ENCODED INFORMATION FROM THE STRIP ON A FINANCIAL TRANSACTION CARD WITH THE INTENT TO USE THE INFORMATION TO DEFRAUD A MERCHANT IS GUILTY OF A THIRD DEGREE FELONY, AND THAT ANY SUBSEQUENT VIOLATION IS A SECOND DEGREE FELONY, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

PROVIDING INFORMATION RELATING TO TAX CREDITS AND TAX FILING DUE DATES

S.B. 43 David H. Steele

THIS ACT MODIFIES TARGETED BUSINESS INCOME TAX CREDITS WITHIN AN ENTERPRISE ZONE, CORPORATE FRANCHISE AND INCOME TAXES, AND THE INDIVIDUAL INCOME TAX ACT TO MODIFY THE REQUIREMENTS FOR PROVIDING INFORMATION TO THE STATE TAX COMMISSION WHEN A TAXPAYER CLAIMS A TAX CREDIT. THE ACT MODIFIES THE INFORMATION THAT CERTAIN ENTITIES ARE REQUIRED TO PROVIDE TO TAXPAYERS CLAIMING CERTAIN TAX CREDITS AND THE REQUIREMENTS FOR PROVIDING THIS INFORMATION. THE ACT HAS RETROSPECTIVE OPERATION FOR TAXABLE YEARS BEGINNING ON OR AFTER JANUARY 1, 2003, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

TORT REFORM AMENDMENTS

S.B. 44 Leonard M. Blackham

THIS ACT ENACTS A PROVISION PROVIDING FOR THE AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE OF ASSUMPTION OF RISK IN TORT ACTIONS, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

LOBBYIST REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

S.B. 45 Patrice M. Arent

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE LOBBYIST REGULATION AND DISCLOSURE ACT BY CLARIFYING REQUIREMENTS FOR LOBBYIST AND PRINCIPAL REPORTING WHEN A PERSON OR ENTITY CEASES TO BE A LOBBYIST OR PRINCIPAL, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

RESIDENTIAL PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTIONS

S.B. 46 *Ed P. Mayne*

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE PROPERTY TAX ACT TO PROVIDE DEFINITIONS. TO PROVIDE FOR AN EXEMPTION FROM TAXATION OF A PORTION OF THE FAIR MARKET VALUE OF A QUALIFYING SECONDARY RESIDENCE. AND TO CLARIFY THE EXEMPTION FROM TAXATION OF A PORTION OF THE FAIR MARKET VALUE OF A PRIMARY ACT ESTABLISHES PROCEDURES RESIDENCE. THE REOUIREMENTS FOR CLAIMING AN EXEMPTION FOR A OUALIFYING SECONDARY RESIDENCE. THIS ACT REOUIRES THE STATE TAX COMMISSION TO MAKE DISTRIBUTIONS FROM THE GENERAL FUND TO COUNTIES FOR THE AMOUNT OF EXEMPTIONS CLAIMED FOR OUALIFYING SECONDARY RESIDENCES AND ESTABLISHES PROCEDURES FOR MAKING SUCH DISTRIBUTIONS. THIS ACT MAKES TECHNICAL CHANGES, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

LABOR COMMISSION – APPEALS BOARD

S.B. 47 John L. Valentine

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE UTAH LABOR CODE TO PROVIDE FOR TEMPORARY APPOINTMENTS TO THE APPEALS BOARD IN CASES WHERE THERE IS A VACANCY ON THE APPEALS BOARD. THIS ACT MAKES TECHNICAL CHANGES, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

REPEAL OF TRADING STAMPS REGULATION

S.B. 78 Scott K. Jenkins

THIS ACT REPEALS CODE PROVISIONS RELATING TO THE REGULATION OF TRADING STAMPS. THE ACT REPEALS PROVISIONS REQUIRING PERSONS IN THE BUSINESS OF TRADING STAMPS TO ESTABLISH AN OFFICE IN UTAH, APPOINT A PROCESS ATTORNEY FOR CIVIL ACTIONS, AND POST A BOND. THE ACT REPEALS PROVISIONS REQUIRING TRADING STAMPS TO DISPLAY THEIR REDEEMABLE VALUE, AND REPEALS PROVISIONS PROVIDING GUIDELINES FOR THE REDEMPTION OF TRADING STAMPS. , was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

DISABLED PARKING FINE

S.B. 79 D. Chris Buttars

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE MOTOR VEHICLE CODE BY INCREASING THE FINE FOR PARKING IN A DISABILITY PARKING ZONE FROM \$100 TO \$200 AND FOR PARKING IN A SCHOOL BUS PARKING ZONE FROM \$50 TO \$100, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

ADVERSE BENEFIT DETERMINATION AMENDMENTS

S.B. 80 Peter C. Knudson

THIS ACT AMENDS THE INSURANCE CODE. THE ACT AMENDS THE ADVERSE BENEFIT DETERMINATION REVIEW PROCESS FOR GROUP HEALTH PLANS TO INCLUDE INDIVIDUAL OR GROUP HEALTH PLANS AND INCOME REPLACEMENT OR DISABILITY INCOME POLICIES, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

PUBLIC SAFETY RETIREMENT AMENDMENTS

S.B. 81 Mike Dmitrich

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE UTAH STATE RETIREMENT AND INSURANCE BENEFIT ACT BY INCREASING THE COST-OF-LIVING ALLOWANCE FOR MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC SAFETY RETIREMENT SYSTEMS. THIS ACT TAKES EFFECT ON JULY 1, 2003, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

AUTHORIZED OVERSPENDING LIMIT IN FEDERAL MEDICAID BUDGET

S.B. 82 Beverly Ann Evans

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE EMPLOYMENT SUPPORT ACT BY GRANTING AUTHORITY TO THE GOVERNOR TO SUPPLEMENT THE ANNUAL APPROPRIATION FOR MEDICAL BENEFITS OR PUBLIC ASSISTANCE, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

OCCUPATIONAL AND PROFESSIONAL LICENSING MODIFICATIONS

S.B. 83 Lyle W. Hillyard

THIS ACT MODIFIES PROVISIONS OF THE DIVISION OF OCCUPATIONAL AND PROFESSIONAL LICENSING ACT RELATED TO

REINSTATEMENT OF LICENSES AND DIVERSION PROCEDURES. THE ACT PROVIDES THAT FOR LICENSES REINSTATED NO LATER THAN 120 DAYS AFTER EXPIRATION THE REINSTATEMENT GOES BACK TO THE DATE OF EXPIRATION. THE ACT ESTABLISHES A PROCEDURE TO BE FOLLOWED BY THE DIVISION IN **EVENT** LICENSEE MAKES AN THE INTENTIONAL MISREPRESENTATION OF FACT IN THE STIPULATION OF FACTS PART OF THE DIVERSION AGREEMENT, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

REAL PROPERTY VOLUNTARY ENVIRONMENTAL RESTRICTIVE COVENANTS

S.B. 84 Bill Wright

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY CODE BY CREATING A NEW CHAPTER, "ENVIRONMENTAL INSTITUTIONAL CONTROL ACT." THE ACT ALLOWS FOR CREATION OF ENVIRONMENTAL INSTITUTIONAL CONTROLS WHICH LIMIT OR OTHERWISE AFFECT THE USE OF REAL PROPERTY WHICH HAS BEEN AFFECTED BY A CLEANUP OR RISK ASSESSMENT. THE ACT INCLUDES PROCEDURES FOR ESTABLISHMENT AND ENFORCEMENT OF THE INSTITUTIONAL CONTROLS, REMOVAL OF THE CONTROLS, AND APPEAL OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S DECISION REGARDING THE CONTROLS, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

UNDERGROUND STORAGE TANK AMENDMENT

S.B. 85 Bill Wright

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE UNDERGROUND STORAGE TANK ACT BY INCREASING THE ENVIRONMENTAL ASSURANCE FEE OF 1/4 CENT PER GALLON ON THE FIRST SALE OR USE OF PETROLEUM PRODUCTS TO 1/2 CENT PER GALLON. THE ACT PROVIDES FOR A REDUCTION OF THE FEE WHEN THE CASH BALANCE IN THE PETROLEUM STORAGE TANK TRUST FUND EXCEEDS \$20,000,000 IN ANY YEAR, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

PROHIBITION OF AUTOMATIC RENEWAL OF SERVICE CONTRACTS

S.B. 86 Michael G. Waddoups

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE TITLE DEALING WITH CONTRACTS AND OBLIGATIONS IN GENERAL BY ENACTING PROVISIONS THAT PROHIBIT THE AUTOMATIC RENEWAL OF SERVICE CONTRACTS UNLESS THE SELLER NOTIFIES THE CONSUMER OF THE AUTOMATIC RENEWAL., was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

LIBRARY AMENDMENTS

S.B. 87 Michael G. Waddoups

THIS ACT MODIFIES PROVISIONS RELATED TO COUNTY LIBRARIES BY MAKING THE LIBRARY BOARD OF DIRECTORS AN ADVISORY BODY AND RESTRUCTURING ITS DUTIES. THIS ACT SHIFTS THE TRUSTEESHIP OF DONATIONS FOR THE BENEFIT OF A LIBRARY FROM THE LIBRARY BOARD TO THE COUNTY LEGISLATIVE BODY, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

SECURITY PERSONNEL LICENSING ACT AMENDMENTS

S.B. 88 Dan R. Eastman

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE SECURITY PERSONNEL LICENSING ACT BY CREATING A SECURITY PERSONNEL LICENSING EDUCATION AND ENFORCEMENT FUND TO EDUCATE AND TRAIN LICENSEES AND THE GENERAL PUBLIC AND TO HELP ENFORCE THE PROVISIONS OF THE LICENSING ACT. MENTAL HEALTH PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE ACT AMENDMENTS

S.B. 89 D. Chris Buttars

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE MENTAL HEALTH PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE ACT BY ESTABLISHING QUALIFICATIONS FOR CLINICAL

WORKER SUPERVISORS, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

PRESCRIPTIVE PRACTICE PEER COMMITTEE REPEALER

S.B. 90 Paula F. Julander

THIS ACT REPEALS THE PRESCRIPTIVE PRACTICE PEER COMMITTEE, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

FUNERAL SERVICES AMENDMENTS

S.B. 91 David L. Gladwell

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE OCCUPATIONS AND PROFESSIONS CODE BY REPEALING THE FUNERAL SERVICES LICENSING ACT AND THE PRENEED FUNERAL ARRANGEMENT ACT. THE ACT ENACTS THE PROVISIONS OF THOSE TWO ACTS AS THE FUNERAL SERVICES ACT. THE ACT ALTERS THE MEMBERSHIP OF THE BOARD OF FUNERAL THE ACT ELIMINATES THE PRENEED FUNERAL ARRANGEMENT LICENSING BOARD AND TRANSFERS THE DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES TO THE BOARD OF FUNERAL SERVICE. THE ACT ENACTS PROVISIONS PROHIBITING A CONVICTED FELON FROM HOLDING CERTAIN LICENSES. THE ACT ENACTS ENDORSEMENT REOUIREMENTS FOR INDIVIDUALS LICENSED IN ANOTHER JURISDICTION. THE ACT ENACTS PROVISIONS PROHIBITING SOLICITATION OF FUNERAL SERVICES OR MERCHANDISE AFTER A PERSON'S DEATH. THE ACT ESTABLISHES CRIMINAL PENALTIES FOR CERTAIN VIOLATIONS. THE ACT ENACTS PROVISIONS DEALING WITH THE RIGHT AND DUTY TO CONTROL THE DISPOSITION OF A DECEASED PERSON, AND PROVIDES IMMUNITY TO FUNERAL SERVICE DIRECTORS WHO CONTROL THE DISPOSITION OF A DECEASED PERSON UNDER SOME CIRCUMSTANCES. THE ACT MAKES TECHNICAL CHANGES, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

LAND SURVEYOR AMENDMENTS

S.B. 92

Howard A. Stephenson

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE PROFESSIONAL ENGINEERS AND LAND SURVEYORS LICENSING ACT BY SUNSETTING THE OPTION OF PERSONS SEEKING LICENSURE AS PROFESSIONAL LAND SURVEYORS TO SUBSTITUTE A PROGRAM OF QUALIFYING

EXPERIENCE FOR THE EDUCATIONAL REQUIREMENT. THE ACT ALSO MAKES TECHNICAL CHANGES, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

REAPPOINTMENT OF COUNTY JUSTICE COURT JUDGES

S.B. 93 Thomas V. Hatch

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE JUDICIAL CODE AS IT PERTAINS TO COUNTY JUSTICE COURT JUDGES. IT ELIMINATES THE RETENTION ELECTION FOR COUNTY JUSTICE COURT JUDGES AND REQUIRES THEIR REAPPOINTMENT BY THE COUNTY LEGISLATIVE BODY, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

ALLOWING SPECIFIED STATE AGENCIES TO PARTICIPATE IN CERTAIN MEETINGS. THIS ACT REPEALS THE STATE NATIVE AMERICAN COORDINATING BOARD. THIS ACT MAKES TECHNICAL CHANGES, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

PROCUREMENT CODE REQUIREMENTS OF HEALTH CARE BENEFITS

S.B. 101 *Ed P. Mayne*

REMARKS BY ROSS PETERSON PROFESSOR EMERITUS UTAH STATE UNIVERSITY

Mr. President Mansell, Members of the Senate and friends, it is a privilege and an honor to represent Utah's Martin Luther King Commission on this national holiday. We are here to commemorate the life and legacy of Martin Luther King, Jr. We are not here in grief or in sorrow, but are here to rejoice in the fact that Dr. King lived in this nation and led a movement that changed the fabric of American life.

His journey from the Montgomery, Alabama, bus boycott in 1955 to his assassination at Memphis in 1968 is just thirteen short years, a mere dot on history's time line. Yet as he preached and marched and talked and walked across this great nation from South to North and East to West, Martin Luther King, Jr. became both the symbol and the conscience of an era. Utilizing the philosophy of non–violent resistance to injustice and direct confrontation with inequality, he dramatized the reality that the lofty ideals of Thomas Jefferson's Declaration of Independence and Abraham Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation had not yet been fulfilled for many Americans.

He lived and led when people really cared. Individuals of all races and religions were willing to walk together, pray together, go to jail together, and yes, even die together. We honor King today because his message is universal and timeless. He encouraged us to be better and taught that every individual has value regardless of religion, color, age, sex, or physical infirmity. In 1963 from a dank Birmingham, Alabama, jail cell he wrote, "I am cognizant of the interrelatedness of all communities and states. Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere. We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly, affects all indirectly. Anyone who lives in the United States can never be considered an outsider anywhere in this country."

King practiced what M. Russell Ballard has called the "Doctrine of Inclusion." Ballard wrote that, "Of all people, we should be the most loving, the kindest, the most tolerant." King and Ballard both admonished all citizens to be kind to one another despite our deepest differences. Treat one another with respect and civility. As Gordon B. Hinckley admonished, "Each of us in an individual; each of us is different. There must be respect for those differences. We cannot afford to exclude anyone because we, all of us, are literally tied together in a single garment of destiny." The Rev. France David prayed, "In unity we find strength and courage and hope."

Consequently, members of Congress or a Legislature represent not only those who voted for them or members of their own political party, but they represent all citizens. Their actions and their laws can benefit everyone in a society. That is why King and others fought so diligently for the nonpartisan Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the nonpartisan Voting Rights Act and Poll Tax Amendment of 1965. When Martin Luther King, Jr. lobbied for those legislative measures at the Lincoln Memorial, he reminded us that bigotry and discrimination cripple the bigot and the oppressor as much as they do the oppressed.. None can stand tall until injustice is banished from our land and from our laws.

King's legacy goes beyond civil and human rights. He symbolized a time when opportunity became a reality and stopped being just a dream. He lived and taught and fought and died for the principle that everyone deserves a chance. We, like Martin Luther King, Jr., cannot remain satisfied as long as persecution or hate and crimes exist. As King said shortly before his death, "Let us be dissatisfied until we will no longer have a high blood pressure of creeds and an anemia of deeds. Let us be dissatisfied until the tragic walls that separate the outer city of wealth and comfort and the inner city of poverty and despair shall be caused by the battering rams of the forces of justice."

King encouraged us also, to recognize the achievements of courage and victories. He would be satisfied that we can have the opportunity of high quality,

discrimination—free education. He would be satisfied that we, today, view integration as an opportunity to participate in the beauty of diversity and the reality of inclusion. He would be satisfied that men, women, and children, however black, brown, red, yellow, or white, are judged by the content of their character and not the color of their skin. Martin Luther King, Jr. would also encourage us to be vigilant as we press forward.

I must confess, my friends, that the road ahead will not always be smooth. This attempt to expand the meaning of our Constitution's preamble, "We the People," can be bumpy. It requires great courage. There will be rocky places of frustration, meandering points of bewilderment. There will be setbacks. There will be despair, but there will always be hope. We cannot let the dream die.

Let this affirmation be our ringing cry. It will give us the courage to face the uncertainties of the future. It will give our tired feet new strength as we continue our stride toward freedom. Let us remember how many miles King marched, how many times he went to jail, how many times he drank from the well of bitterness. And yet he said, shortly before his death, "This is the hope for the future and with this faith we will be able to sing in some not too distant tomorrow with a cosmic past tense a past tense. We did over come. We did overcome. Deep in our hearts we knew that we would overcome someday."

It is my hope, my plea, my dream and my prayer that we, as citizens of Utah, whether in this very Capitol building, wherever we might be, will practice the doctrine of inclusion, that we will be fair and open and honest as we discuss the issues of our day. We can live and legislate so that Martin Luther King, Jr. did not live or die in vain. We can live together and work together to create a society where we are dedicated to the proposition that all of us are created equal and that "We the People" means all the people. It is inclusive. We as a State and a Nation, pay homage to Dr. King because his dream became the dream for a generation. We long for the day when all of God's children of all backgrounds can join together and fulfill our destinies as citizens of Utah and the United States of America.

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

On motion of Senator Waddoups, Chief Justice Christine M. Durham spoke in Committee of the Whole. Senator Stephenson commented.

STATE OF THE JUDICIARY CHIEF JUSTICE CHRISTINE M. DURHAM

President Mansell, Members of the Senate, thank you for the invitation to speak to you today.

Although I have served as a judge for almost 25 years, I am new to the responsibilities of being the Chief Justice, and this is my first opportunity to speak to you in this setting. If you will indulge me for a moment, I would like to introduce myself. When we were still undergraduates in college, I married a man with the Wasatch mountains "in his bones," as he likes to say, and we came to Salt Lake City after graduate school in 1973 to settle and raise our family. George, who is a pediatrician, concedes that 30 years is probably enough to eradicate the taint of my having been born in California. We have raised five children in this community, including one with special needs, all of whom are products of our public education system, and all of whom love the mountains. I have treasured the opportunity to serve on the Utah Supreme Court since 1982, after four years on the trial bench. I recently learned that one of my great–great grandfathers, Heber C. Kimball, was elected Chief Justice of the provisional Supreme Court contemplated by Utah's pioneers in 1849, although my research has not disclosed whether he ever actually served. Nonetheless, that connection to the history of the court has made the opportunity to serve as Chief Justice even more meaningful for me.

I am completely passionate about my job, about the Utah court system, and about the administration of justice and the rule of law. I have enormous respect for our scheme of government, and for the people who serve in it. During the past few months I have been visiting each of the judicial districts in the state, to have lunch and conversation with many of you and the trial judges in your districts. From each meeting I have carried away a strong sense of the dedication and concern of the people who serve in our courts and in this body. While we do our work in very different spheres, we share a commitment to the welfare of the people of our state.

The single most significant challenge facing Utah's court system, like all of state government, lies in maintaining the trust and confidence of the public we serve. Like other government institutions, we in the courts can no longer take for granted the understanding of and respect for our constitutional role that was a "given" in past eras. It is no longer sufficient merely to do our work; increasingly we must find ways to make the courts more accessible, more responsive, and more understandable, while at the same time preserving the core values and tasks that are our constitutional responsibility. Furthermore, I believe, we have obligations to explain those responsibilities to the public, to support and enhance public and community education about the role of the judicial branch and the significance of the rule of law. That is one reason I have been so supportive of restoring the place of civic education in the public schools, and why the courts, together with the bar and the Utah Law—related Education Project, have worked with the State Board of Education and its staff in those efforts.

In addition to enhancing public understanding of what we do, we are aware that, along with all of state government, we must expand our effectiveness at a time when resources are limited; we feel constantly the pressure to find ways to do more with less.

Utah's courts have responded to these challenges with creativity and hard work, and we are recognized nationally as one of the most innovative systems in the country. Our governance structure, in particular, serves us well in the management of the judicial branch. Utah's Judicial Council, which consists of judges from each court level, is the policy—making body for the administration of the courts, and makes the decisions about our budget and our operational needs. It receives input from boards of judges at each court level, and then sets the priorities for the system that are included each year in our budget requests to you.

The Council's job is hard in the best of times and very hard in hard times. In the recent past, like all parts of government, we have had to resolve competing interests in our system, preserve all of our essential functions, and try to find ways to increase our productivity and excellence in the context of significant losses in In ordinary times, I would not use this occasion to touch on budget-related issues; I would much rather spend it outlining for you our innovations and vision for the future. In light of the degree to which our state, like the rest of the nation, finds itself coping with reduced resources, however, I think ut is important that I report briefly to you on the way in which the courts have been absorbing our share of the losses. We appreciate the discretion that you have allotted us to manage our resources, and we have tried to do so in a fashion that will minimize impacts on the public. The choices have been difficult. In the last 18 months, for example, from a workforce of 1200, we have lost 94 positions and curtailed numerous programs and services. We have been prudent, I believe, and have planned well, which has permitted us to accomplish most of the personnel cuts through attrition and hiring freezes (although we have had to terminate 17

employees for lack of funds), and by asking all of our people to work a little harder, with no expectation of pay increases, bonuses, or new resources. Thus far, as I said, we have worked hard to make reductions in areas that are least likely to affect the public. But some of the money has been saved in ways that are, ultimately, detrimental to public needs, such as the closure of courts in Murray and Roy. Although the facilities costs for those courts have been eliminated, so has the availability of court services close to the people in those communities. There are other examples: in the area of state supervision of seriously delinquent youth (designed to keep these young people from having to be committed to the Division of Youth Corrections), we had to eliminate almost twenty positions, resulting in decreased supervision and calls from concerned parents worried that their children were not being seen often enough; in Salt Lake, the juvenile courts had to eliminate their electronic monitoring program because we had to cut the staff person responsible for installing and monitoring the equipment; in Provo and Salt Lake, court funds used to pay for sex offender treatment for juveniles have had to be reduced. Perhaps most discouragingly, we have been able to serve far fewer children and parents in our juvenile drug courts than we – and you – had hoped.

Thus, we are experiencing loss of momentum in some of the very promising and innovative programs that the legislature has recognized and supported in the past. Of even greater concern to us, however, is the fact that we are now at the point where additional significant losses in our budget will inevitably require additional terminations of staff. In addition to the devastation to the people themselves, such losses will have great repercussions for our work. As many of you know, personnel costs comprise approximately 80% of our budget; judges, court clerks, bailiffs and court security, information and technology staff, legal research assistants, clerical staff, and juvenile probation officers are the courts. We are constantly developing ways to make our people more effective. Our On-Line Court Assistance program, for example, is now making forms and procedures available electronically to persons seeking to pursue their own claims in divorce and landlord/tenant cases. By the end of this week, the system will be able to let people prepare their own paperwork for obtaining protective orders in domestic violence cases. In fact, people will be able to have assistance in doing so at any abuse shelter with access to the internet. Our appellate courts are beginning to explore electronic filing options. Our mediation and divorce education programs are helping to reduce use of expensive trial resources.

At the same time, some of our most effective and innovative programs, like "problem-solving" courts in the areas of drug and alcohol addiction, mental health, and domestic violence, actually require <u>more</u> time and personnel investment from our judges and staff than doing things the traditional way. Emerging evidence suggests that in the long run they save money, not to mention

lives, in their impact on future crime and incarceration costs, but in the short run they need more attention than traditional adjudications and dispositions. I recently attended a drug court graduation ceremony in the courtroom of juvenile judge Kim Hornak. Two young fathers, whose parental rights to their small children had been jeopardized by neglect and criminal behavior related to drug abuse, were recognized for the completion of a full year of sobriety. As they spoke of the joy and the hope they had in returning to their families, they described their gratitude to the team of service providers who had been with them every step of the way. That team, put in place and closely supervised by Judge Hornak, included court personnel, juvenile probation officers, and counselors and social workers with treatment expertise working on contract with the courts. The dollar cost of their programs was a fraction of what the system would have to absorb if their parental rights had had to be permanently terminated, and their wives and children left adrift. And the human value of being given a second chance to be competent, healthy, parents is, of course, incalculable.

Utah, as you know, continues to grow and change, whatever the economy may be doing. Whereas in 1990, only 58,000 of our population consisted of people who were born in other countries, that figure grew to 158,000 by 2000. For us in the courts, that has implications for interpreter services and other access issues. Even more urgent, as we seek to enhance the trust and confidence of the public, is the degree to which we are perceived as being open, even—handed, and fair. Without public perception that the courts are fair, I don't believe the courts can long exist; fairness is at the heart of our constitutional role. And yet, in a report issued last week, the Commission on Racial & Ethnic Fairness in the Criminal and Juvenile Justice system revealed that the larger justice system, which includes the courts but also law enforcement and corrections, has still ground to cover in making both fairness and the perception of fairness the hallmark of Utah's justice system.

In a future perspective, another growing pressure on our system is the need for more comprehensive, better–funded, defense resources for indigent persons in criminal, especially capital cases, throughout the state. In an adversary system of justice, the courts cannot do our work without the help of well–trained and responsible counsel. Likewise, we urgently need the help of readily available, competent research assistance to deal with the ever–increasing complexity of our work. I know how pressed for time, information, and instant expertise you are in your capacity as lawmakers. Trial judges, also, are desperate for research support in their work. At present, statewide, there are only 15 law clerks available to 95 trial judges for legal research and consultation (compared, for example, to the 2–3 law clerks assigned to each judge nationwide in the federal system). That circumstance doesn't just limit the capacity of our trial judges to do their best work: it also has a cumulative effect, I believe, in burdening the appellate system

with occasional decisions reached in the absence of adequate time and resources in cases involving complex legal questions. This is a pressing problem we will continue to address. It is yet another example of the fact that <u>people</u> are our greatest resource and our greatest need.

May I close with some comments about the relationship between the judicial and legislative branches. President Mansell and Speaker Stephens have been generous and gracious with their time and willingness to speak with me and others about administrative matters and problems. Legislative leadership, likewise, has been welcoming to me in my new post, and I greatly appreciate opportunities to talk and share views. The many conversations I have had with you in your districts have been invaluable, and your staff is wonderful to work with.

There are natural tensions between our branches - they were created thoughtfully and deliberately by the framers of our constitutions. Next month will mark the 200th anniversary of John Marshall's landmark opinion in *Marbury v*. Madison, the case that established the constitutional principle of judicial review in the federal system. Ironically, many do not realize that the principle of judicial review was in place, and in fact specifically acknowledged in constitutional language, in many of the original states years before Marbury. Historically, then, this constitutional balance between legislatures and courts has been part of the fabric of government from the very beginning of this nation. It has always created tension, on the federal as well as the state level, between the legislatures, which have plenary power to make policy choices and law within the framework of the federal and state constitutions, and the courts, whose duty it is to interpret the meaning of constitutional language and resolve claims that challenge the constitutionality of the laws. I want to emphasize that when the courts do that assessment, they must be, and are in my experience, motivated only by honest convictions, informed by their study of constitutional law, about the content and meaning of constitutional language, and not by policy preferences or disagreements with legislative choices. Because legislators operate in a system that is by definition political and oriented to majority will and the art of compromise, there is sometimes a tendency to assume that judges are similarly motivated by political, personal or partisan preferences. We in this state's judiciary do not, and cannot, function that way; it would be a violation of our oaths of office, our professional values, and the law we serve. It is precisely because of our state's commitment to a neutral, impartial judiciary that we have evolved over the years the non-partisan, merit-based system of judicial selection, evaluation and retention that we have. There are other states where judges must raise campaign funds, accept donations from entities with major interests litigated in their courts, make promises about actions they will take on the bench, worry about the effect of each decision on their popularity and vote-getting capacity, and even

seek support from partisan political sources. There have been appalling instances of scandal and corruption in some of those states, but more significant in my view, has been the tendency to degrade the courts from places for objective, fair decision—making to entities perceived as biased and purely political. Recent surveys show that a majority of people in states with elective systems have at least the perception that the courts are less neutral and less objective because of election—related practices such as the acceptance of campaign funds from lawyers, law firms, and business entities. While we might like to think that courts either are or are not fair as a matter of objective reality, I believe we have both to be fair and to be perceived as fair to perform our constitutional role.

By contrast with systems in many other states, Utah has consistently moved in directions designed to avoid politicizing anything about the judiciary, to insulate the entire process of selection, retention, evaluation, and discipline of our judges from forces that could impinge on their neutrality in decision—making. I hope that we will always value that need for neutrality — it is the essence of fairness.

Not long ago, many of you joined forces with colleagues from the executive branch and judges to participate in the Dialogue for Freedom project sponsored by the Utah State Bar. We went into classrooms all over the state to engage students with the first principles of our government. I like to think that because of the divergent constitutional assignments given to the three branches of Utah's government, they are themselves constantly engaged in a dialogue – open, lively, sometimes fierce – about life in a free society. I hope that dialogue will increasingly be mutually respectful and marked by civility, even when it is most fierce. We cannot expect to earn the trust and confidence of the people if we do less.

I honor and respect your service to our state, and on behalf of the judicial branch express our best wishes to you in the session ahead.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS

FORCED ENTRY TO MAKE ARREST

S.B. 48 David L. Thomas

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE CODE OF CRIMINAL PROCEDURE BY AMENDING PROVISIONS REGARDING WHEN AND HOW FORCIBLE ENTRY MAY BE MADE TO EFFECT AN ARREST. THE AMENDMENTS REFLECT RULINGS IN TWO U.S. SUPREME COURT DECISIONS, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

DRIVER LICENSE AND IDENTIFICATION CARD AMENDMENTS

S.B. 49 Parley G. Hellewell

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE PUBLIC SAFETY CODE BY AMENDING THE DRIVER LICENSE AND IDENTIFICATION CARD PROVISIONS. THIS ACT REQUIRES AN APPLICANT FOR A DRIVER LICENSE OR IDENTIFICATION CARD TO BOTH HAVE AND PROVIDE A UTAH RESIDENCE ADDRESS. THIS ACT CLARIFIES THAT A PERSON UNDER 16 MAY OPERATE A MOTOR VEHICLE IF OPERATING UNDER A PERMIT ISSUED BY THE DRIVER LICENSE DIVISION. THIS ACT ALLOWS IDENTIFICATION CARD APPLICANTS TO CHECK A BOX ON THE APPLICATION TO DONATE TO BLINDNESS PREVENTION, ORGAN DONATION, AND PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION ASSISTANCE FOR SENIORS OR PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES. THIS ACT EXTENDS THE EXPIRATION TO TEN YEARS FOR IDENTIFICATION CARDS. THIS ACT

REMOVES A PROVISION THAT MAKES ALL IDENTIFICATION CARDS EXPIRE WHEN THE PERSON TURNS 21 YEARS OF AGE AND ALLOWS ALTERNATIVE WORDING OR OTHER MEANS ON IDENTIFICATION CARDS AND DRIVER LICENSES TO INDICATE THE PERSON IS A MINOR. THIS ACT MAKES TECHNICAL CHANGES, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

INDEPENDENT ESCROW AGENTS AMENDMENTS

S.B. 77 Thomas V. Hatch

THE ACT PROVIDES FOR DISCIPLINARY ACTION, INCLUDING ADMINISTRATIVE PENALTIES, AGAINST CERTIFIED DIRECT-ENTRY MIDWIVES. THE ACT DEFINES AND PROVIDES PENALTIES FOR UNLAWFUL AND UNPROFESSIONAL CONDUCT. THE ACT SETS STANDARDS FOR CONSULTATION, COLLABORATION, REFERRAL, AND TRANSFER TO OR WITH OTHER HEALTH CARE PROVIDERS AND SETS STANDARDS FOR LIABILITY UNDER THOSE CIRCUMSTANCES. THE ACT BRINGS CERTIFIED DIRECT-ENTRY MIDWIVES WITHIN THE SCOPE OF THE HEALTH CARE PROVIDERS IMMUNITY FROM LIABILITY ACT, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

STATE-OF-THE-STATE ADDRESS BY GOVERNOR LEAVITT

A year ago, I stood before you on the eve of a milestone in Utah history – the 2002 Olympic Winter Games. I conveyed a strategy for turning 17 days of attention into a thousand days of progress.

Those 17 days were pivotal to us as a state – and they were a triumph.

Because of world events, the Utah Olympics had to be much more than a world sports festival. And they were.

They became, for this nation particularly, a recovery – a healing process of joyful celebration.

The Games were also a response to the enemies of world civility. In the single image of athletes reverently carrying the battered Ground Zero flag, our nation declared its most profound respect for liberty and life – and we served unequivocal notice that we would defend them both.

It was simple repudiation, and it was powerful. As the snowboarders defied gravity, America defied terrorism.

A conversation I had with a Russian-born coach illustrates why people from throughout the world gave these games a perfect score.

He told me the volunteer driving the van to his event was the president of a Utah company. Then, back at the athlete's village, a volunteer cleaning his room, who in real life is a computer engineer, helped him connect his laptop to the Internet.

With his deep Russian accent, he said, "The president of a company drives me to an event. My room is cleaned by a computer engineer. What a country!"

What a country indeed! And what a state! Our state was lifted to international prominence on the shoulders of 35,000 volunteers. We are forever an "Olympic City," and we will never be the same.

Tonight I salute the volunteers of Team 2002, whose spirit personified this state, reassured our nation, and befriended the world.

The Olympics also marked the beginning of our thousand day economic plan. They remain a lasting legacy and a recurring opportunity. But we are now at Day 352 – another time, a different place economically, and a whole new set of challenges.

The glow of the Games in a way masked the debilitating effect that the struggling national economy was having on our people. In the past year, many Utahns lost their jobs. Others have seen their income or retirement savings erode as the stock market fell. The historic drop in state revenues that followed has caused disruption and unmet expectations. Add to that fire, drought, return of the Mormon crickets and war—it's been quite a year.

But to keep last year in perspective it helps to remember how much progress we have made the past ten years.

- Yes, unemployment is higher than we would like it to be right now, but even considering that, in the last decade we have a quarter million new jobs and wages growing faster than inflation. Household income has climbed from 20th in the nation to 10th: ten places in ten years.
- Our air and water are cleaner. Our communities are safer. Crime rates have fallen and still no high-level nuclear waste.
- Our transportation system is vastly improved. Energy and water systems are more reliable.
 - Utahns remain among the healthiest people in the world.
- There are fewer than half as many families on welfare, even in difficult economic times. One hundred and thirty-five thousand more families own homes. Put another way, 25 percent of the families in Utah bought their first home in the last ten years.
 - Nearly every list of emerging technology markets now includes Utah.
- Our reputation in the world was enhanced by the Olympics, which gave us a new internal confidence we've never had before. And with good reason.

Do we have challenges? Yes we do. But, we have toughed out these rough patches before, and we are doing it again.

It's important to note, the biggest factor in Utah's economic recovery is the national economy. As that unfolds, we need to carefully manage the state's financial situation. Some states have had their bond rating lowered this year, and more will, but Utah isn't going to be one of them. We also need to stay focused on the long term. And here's the key to long term:

In the economic race of this century, the society with the best-educated people wins. Period. End of conversation.

Two weeks ago, the State School Board announced that they plan to adopt a competency standard for high school graduation in Utah. The phrase competency standard is new to most people, but I want to bluntly say: this is a big deal.

If you're a student, this is going to affect your life. If you're a parent with a child in school, you need to know about this. If you're an employer who may hire a Utah student, you will want to know the term "competency standard."

This isn't a nibble around the edges program the State School Board is proposing; it's a transformation, and I support it.

A friend of mine made an observation that illustrates why this is such a landmark. He pointed out to me – that in life you get what you value. He said, "If my child misses first period at school, within an hour I get a call. But it's six weeks before we find out that he failed a test." Why? Because funding for the school is based on attendance and it's no surprise that we get 95% attendance because that is what we value.

So what's the message there? Attendance is mandatory. Learning is optional. And that's the wrong message.

The standard our schools use now is called the Carnegie credit system – a system developed nearly 100 years ago. The whole system is based on the measurement of time. It organizes schools like a factory.

Under the Carnegie credit system, when a student has spent roughly 120 hours studying a subject, our schools issue a credit, and we move them to the next place in the assembly line. When a student has 24 Carnegie credits, they can trade that for a high school diploma.

Some would say, yes, but the student has to pass the class to get the credit; but what's the standard of competence to receive the credit? It's a D-. That is no standard. That's a disservice.

Time is everything in our school system. We define a school year as 990 hours. Schools get funded based on the number of students that spend the time.

We're so accustomed to the clock that we don't see it as a problem, but what parent isn't bothered that text books are turned in days before the end of the school year?

Students may not be engaged in learning activities, but under this system if the school is open the student gets the credit and the school gets the money.

To parents, it feels like misplaced priorities. To high school seniors, it's a free ride. If they pass their classes with a D- or better in the first three years, they have nearly all the credits they need to graduate, and they waste their senior year.

They take a light load and do what my son calls "chill." It has become a right of passage, almost an entitlement; and our current system doesn't just allow it; it enables it.

This system doesn't just need tinkering; we need a different system, because it's organized around the wrong value.

Ten years ago, a dozen European nations committed to transform themselves by adopting a uniform currency. Where once you had the Franc, the German Mark, the Italian Lira, you now have one unified currency: the Euro.

It began with a well-framed idea and progressed to a vision slowly refined and implemented. It was controversial and in many ways disruptive, but it has changed Europe in a historic way. For our schools, changing to a competency-measured system is just as significant as changing the monetary system in Europe. It will transform the schools, because it changes the value system.

I propose that the State Board of Education be given authority to develop and test a funding mechanism called the Weighted Competency Unit, which will provide a means of financing schools under this alternative system. The State School Board has said they can be ready to act by fall of this year.

I invite you to join with me this summer in organizing a summit meeting where leaders of every school district and educational governing body can join with parents and academics to discuss and learn together how to implement this vision.

I salute the members of the State School Board. It's time for bold leadership, and this is bold.

Eight months ago, I met with the leaders of 23 industry groups in Utah. I asked them, under the chairmanship of Fraser Bullock, to take an independent look at our current direction in education from an employer's point of view.

In addition to expressing their support of a competency measured system, their report praised what Utah educators accomplish with limited resources. But the report carried a sobering warning: Education in Utah has a serious funding crisis. Think about it. Employers in this state independently calling the situation a crisis – *a crisis*.

The thrust of their statement is that we can't expect to prosper economically when our competitors lap us in education investment.

And, that's exactly what is happening. Even after doubling our investment in education during the past decade, we are 50th in per student funding. Dead last and 40% below the national average. It's clear to me that as long as our demographics stay as they are now, we are never going to approach the national average in per pupil spending.

So what is adequate? We need a target. At a minimum, over the next six years, we should aspire to both fund increased enrollment and close one-half of the gap between ourselves and the intermountain states, such as Idaho, Wyoming, and Colorado.

We will not resolve our funding crisis all at once, but tonight I would like to propose five ways that will move us in the right direction.

First, no backsliding. It would be unthinkable, given our relative under–investment and the 10,000 new students entering our schools and colleges this year, to appropriate less money than last year.

Some believe tuition tax credits are the solution to paying for increased enrollments. They say if we subject public schools to the forces of the marketplace, competition will improve them.

I believe in the power of markets to improve public education. Tuition tax credits are based on a simple idea, but they create serious risks. I'm prepared to participate in a discussion, but only when we have adequately funded our public schools. Until then, I would create educational choices in a different way.

Charter schools are working. There are waiting lines to get in; the parents are happy; and they are providing incentives for other public schools to improve. We need more of them and they deserve equal financial footing with other public schools. Additionally, the state needs to create a revolving loan fund for non–profit charter schools to help them meet their building needs.

The best of both worlds is a competency-measured charter school. That is exactly what we are creating in our six new high-tech high schools. The first of those is the Academy of Math, Science and Engineering, which opens at Cottonwood High School this fall. Right on schedule.

Second proposal: we need to discontinue the practice of funding road construction with sales tax dollars.

In 1997, to commemorate the state's one-hundredth year, we created the Centennial Highway Fund consisting of 41 highway projects. Every project is important and needs to be completed.

The 2003 legislature faces vastly different circumstances. The 1997 legislature was awash in new revenue, and faced declining welfare rolls, flat school enrollments, and falling health care prices. By contrast, this legislature faces the fifth year of drought, 65,000 unemployed families, the leading edge of a school enrollment boom, skyrocketing health care costs, and the sharpest drop in revenue since World War II.

This is not 1997, and we cannot approach our highway building as if it were. The excess funds we were spending then no longer exist.

We have limited options. We can slow down road construction and complete projects as we have the money to do so. That was my budget proposal. Or, if you are determined to move ahead on the current construction schedule, new revenues will have to be found because it would be wrongheaded to support cuts to education, release prisoners, and reduce law enforcement while we continue spending sales tax dollars on roads.

Third proposal: We are in a serious drought. Our current method of subsidizing water projects with sales tax is neither adequate, nor reliable, nor conservation—minded. And it puts water development in direct competition with funds for college students, healthcare for the poor, abused children, and others in need.

Tonight, I call upon the water community in our state to seize this moment to create a permanent, adequate, reliable, and conservation—oriented means to assure our water future. This not only benefits water users, it returns general fund dollars to education.

Fourth proposal: If we collected taxes that are now owed but not collected on sales made via Internet, catalogue or telephone, it would level the retail playing field and help us meet our public education aspirations. You have legislation before you that will radically simplify and bring fairness to the sales tax system.

And finally, the fifth proposal: We need to hold the line on administrative costs in government by stepping up our efforts to move government services online. This is hard work requiring flexibility and innovation. Approximately 1.2 million state government services are provided over the Internet each month. That's 1.2 million times people got their service faster without the direct help of a state employee.

But the result of bringing every state government service online 24/7 will be lower costs and better service for Utahns. You can start by allowing consumers to use credit cards without penalty when they use online services.

I have some good news tonight. Putting education first in our budget is good economic policy. That's our strategy, and it works. I'm pleased to announce that tomorrow we will sign a deal resulting in the creation of 500 to 1000 new technology jobs in Utah by prominent national companies over the next three years. Anyone who is interested may go to the State of Utah website for more information about these exciting opportunities.

These jobs are in a health care industry called medical informatics; and these jobs are coming to Utah, because we've trained workers with the specific skills employers need.

Many of the new jobs will be located in rural Utah at our 18 Smart Sites. In just 352 days, Smart Sites have become one of the largest single sources of employment in rural Utah.

The Thousand Day plan also fostered a new biotechnology/human genetics project called GenData. GenData is a non-profit enterprise formed by the state, the University of Utah and the Huntsman Cancer Foundation. It combines the unique genealogical information found in Utah with genetic and medical data contributed by Utah families into a database that will create a scientific treasure, used to cure and treat diseases like diabetes and cancer that touch every family. It will attract venture capital and pharmaceutical and medical research organizations from all over the world.

In order to assure the integrity of the information Utah families give voluntarily, I ask that you build into law an impenetrable wall of privacy protection.

Though still in the early development stage, this is one to watch. GenData will be the springboard for thousands of high-paying jobs in the next decade and the means by which Utah secures a reputation as a world leader in biotechnology.

There are two economic trends that worry me. Bankruptcies in our state are getting to the point that the only explanation is a plague of bad judgment and over

consumption. It's the kind of weakness that will destroy reputations, families, communities and economic prosperity. Our schools have a role, but most of all we have a duty as responsible adults to live in ways that allow us to meet our obligations and teach our children to do the same.

I am also concerned that tuition increases are beginning to price the average family in Utah out of higher education. One of our greatest strengths is a highly educated work force, another reason to put education first.

And now I'd like to spend a moment talking about homeland security. I want to assure you, we are doing all that is humanly reasonable to protect your health and safety.

We remember not just what we lost on September 11, but what we found, and terrorists will never have the final say. I'd like to tell you about a special group of Utahns who took that message to Afghanistan and hand-delivered it to Al Qaeda.

Two months after the attack on America, Bravo Company of the 19th Special Forces Group in Springville was quietly activated and sent to Afghanistan. It was commanded by Major Randy Watt, who is with us tonight, along with Sergeants Scott Hansen, Allen Smithee, and Mark Evans.

They are elite forces – Green Berets specializing in counter–terrorism, guerilla warfare, infiltration and strikes behind enemy lines.

In civilian life – you know them as your neighbors – Bravo Company's ranks include a school teacher, a paramedic, a construction worker, and a corporate safety manager, not to mention West Valley City's director of housing and Ogden's assistant police chief.

Last year, when you heard about America's Special Forces going into caves and compounds in Tora Bora and Wazir Valley to root out Al Qaeda, you may not have known the reports were referring to Utah National Guard soldiers.

They came under fire more than one hundred times from rockets, machine guns, grenades, and artillery. They watched their backs constantly, because the paid loyalists supplementing their ranks regularly fled and left them in the "kill zone."

They faced a new kind of enemy that rigged up everyday electronic devices as remote detonators for land mines and favored children as human shields – an enemy motivated by hatred, extreme fundamentalism and the \$100,000 bounty Al Qaeda promised for each dead American.

Bravo Company confronted the enemy for seven months and returned home in November to more than 70 combat decorations — including 39 Bronze Stars — for their distinguished service and bravery.

That is a staggering amount of heroism for one small unit. We are a proud state and a grateful nation.

Two experiences of this unit particularly stand out. Sergeants Smithee and Evans where among just four Bravo Company sergeants who took on a larger, heavier—equipped enemy force that had set up an ambush. They were surrounded and badly out—numbered. Under heavy fire, at close range, Smithee and Evans systematically, in a lengthy gun battle, worked their way up a hill to take out an enemy machine gun emplacement and mortar pit. Their direct strike against the enemy gave them the high ground and the Al Qaeda forces fled.

The second heroic event began as a "search and locate" foray at a walled Afghan compound and turned into a prolonged battle between Major Watt's detachment and an Al Qaeda cell. It was all—out combat, involving air support and medical evacuations and it continued for five hours. Four soldiers were hit, including a Utah guardsman. Through it all, Watt commanded rescue and battle operations as Hansen risked his life to pull wounded comrades to safety.

They killed and captured the entire Al Qaeda force. One of those injured in that battle was Sergeant Lane Morris – also with us tonight.

I wanted to begin repaying our debt of gratitude to these soldiers in a meaningful way by inviting all of Utah to witness a very special event: the awarding of the Bronze Star to the final four members of Bravo Company who have yet to receive it.

These four earned the star with an added citation called the "V device." It signifies valor and is awarded only for directly engaging the enemy in ground combat.

It is my great pleasure as commander-in-chief of the Utah National Guard to award the Bronze Star with the "V device" for valor to Major Randy Watt, Sergeant Scott Hansen, Sergeant Allen Smithee, and Sergeant Mark Evans.

Ladies and Gentlemen, the Army's newest recipients of the Bronze Star.

I need to be clear about the future of the Army, Air National Guard, Air Force Reserve, and US Army Reserve. A sobering assessment of the landscape suggests the potential of war in Iraq. You need to know that because of the unique training and capability of the Utah National Guard and Reserve, Utah will likely bear a disproportionate responsibility in that conflict, perhaps as many as 2,300 soldiers and airmen. They need our unfailing support, as employers, Utahns, and Americans.

These four here tonight told me that during their tour of duty not a day went by that they did not think of America and were thankful.

This is the nature of America and the abiding character of Utah – the courage and resolve of Bravo Company... and the spirit and devotion of the Olympic volunteer. Because of it we have no limits on aspiration or achievement.

So while difficulty lies ahead, so does full recovery and renewed prosperity. And we will triumph over our adversity. It can be no other way. Utah is a composite of its people and the state of our state is strong.

Thank you, good night and may God bless our troops, our state and our nation.

NOW, THEREFORE, I Michael O. Leavitt, Governor of the state of Utah, do hereby declare January 22, 2003, as ROTARY WORLD-WIDE POLIO ERADICATION DAY in Utah, and commend Rotary for its continued dedication and service to ending polio world-wide.

BHICHAI RATTAKUL ROTARY INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT

Thank you very much. Everything in the introduction was correct, except just one thing: that I'm a statesman. This is wrong, I'm just one ordinary Rotarian.

I'm very happy, indeed, and feel it a great honor, to be invited to say a few words at this very important Senate session being held here. I have been in your seats for more than 40 years – not 4 terms. I have served as a member of the Parliament of Thailand for 40 years.

Therefore, by being here, it's like coming back home. I could feel the sense of being a Parliamentarian right here, Mr. President. But I'm here, Mr. President, not to talk about politics. I'm so happy to be able to retire from politics after over 45 years of being a politician.

I'm here today, Mr. President and ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, to say how thankful, how grateful we are in Rotary that the Rotarians and the people of Utah, especially the L.D.S. Foundation, have helped a great deal towards the eradication of polio from the face of the earth.

You would not believe that in this one project alone, Rotarians worldwide have contributed more than \$500 million since the beginning of our campaign to try to eradicate polio from the face of the earth.

L.D.S. Foundation and the Rotarians of Utah have all contributed so much by buying the few drops of vaccine for billions and billions of children around the world. So I'm here to thank you all personally as a legislature, as Parliamentarians and as Rotarians.

Thank you from the bottom of my heart for being so generous in contributing towards that campaign to eradicate polio.

I'm happy to report to you that in 1988 there were 400,000 cases of active polio in 126 countries. But with all the help, including your government, we have now only about 1500 cases left. From 126 countries, only 6 countries are left with polio.

So with your contribution, your support, your encouragement, I am quite sure that the world will be free from polio very soon.

Thank you very much, Mr. President and ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, for giving me this opportunity to say a few words. By the way, I was at one time a democrat, which is not dominated by the Senate here. Thank you very much.

THIS ACT ALLOWS DATABASE INFORMATION TO BE MADE ACCESSIBLE THROUGH THE INTERNET OR TO BE MADE AVAILABLE THROUGH OTHER ELECTRONIC MEDIUM IF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY DETERMINES THAT SUFFICIENT PROVIDED TO ENSURE COMPLIANCE SECURITY IS DISCLOSURE RESTRICTIONS. THIS ACT MAKES CHANGES, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

THIS ACT TAKES EFFECT ON JULY 1, 2003, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

RESTRICTIONS ON PASSENGERS IN PICKUP TRUCKS

S.B. 125 Curtis S. Bramble

THIS ACT MODIFIES MOTOR VEHICLES CODE BY PROHIBITING A PASSENGER UNDER THE AGE OF 18 FROM RIDING IN THE BACK OF A PICKUP TRUCK AND PROVIDING ENFORCEMENT OF THIS PROVISION ONLY AS A SECONDARY ACTION. THIS ACT ADDS EXCEPTIONS FOR RIDING IN A CAMPER AND FOR A PASSENGER ENGAGED IN AN AGRICULTURAL OPERATION. - (E) acquire real or personal property, or an undivided, fractional, or other interest in real or personal property, necessary or convenient for the purposes contemplated in the agreement creating the interlocal entity and sell, lease, or otherwise dispose of that property;
- (F) directly or by contract with another:
- (I) own and acquire facilities and improvements or an undivided, fractional, or other interest in facilities and improvements;
- (II) construct, operate, maintain, and repair facilities and improvements; and
- (III) provide the services contemplated in the agreement creating the interlocal entity;
- (G) borrow money, incur indebtedness, and issue revenue bonds, notes, or other obligations and secure their payment by an assignment, pledge, or other conveyance of all or any part of the revenues and receipts from the facilities, improvements, or services that the interlocal entity provides;
- (H) offer, issue, and sell warrants, options, or other rights related to the bonds, notes, or other obligations issued by the interlocal entity; and
- (I) sell or contract for the sale of the services, output, product, or other benefits provided by the interlocal entity to:
- (I) public agencies inside or outside the state; and
- (II) with respect to any excess services, output, product, or benefits, any person on terms that the interlocal entity considers to be in the best interest of the public agencies that are parties to the agreement creating the interlocal entity; and
- (ii) may not levy, assess, or collect ad valorem property taxes.
- (b) An assignment, pledge, or other conveyance under Subsection (1)(a)(i)(G) may, to the extent provided by the documents under which the assignment, pledge, or other conveyance is made, rank prior in right to any other obligation except taxes or payments in lieu of taxes payable to the state or its political subdivisions.
- (2) An energy services interlocal entity:

- (a) except with respect to any ownership interest it has in facilities providing additional project capacity, is not subject to:
- (i) Part 3, Project Entity Provisions; or
- (ii) Title 59, Chapter 8, Gross Receipts Tax on Certain Corporations Not Required to Pay Corporate Franchise or Income Tax Act; and (b) may:
- (i) own, acquire, and, by itself or by contract with another, construct, operate, and maintain a facility or improvement for the generation, transmission, and transportation of electric energy or related fuel supplies;
- (ii) enter into a contract to obtain a supply of electric power and energy and ancillary services, transmission, and transportation services, and supplies of natural gas and fuels necessary for the operation of generation facilities;
- (iii) enter into a contract with public agencies, investor—owned or cooperative utilities, and others, whether located in or out of the state, for the sale of [the] wholesale services provided by the energy services interlocal entity; and
- (iv) adopt and implement risk management policies and strategies and enter into transactions and agreements to manage the risks associated with the purchase and sale of energy [in competitive markets], including forward purchase and sale contracts, hedging, tolling and swap agreements, and other instruments.

HEALTH CARE – UNIFORM DATA FORMATTING STANDARDS

S.B. 60 Gregory S. Bell

CHECK CASHER AT LEAST ONCE EVERY YEAR. THE ACT MAKES TECHNICAL CHANGES, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

INDIVIDUAL INCOME TAX – SUBTRACTIONS FROM FEDERAL TAXABLE INCOME

S.B. 131 Curtis S. Bramble

THIS ACT AMENDS THE INDIVIDUAL INCOME TAX ACT TO PROVIDE A SUBTRACTION FROM FEDERAL TAXABLE INCOME FOR CERTAIN NET CAPITAL GAINS THAT ARE INVESTED IN QUALIFYING STOCK ISSUED BY A UTAH SMALL BUSINESS CORPORATION. THIS ACT ALSO MODIFIES CHILD PARENT-TIME PROVISIONS BY AND PROVISIONS RELATING TO DEVIATIONS FROM THE CHILD SUPPORT GUIDELINES. AND ALLOWING FOR REDUCTIONS IN CHILD SUPPORT FOR EXTENDED PARENT-TIME, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

OR MODIFICATIONS TO CERTAIN LICENSING BOARDS AND WHETHER OR NOT CERTAIN OCCUPATIONS SHOULD BE LICENSED BY THE STATE. THIS ACT MAKES TECHNICAL CHANGES, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

S.B. 68 Dan R. Eastman

PRESCRIPTION DRUG ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

S.B. 140 James M. Evans

THIS ACT AMENDS THE HEALTH CODE. THE ACT CREATES A PRESCRIPTION DRUG ASSISTANCE PROGRAM WITHIN THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND REQUIRES REPORTING TO THE LEGISLATURE, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

THE ACT PROVIDES FOR ATTORNEY'S FEES AND COSTS TO BE AWARDED TO A SUCCESSFUL PARTY AGAINST THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT ENTITY IN A CIVIL ACTION FOR A VIOLATION OF THE REQUIREMENTS. THE ACT ALSO MAKES TECHNICAL CHANGES, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

AGRICULTURAL COOPERATIVES AMENDMENTS

S.B. 142 Leonard M. Blackham

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE AGRICULTURAL COOPERATIVE ASSOCIATIONS ACT TO PROVIDE FOR ONE-MEMBER ASSOCIATIONS AND ALLOWS FOR PROPORTIONATE VOTING IN COOPERATIVE ASSOCIATIONS BASED ON PATRONAGE. THIS ACT ALLOWS FOR DIVIDENDS EXCEEDING 8% PER ANNUM ON PREFERRED, NONVOTING STOCK. THIS ACT PROVIDES FOR THE JUDICIAL DISSOLUTION OF COOPERATIVE ASSOCIATIONS IN CERTAIN CIRCUMSTANCES, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

MOTOR VEHICLE DISCLOSURE REQUIREMENTS –PURCHASER'S RIGHTS

S.B. 143 Dan R. Eastman

THIS ACT MODIFIES THE MOTOR VEHICLES CODE BY AMENDING FINANCIAL ARRANGEMENTS AND PROVISIONS FOR DEALER FINANCED MOTOR VEHICLE PURCHASES. THIS ACT PROVIDES THAT IF A DEALER WAS UNABLE TO ARRANGE THE FINANCING TERMS MADE IN THE DISCLOSURE FOR THE PURCHASE OF A MOTOR VEHICLE AND HAS NOTIFIED THE PURCHASER, THE PURCHASER HAS 14 DAYS FROM THE DATE OF SALE TO RESCIND THE SALE. IF THE PURCHASER FAILS TO RESCIND THE SALE, THE DEALER IS NOT SUBJECT TO FINANCING THE VEHICLE PURCHASE PURSUANT TO THE TERMS MADE IN THE DISCLOSURE AND THE PURCHASER IS SOLELY RESPONSIBLE FOR ALL FINANCING ARRANGEMENTS. THIS ACT REQUIRES THE DEALER TO NOTIFY PURCHASERS OF THESE REQUIREMENTS IN THE DISCLOSURES. THIS ACT MAKES TECHNICAL CHANGES, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

HEALTH INSURANCE – PROMPT PAYMENT AMENDMENTS

S.B. 144 Peter C. Knudson

THIS ACT AMENDS THE INSURANCE CODE. THE ACT AMENDS PROVISIONS RELATED TO HEALTH CARE PROVIDER CLAIMS PRACTICES. THE ACT AMENDS THE DEFINITION OF PROVIDER TO INCLUDE A HEALTH CARE FACILITY TO WHOM AN INSURER HAS AN

INDIRECT OBLIGATION TO PAY. THE ACT AMENDS THE PERIOD OF TIME IN WHICH AN INSURER MAY RECOVER AN AMOUNT IMPROPERLY PAID TO A PROVIDER. THE ACT LIMITS THE ABILITY OF AN INSURER TO RECOUP IMPROPERLY PAID CLAIMS FROM FUTURE CLAIM PAYMENTS. THIS ACT MAKES TECHNICAL AMENDMENTS TO THE CALCULATIONS OF PENALTIES FOR FAILURE TO TIMELY PAY A CLAIM, was read for the first time and referred to the Rules Committee.

S.R. 5 Lyle W. Hillyard

THIS RESOLUTION MODIFIES SENATE RULES GOVERNING COMMITTEE RESPONSIBILITIES AND PUBLIC HEARINGS BY ALLOWING THE COMMITTEE CHAIR OR A MAJORITY OF THE COMMITTEE TO REQUIRE A WITNESS TO SWEAR OR AFFIRM AN OATH TO TELL THE TRUTH. FISCAL YEAR 2003–04 ONLY, TO THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION FOR DISTRIBUTION TO SCHOOL DISTRICTS WITH DECLINING ENROLLMENT THAT ARE IMPACTED BY THIS ACT. THE ACT PROVIDES DEFINITIONS AND ESTABLISHES PROCEDURES AND REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMINISTERING THE TAX CREDITS. THE ACT ESTABLISHES DUTIES OF SCHOLARSHIP GRANTING ORGANIZATIONS AND PROVIDES PENALTIES. THE ACT AUTHORIZES THE STATE TAX COMMISSION TO MAKE RULES. THIS ACT AUTHORIZES THE DIVISION OF CONSUMER PROTECTION TO ENFORCE CERTAIN PRIVATE SCHOOL REQUIREMENTS. THIS ACT HAS RETROSPECTIVE OPERATION FOR TAXABLE YEARS BEGINNING ON OR AFTER JANUARY 1, 2003.

- (f) is of good moral character and has no disciplinary action pending or in effect against the applicant in connection with the practice of mental health therapy, in any jurisdiction.
- (2) A temporary license issued under this section shall expire upon the earlier of:
- (a) issuance of the license applied for; or
- (b) one year from the date the temporary license was issued.

THE ACT MODIFIES BOARD OF TRUSTEES PROVISIONS FOR A DISTRICT CREATED TO PROVIDE FIRE PROTECTION, PARAMEDIC, AND EMERGENCY SERVICES. THE ACT REQUIRES COUNTIES AND MUNICIPALITIES INCLUDED WITHIN A CERTAIN TYPE OF DISTRICT FOR FIRE PROTECTION, PARAMEDIC. AND EMERGENCY SERVICES TO REDUCE THEIR CERTIFIED TAX RATE TO OFFSET TAXES IMPOSED BY THE DISTRICT FOR THOSE SERVICES. THE ACT IMPUTES A TAX IMPOSED BY A FIRE DISTRICT TO THE COUNTY OR MUNICIPALITY INCLUDED WITHIN THE DISTRICT FOR PURPOSES OF THE COUNTY OR MUNICIPALITY'S TAX LIMIT. THE ACT PROVIDES FOR AUTOMATIC ANNEXATION TO CERTAIN DISTRICTS PROVIDING FIRE PROTECTION, PARAMEDIC, AND EMERGENCY SERVICES WHEN AN AREA IS ANNEXED TO A MUNICIPALITY WITHIN THE DISTRICT AND FOR AUTOMATIC WITHDRAWAL FROM THOSE DISTRICTS WHEN AN AREA WITHIN THE DISTRICT IS ANNEXED TO A MUNICIPALITY THAT IS NOT WITHIN THE DISTRICT. THE ACT PROVIDES AN ALTERNATE METHOD OF WITHDRAWING AN AREA WITHIN A MUNICIPALITY FROM CERTAIN DISTRICTS PROVIDING FIRE PROTECTION, PARAMEDIC, AND EMERGENCY SERVICES UPON RESOLUTION OF THE MUNICIPAL LEGISLATIVE BODY AND A VOTE OF THE MUNICIPALITY. THE ACT ALSO MAKES TECHNICAL CHANGES.

- (2) If this bill and S.B. 18, Lieutenant Governor Certification of Special District and Local District Annexations, Withdrawals, and Dissolutions, both pass, it is the intent of the Legislature that, in preparing the Utah Code database for publication, the Office of Legislative Research and General Counsel:
- (a) combine the amendments made by this bill and S.B. 18 to Section 17B-2-514 so that Section 17B-2-514 shall read:
- '17B-2-514. Resolution approving an annexation Notice of annexation When annexation complete.
- (1) (a) Subject to Subsection (1)(b), the local district board shall adopt a resolution [annexing] approving the annexation of the area proposed to be annexed or rejecting the proposed annexation within 30 days after:
- (i) expiration of the protest period under Subsection 17B-2-512(2), if sufficient protests to require an election are not filed;
- (ii) for a petition that meets the requirements of Subsection 17B-2-513(1):
- (A) a public hearing under Section 17B-2-509 is held, if the board chooses or is required to hold a public hearing under Subsection 17B-2-513(2)(a)(ii); or
- (B) expiration of the time for submitting a request for public hearing under Subsection 17B-2-513(2)(a)(ii)(B), if no request is submitted and the board chooses not to hold a public hearing.
- (b) If the local district has entered into an agreement with the United States that requires the consent of the United States for an annexation of territory to the district, [an] a resolution approving annexation under this part may not [occur] be adopted until the written consent of the United States is obtained and filed with the board of trustees.
- (2) (a) [Within ten] The board shall file a notice with the lieutenant governor:
- (i) within 90 days after adoption of [an annexation] a resolution under Subsection (1), Subsection 17B-2-512(3)(c)(i), or Section 17B-2-515[, or a boundary adjustment resolution under Subsection 17B-2-516(4), the board shall: (a) file]: and
- (ii) as soon as practicable after receiving the notice under Subsection 10–2–425(2) of a municipal annexation that causes an automatic annexation to a local district under Section 17B–2–515.5.

- (b) The notice required under Subsection (2)(a) shall:
- (i) be accompanied by:
- (A) if applicable, a copy of the board resolution approving the annexation; and
- (B) an accurate map depicting the boundaries of the area to be annexed or a legal description of the area to be annexed, adequate for purposes of the county assessor and recorder;
- (ii) for an annexation pursuant to a resolution described in Subsection (2)(a)(i), include a certification by the local district board that all requirements for the annexation have been complied with; and
- (iii) for an automatic annexation to a local district under Section 17B–2–515.5, state that an area outside the boundaries of the local district is being automatically annexed to the local district under Section 17B–2–515.5 because of a municipal annexation under Title 10, Chapter 2, Part 4, Annexation.
- (c) (i) Within ten days after receiving the notice under Subsection (2)(a)(i), the lieutenant governor shall:
- (A) issue a certificate of annexation and send a copy of the certificate to the local district board, the State Tax Commission, the state auditor, and the assessor and recorder of each county in which any part of the annexed area is located; and
- (B) send a [written] copy of the notice [of annexation with] under Subsection (2)(a)(i), including the accompanying map or legal description, to the State Tax Commission[, the lieutenant governor,] and the assessor and recorder of [the] each county in which any part of the annexed area is located[, accompanied by an accurate map or legal description of the boundaries of the area being annexed, adequate for purposes of the county assessor and recorder; and].
- [(b) prepare and execute a certificate acknowledging that the notices required under Subsection (2)(a) have been filed, and maintain the certificate with the district records.]

MADE TO Α SCHOLARSHIP CONTRIBUTIONS **GRANTING** ORGANIZATION TO BE USED FOR TUITION GRANTS FOR A OUALIFYING STUDENT TO ATTEND A PRIVATE SCHOOL, OR NONREFUNDABLE TAX CREDITS FOR AMOUNTS PAID FOR TUITION TO A PRIVATE SCHOOL ON BEHALF OF A QUALIFYING STUDENT. THIS ACT APPROPRIATES \$1,000,000 FROM THE UNIFORM SCHOOL FUND, FOR FISCAL YEAR 2003-04 ONLY, TO THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION FOR DISTRIBUTION TO SCHOOL DISTRICTS WITH DECLINING ENROLLMENT THAT ARE IMPACTED BY THIS ACT. THE ACT PROVIDES DEFINITIONS AND ESTABLISHES PROCEDURES AND REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMINISTERING THE TAX CREDITS. THE ACT ESTABLISHES DUTIES OF SCHOLARSHIP GRANTING ORGANIZATIONS AND PROVIDES PENALTIES. THE ACT AUTHORIZES THE STATE TAX COMMISSION TO MAKE RULES. THIS ACT AUTHORIZES THE DIVISION OF CONSUMER PROTECTION TO ENFORCE CERTAIN PRIVATE SCHOOL REQUIREMENTS. THIS ACT REQUIRES THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO STUDY, MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS, AND REPORT TO THE EDUCATION INTERIM COMMITTEE ON AN ENUMERATED LIST OF IMPROVE PUBLIC EDUCATION. STRATEGIES TO THIS APPROPRIATES \$150,000 FOR FISCAL YEAR 2002-03 ONLY TO THE OFFICE OF LEGISLATIVE RESEARCH AND GENERAL COUNSEL TO ALLOW THE EDUCATION INTERIM COMMITTEE TO ISSUE A SPECIFIED REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS. THIS ACT REQUIRES THE PUBLIC EDUCATION APPROPRIATIONS SUBCOMMITTEE TO STUDY AND REPORT ON SPECIFIED FUNDING ISSUES. THIS ACT REQUIRES THE STATE BOARD OF REGENTS TO STUDY AND REPORT ON ISSUES. THIS ACT **AUTHORIZES** SPECIFIED **ADDITIONAL** LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE MEETINGS DURING THE 2003 INTERIM AND APPROPRIATES \$24,500 FROM THE GENERAL FUND, FOR FISCAL YEAR 2002-03 ONLY, TO COVER THE ADDITIONAL MEETING EXPENSES. THIS ACT APPROPRIATES \$5,000,000 FROM THE UNIFORM SCHOOL FUND, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING ON JULY 1, 2003, TO THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO BEGIN IMPLEMENTING COMPETENCY-BASED **EDUCATION** PROCESSES. AUTHORIZES A STATE EDUCATION SUMMIT MEETING, REQUIRES SUMMIT. CERTAIN REPORTS FOR THE **ENUMERATES** PARTICIPANTS, AND SPECIFIES ITS PURPOSE. THIS ACT MAKES TECHNICAL CORRECTIONS. THIS ACT HAS RETROSPECTIVE OPERATION FOR TAXABLE YEARS BEGINNING ON OR AFTER JANUARY 1, 2003.

Prior to this bill becoming a law, I will put out an internal memorandum to all Utah Highway Patrol troopers with the following guidelines and expectations.

"If you are involved in a Utah Highway Patrol Enforcement/Education Blitz and choose to use an unmarked vehicle, you will be expected to abide by the following guidelines:

- You must wear the approved Utah Highway Patrol uniform.
- Your enforcement efforts must be directed towards the following traffic violations.
 - 1) Aggressive Driving/Reckless Driving
 - 2) Driving under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs
- 3) Speeding violations for exceeding the posted speed limit by 21 or more miles per hour.
 - 4) Speeding in school zones
 - 5) Violations of pedestrian crosswalks
 - 6) Left lane restrictions found in 41-6-53.5
- The unmarked vehicle will not be used for routine traffic enforcement, especially for speed enforcement except as outlined above.
- The unmarked vehicle is a tool the Legislature has allowed us to use to prevent crashes caused especially by aggressive driving.

Please do not violate that trust and ultimately cause us to lose this important tool."

- (1) Prohibited acts A Penalties:
- (a) Except as authorized by this chapter, it is unlawful for any person to knowingly and intentionally:
- (i) produce, manufacture, or dispense, or to possess with intent to produce, manufacture, or dispense, a controlled or counterfeit substance:
- (ii) distribute a controlled or counterfeit substance, or to agree, consent, offer, or arrange to distribute a controlled or counterfeit substance;
- (iii) possess a controlled or counterfeit substance with intent to distribute; or
- (iv) engage in a continuing criminal enterprise where:
- (A) the person participates, directs, or engages in conduct which results in any violation of any provision of Title 58, Chapters 37, 37a, 37b, 37c, or 37d that is a felony; and
- (B) the violation is a part of a continuing series of two or more violations of Title 58, Chapters 37, 37a, 37b, 37c, or 37d on separate

- occasions that are undertaken in concert with five or more persons with respect to whom the person occupies a position of organizer, supervisor, or any other position of management.
- (b) Any person convicted of violating Subsection (1)(a) with respect to:
- (i) a substance classified in Schedule I or II or a controlled substance analog is guilty of a second degree felony and upon a second or subsequent conviction is guilty of a first degree felony;
- (ii) a substance classified in Schedule III or IV, or marijuana, is guilty of a third degree felony, and upon a second or subsequent conviction is guilty of a second degree felony; or
- (iii) a substance classified in Schedule V is guilty of a class A misdemeanor and upon a second or subsequent conviction is guilty of a third degree felony.
- (c) Any person who has been convicted of a violation of Subsection (1)(a)(ii) or (iii) may be sentenced to imprisonment for an indeterminate term as provided by law, but if the trier of fact finds a firearm as defined in Section 76–10–501 was used, carried, or possessed on his person or in his immediate possession during the commission or in furtherance of the offense, the court shall additionally sentence the person convicted for a term of one year to run consecutively and not concurrently; and the court may additionally sentence the person convicted for an indeterminate term not to exceed five years to run consecutively and not concurrently.
- (d) Any person convicted of violating Subsection (1)(a)(iv) is guilty of a first degree felony punishable by imprisonment for an indeterminate term of not less than seven years and which may be for life. Imposition or execution of the sentence may not be suspended, and the person is not eligible for probation.
- (2) Prohibited acts B Penalties:
- (a) It is unlawful:
- (i) for any person knowingly and intentionally to possess or use a controlled substance, unless it was obtained under a valid prescription or order, directly from a practitioner while acting in the course of his professional practice, or as otherwise authorized by this chapter;
- (ii) for any owner, tenant, licensee, or person in control of any building, room, tenement, vehicle, boat, aircraft, or other place knowingly and intentionally to permit them to be occupied by persons unlawfully possessing, using, or distributing controlled substances in any of those locations; or
- (iii) for any person knowingly and intentionally to possess an altered or forged prescription or written order for a controlled substance.

- (b) Any person convicted of violating Subsection (2)(a)(i) with respect to:
- (i) marijuana, if the amount is 100 pounds or more, is guilty of a second degree felony;
- (ii) a substance classified in Schedule I or II, marijuana, if the amount is more than 16 ounces, but less than 100 pounds, or a controlled substance analog, is guilty of a third degree felony; or
- (iii) marijuana, if the marijuana is not in the form of an extracted resin from any part of the plant, and the amount is more than one ounce but less than 16 ounces, is guilty of a class A misdemeanor.
- (c) Any person convicted of violating Subsection (2)(a)(i) while inside the exterior boundaries of property occupied by any correctional facility as defined in Section 64–13–1 or any public jail or other place of confinement shall be sentenced to a penalty one degree greater than provided in Subsection (2)(b).
- (d) Upon a second or subsequent conviction of possession of any controlled substance by a person, that person shall be sentenced to a one degree greater penalty than provided in this Subsection (2).
- (e) Any person who violates Subsection (2)(a)(i) with respect to all other controlled substances not included in Subsection (2)(b)(i), (ii), or (iii), including less than one ounce of marijuana, is guilty of a class B misdemeanor. Upon a second conviction the person is guilty of a class A misdemeanor, and upon a third or subsequent conviction the person is guilty of a third degree felony.
- (f) Any person convicted of violating Subsection (2)(a)(ii) or (2)(a)(iii) is:
- (i) on a first conviction, guilty of a class B misdemeanor;
- (ii) on a second conviction, guilty of a class A misdemeanor; and
- (iii) on a third or subsequent conviction, guilty of a third degree felony.
- (g) A person is subject to the penalties under Subsection (4)(c) who, in an offense not amounting to a violation of Section 76–5–207:
- (i) violates Subsection (2)(a)(i) by knowingly and intentionally having in his body any measurable amount of a controlled substance; and
- (ii) operates a motor vehicle as defined in Section 76–5–207 in a negligent manner, causing serious bodily injury as defined in Section 76–1–601 or the death of another.
- (3) Prohibited acts C Penalties:
- (a) It is unlawful for any person knowingly and intentionally:
- (i) to use in the course of the manufacture or distribution of a controlled substance a license number which is fictitious, revoked, suspended, or issued to another person or, for the purpose of obtaining a controlled

- substance, to assume the title of, or represent himself to be, a manufacturer, wholesaler, apothecary, physician, dentist, veterinarian, or other authorized person;
- (ii) to acquire or obtain possession of, to procure or attempt to procure the administration of, to obtain a prescription for, to prescribe or dispense to any person known to be attempting to acquire or obtain possession of, or to procure the administration of any controlled substance by misrepresentation or failure by the person to disclose his receiving any controlled substance from another source, fraud, forgery, deception, subterfuge, alteration of a prescription or written order for a controlled substance, or the use of a false name or address;
- (iii) to make any false or forged prescription or written order for a controlled substance, or to utter the same, or to alter any prescription or written order issued or written under the terms of this chapter; or
- (iv) to make, distribute, or possess any punch, die, plate, stone, or other thing designed to print, imprint, or reproduce the trademark, trade name, or other identifying mark, imprint, or device of another or any likeness of any of the foregoing upon any drug or container or labeling so as to render any drug a counterfeit controlled substance.
- (b) Any person convicted of violating Subsection (3)(a) is guilty of a third degree felony.
- (4) Prohibited acts D Penalties:
- (a) Notwithstanding other provisions of this section, a person not authorized under this chapter who commits any act declared to be unlawful under this section, Title 58, Chapter 37a, Utah Drug Paraphernalia Act, or under Title 58, Chapter 37b, Imitation Controlled Substances Act, is upon conviction subject to the penalties and classifications under Subsection (4)(b) if the act is committed:
- (i) in a public or private elementary or secondary school or on the grounds of any of those schools;
- (ii) in a public or private vocational school or postsecondary institution or on the grounds of any of those schools or institutions;
- (iii) in those portions of any building, park, stadium, or other structure or grounds which are, at the time of the act, being used for an activity sponsored by or through a school or institution under Subsections (4)(a)(i) and (ii);
- (iv) in or on the grounds of a preschool or child–care facility;
- (v) in a public park, amusement park, arcade, or recreation center;
- (vi) in a church or synagogue;
- (vii) in a shopping mall, sports facility, stadium, arena, theater, movie house, playhouse, or parking lot or structure adjacent thereto;

- (viii) in a public parking lot or structure;
- (ix) within 1,000 feet of any structure, facility, or grounds included in Subsections (4)(a)(i) through (viii); or
- (x) in the immediate presence of a person younger than 18 years of age, regardless of where the act occurs.
- (b) A person convicted under this Subsection (4) is guilty of a first degree felony and shall be imprisoned for a term of not less than five years if the penalty that would otherwise have been established but for this subsection would have been a first degree felony. Imposition or execution of the sentence may not be suspended, and the person is not eligible for probation.
- (c) If the classification that would otherwise have been established would have been less than a first degree felony but for this Subsection (4), a person convicted under <u>Subsection (2)(g) or</u> this Subsection (4) is guilty of one degree more than the maximum penalty prescribed for that offense.
- (d) It is not a defense to a prosecution under this Subsection (4) that the actor mistakenly believed the individual to be 18 years of age or older at the time of the offense or was unaware of the individual's true age; nor that the actor mistakenly believed that the location where the act occurred was not as described in Subsection (4)(a) or was unaware that the location where the act occurred was as described in Subsection (4)(a).
- (5) Any violation of this chapter for which no penalty is specified is a class B misdemeanor.
- (6) (a) Any penalty imposed for violation of this section is in addition to, and not in lieu of, any civil or administrative penalty or sanction authorized by law.
- (b) Where violation of this chapter violates a federal law or the law of another state, conviction or acquittal under federal law or the law of another state for the same act is a bar to prosecution in this state.
- (7) In any prosecution for a violation of this chapter, evidence or proof which shows a person or persons produced, manufactured, possessed, distributed, or dispensed a controlled substance or substances, is prima facie evidence that the person or persons did so with knowledge of the character of the substance or substances.
- (8) This section does not prohibit a veterinarian, in good faith and in the course of his professional practice only and not for humans, from prescribing, dispensing, or administering controlled substances or from causing the substances to be administered by an assistant or orderly under his direction and supervision.

- (9) Civil or criminal liability may not be imposed under this section on:
- (a) any person registered under the Controlled Substances Act who manufactures, distributes, or possesses an imitation controlled substance for use as a placebo or investigational new drug by a registered practitioner in the ordinary course of professional practice or research; or
- (b) any law enforcement officer acting in the course and legitimate scope of his employment.

- (5)(a) "Net revenues the State Tax Commission collects from credit unions" means the amount of net revenues the State Tax Commission collects:
- (i)(A) from nonexempt credit unions under Section 59–7–102; and
- (B) from credit unions under Section 7–9–56 if that section takes effect on May 3, 2004; and
- (ii) for a collection period.
- (b) In accordance with Title 63, Chapter 46a, Utah Administrative Rulemaking Act, the State Tax Commission may by rule define "net revenues the State Tax Commission collects from credit unions."
- (6) "Nonexempt credit union" is as defined in Section 7–9–3.
- [(4)] (7) "Pupil in average daily membership (ADM)" means a full–day equivalent pupil.
- [(5)] (8) (a) "State–supported minimum school program" or "minimum school program" means public school programs for kindergarten, elementary, and secondary schools as described in this Subsection [(5)] (8).
- (b) The minimum school program established in the districts shall include the equivalent of a school term of nine months as determined by the State Board of Education.

- (c) (i) The board shall establish the number of days or equivalent instructional hours that school is held for an academic school year.
- (ii) Education, enhanced by utilization of technologically enriched delivery systems, when approved by local school boards, shall receive full support by the State Board of Education as it pertains to fulfilling the attendance requirements, excluding time spent viewing commercial advertising.
- (d) The program shall be operated and maintained for the total of the following annual costs:
- (i) the cost of a basic state-supported school program;
- (ii) other amounts appropriated in Chapter 17a in addition to the basic program; and
- (iii) school construction aid programs authorized under Title 53A, Chapter 21, Public Education Capital Outlay Act.
- [(6)] (9) "Weighted pupil unit or units" means the unit of measure of factors that is computed in accordance with this chapter for the purpose of determining the costs of a program on a uniform basis for each district.

- (2) (a) The state shall contribute to each district toward the cost of the

basic program in the district that portion which exceeds the proceeds of the levy authorized under Subsection (1).

- (b) In accord with the state strategic plan for public education and to fulfill its responsibility for the development and implementation of that plan, the Legislature instructs the State Board of Education, the governor, and the Office of Legislative Fiscal Analyst in each of the coming five years to develop budgets that will fully fund student enrollment growth.
- (3) (a) If the proceeds of the levy authorized under Subsection (1) equal or exceed the cost of the basic program in a school district, no state contribution shall be made to the basic program.
- (b) The proceeds of the levy authorized under Subsection (1) which exceed the cost of the basic program shall be paid into the Uniform School Fund as provided by law."

INTENT LANGUAGE TO 1ST SUB. H.B. 159

"In passing H.B. 159, VOLUNTARY CONTRIBUTION ACT AMENDMENTS, the Legislature intends the following:

Because the Legislature wishes to prevent government entanglement in the debate of public issues by providing for a level playing field for private organizations in the public forum, the Voluntary Contributions Act and these amendments prohibit public employers from using public resources and public payroll systems to collect political contributions for the benefit of any organization.

The Voluntary Contribution Act and these amendments protect members of labor organizations in Utah from having their union due diverted to fund political purposes.

Because Section 34–32–1, as it existed before enactment of the Voluntary Contribution Act in 2001, appeared to create favored status for labor organizations as compared to other non–labor organizations by allowing public employers to collect political contributions from public employees for the sole benefit of labor organizations, this act, and the 2001 act, seek to protect against any perception of government favoritism towards any organization by enacting a comprehensive ban on the collection of political contributions by public employees.

In order to guarantee the ability of labor organizations to participate in the electoral process, the Voluntary Contributions Act and these amendments provide that labor organizations may establish a political fund, funded by voluntary

contributions, through which labor organizations may engage in legal activities for political purposes.

Although Utah Supreme Court case law is clear that courts should view all statutes passed by the Legislature as severable if they meed the Supreme Court's standards for severability, the Legislature affirms that the provisions of H.B. 159, VOLUNTARY CONTRIBUTION ACT AMENDMENTS, are severable as provided in these 2003 amendments.

Because legislation passed by the Legislature is prospective in application unless the Legislature includes a specific clause mandating retroactivity, the Legislature affirms that the provisions of this law be interpreted and applied with prospective effect as provided in these 2003 amendments."

- because of the Utah Supreme Court's decision in Laney, there is some confusion about the effect of that decision on government entity's exposure to tort liability for certain acts;
- as the implications of that decision are analyzed and addressed by affected governmental entities, the plaintiff's bar, the government defense bar, and the Legislature, it is good public policy to clarify the continued applicability of statutory caps until the issues raised by Laney can be addressed more comprehensively;
- the Utah Supreme court has indicated that statutory caps on the amount of judgments for damages for personal injury against a government entity is constitutional and is an appropriate public policy for any function undertaken by government, whether characterized as governmental or proprietary;
- because taxpayers ultimately bear the financial burden of any liability imposed upon a governmental entity, reasonable limitations on governmental

liability are necessary to protect the taxpayers from excessive fiscal burdens and assure that public services can be provided to the people as is determined necessary by government; and

• the caps established by this act are among the highest in the United States and are adjusted biennially for inflation."

COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE GOVERNOR

Mr. President Mansell and Speaker Stephens: March 24, 2003 This is to inform you that on March 24, 2003, I signed **S.B. 66**, ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE ENFORCEMENT AND TREATMENT, and transmitted it to the Lieutenant Governor for filing. As I reviewed this bill, I discovered a funding issue that needs correction.

Funding to implement the bill includes \$3,255,666 in Fiscal Year 2004 for local law enforcement. The Legislature put funds into the newly created Alcoholic Beverage Enforcement and Treatment Restricted Account for that purpose, but failed to make the required appropriation to local law enforcement. The oversight ought to be corrected, and I intend to place this issue on the call of a special session.

Mr. President Mansell and Speaker Stephens:

March 24, 2003

This is to inform you that on March 24, 2003, I decided, after careful consideration and study, to veto **H.B. 105**, INTERNET PRIVACY AND SECURITY AMENDMENTS, and have transmitted it to the Lieutenant Governor for filing.

We live in an age of rapid technological change. The Internet has changed and will continue to change our society dramatically. One of the important goals of my administration is to use this powerful tool to provide government services online. E–government transactions cost less, are more convenient, take less time to process, and do not require travel to a government office. They are also available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

With all of these advantages, however, there is potential for misuse. The privacy and security of Internet transactions is important to the success of e–government. The same can be said of private Internet transactions. House Bill 105 attempts to address this important topic. I share the sponsor's desire to protect the security and privacy of these transactions.

In it original form, the bill mandated a number of restrictions on Internet Service Providers ("ISPs") as well as on state government. In the course of debate, the Legislature ultimately opted to drop the restrictions on ISPs and engage in further study. I am vetoing this bill because the restrictions it imposes on state government also deserve further study. In their current form, I believe these restrictions are somewhat impractical and will increase the costs and burdens of e–government unnecessarily.

I have a high degree of confidence in the present security of our state system and the privacy of the transactions we now process. I pledge to engage in further

study of this topic and to seek continuous improvements in the privacy and security of e-government.

Mr. President Mansell and Speaker Stephens:

March 24, 2003

This is to inform you that on March 24, 2003, I decided, after careful consideration and study, to veto **H.B. 168**, FILLING MIDTERM VACANCIES IN THE LEGISLATURE, and have transmitted it to the Lieutenant Governor for filing.

House Bill 168 started out as a technical clean up. An amendment changed the bill's character to remove from the governor the right to fill midterm vacancies in the Legislature and confer that right instead on the speaker of the House and president of the Senate for vacancies in the House of Representatives and Senate, respectively.

The founders of our nation rightly recognized the potential for one branch to seek to increase its authority at the expense of another. Human nature being what it is, the founders provided us with checks and balances. The success of our democracy depends on continuous, unbending allegiance to separation of powers and checks and balances. Because **H.B. 168** takes a step — even a relatively small step — in the wrong direction, I feel compelled to veto.

I do not want to overstate possible negative motives legislators may have had in passing this bill. I have come to recognize that my ability to appoint new legislators is largely ceremonial. The governor appoints new legislators selected by the party leaders and delegates who selected the prior holder of the seat for candidacy.

However, the governor's appointment authority has importance in one significant way: The governor is a neutral party with respect to the internal governance of the legislative chambers. Put more directly, the gubernatorial appointment of a new legislator is unlikely to influence internal leadership politics. The net effect of this bill is, in contrast, to strengthen the political base of the sitting chairs of the House and Senate. The governor's ability to appoint new legislators to vacant seats is clearly a check on the power of the chair.

A lesson can be drawn from the appointment of judges. Our system of checks and balances provides that the executive selects a judge, subject to Senate approval; not one but both of the other branches thus provide a check on the

judiciary. If sitting judges appointed new judges, they would be able to perpetuate their own, perhaps erroneous, viewpoints and build allegiances to one another that would make politics, not the law, the supreme consideration in court.

For similar reasons, sitting legislative leaders should not be able [to] perpetuate their own leadership base by appointing new legislators. I feel it is my duty to exercise my check on the legislative branch by vetoing this bill.

Mr. President Mansell and Speaker Stephens:

March 24, 2003

This is to inform you that on March 24, 2003, after careful study and consideration, I decided to veto **S.B. 165**, GUBERNATORIAL NOMINEE AMENDMENTS, and have transmitted it to the Lieutenant Governor for filing.

Senate Bill 165 requires the governor, when making a judicial appointment, to "immediately provide" to the Senate a variety of information, most of which is acceptable to me and which I already supply. One aspect of the bill, however, is unacceptable. It is a provision that requires me to forward 'the name, address, and telephone number of each person who gave information to the governor or his staff about the judicial appointee,' whether the information was solicited or not.

I consider this requirement to be akin to an impediment on free speech, both mine and of those who comment on judicial candidates.

I am certain legislators would react negatively if I adopted a rule that before I sign a bill they must forward to me a complete list, including names, addresses and telephone numbers, of all lobbyists and constituents who have expressed an opinion on the bill.

The objective of reviewing candidates for judicial office is to get the best information possible. This proposed change in the law will have a chilling effect on my ability to do that. Those who comment to me or my staff have an expectation of confidentiality. Some comments come from sitting judge who may have to work with the person about whom they are commenting. Others are members of the bar who could well have to appear before that person in court. Many others who comment are members of the Legislature. The very act of commenting about a judicial candidate provides a premise for later prejudice. While I am confident the Senate would intend to keep my list of contacts confidential, I believe they are as equipped as I to receive or solicit comments. They have 60 days within which to review my choice of a single appointee. I have

only 30 days within which to review the five to seven nominees forwarded to me by the judicial nominating commission.

I feel a heavy responsibility to make selections for judicial office after most careful consideration. It is in my interest to be as helpful as possible during the Senate's confirmation process as well. I thought the recent Supreme Court confirmation process went very well, considering it was a new — and consequently somewhat tense — experience for all concerned. I congratulate the Senate for its good work. The public benefitted from the Senate's careful review. I invite the Legislature to respect my selection process, as I respect their confirmation process, and work cooperatively toward the best choices possible. In the spirit of cooperation I am willing to comply voluntarily with the other provisions of **S.B. 165** and would consider the bill's reenactment with the requirement for names, address and phone numbers. However, I do not think of any of the three branches of government benefits from that proposed additional constraint on candor and discretion.

Mr. President Mansell and Speaker Stephens:

March 24, 2003

This is to inform you that on March 24, 2003, I decided to veto **S.B. 251**, FIREARMS REVISIONS, at the request of the bill's sponsor and have transmitted it to the Lieutenant Governor for filing.

Under current law, it is a criminal offense to shoot a gun from a vehicle; shoot at road signs; shoot railroad equipment; shoot power poles or utility property; shoot in or around state—owned campsites, picnic sites, beaches, and golf courses; or shoot within 600 feet of private dwellings, barns and other buildings without permission of the owner.

Senate Bill 251, as intended by the sponsor, added that it would also be unlawful to discharge a weapon in the direction of occupied vehicles and dwellings.

In the course of debate, the bill was amended to require that for all these offenses a prosecutor must prove that the offender acted "knowingly and intentionally." In lay terms, "knowing and intentional" may seem only to mean "on purpose." In criminal law, however, these additional words increase the standard of proof considerably. To get a conviction for any of the above acts, a prosecutor would need to prove the state of mind of the offender with objective evidence beyond a reasonable doubt. In effect, the bill as passed decreases the

enforceability of the current law substantially. I agree with the bill's sponsor that this bill should not become law.
