Legislative Review Note as of 2-9-04 9:04 AM

The Utah Constitution, Article I, Section 11, provides every person with open access to the courts for an injury done to his person, property, or reputation. If a court determined that a person's physical size could be attributed to their consumption of certain types of food served by a certain establishment, thereby causing them injury, this legislation might violate the Utah Supreme Court's interpretation of Article 1, Section 11, because it provides immunity to an owner or operator of a restaurant from suits by persons claiming that being obese is a consequence of dining at a certain establishment.
