

#### PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE





Having just completed my final session as President of the Senate, I want to thank my colleagues for giving me the opportunity to serve in this capacity for the past four years. These years have been some of the finest of my life. I have had experiences I never expected to have, and my colleagues in the senate have played a very important role in making that possible. I express my appreciation to Senator Mike Dmitrich and his leadership team—Senators Ron Allen, Gene Davis, and Karen Hale—for their support and cooperation in making some important and sometimes difficult

decisions. I also express appreciation to the majority leadership team—Senators Michael Waddoups, John Valentine, and Peter Knudson—for making these last two years of my presidency especially memorable. I want to pay special tribute to Senators Leonard Blackham and Bill Hickman for their work on the budget and to Senator Lyle Hillyard for his service as Rules Committee Chair. I also express appreciation to all the committee chairs, the legislative staff, and the senate staff for their dedication and commitment to the process. Overall, I am pleased with the work accomplished during the 2004 general session and the bipartisan effort to pass good legislation. I believe the 55th Legislature has served the people of the state of Utah well.

This session has not been without controversy, however. The passage of Senate Bill 24 creates a marriage–recognition policy for the state and adds the requirement that applicants for a marriage license be a man and a woman. Senate Bill 175 modifies the Utah Uniform Forfeiture Procedures Act. House Bill 268 amends the Child and Family Services and Judicial Code and creates the Office of Child Welfare Parental Defense. These bills all generated a great deal of public interest and healthy debate.

The Senate will bid farewell in December to two of its members who have decided not to run for re–election. They are Senator David Gladwell (R, District 19) who has served in the legislature for 8 years (4 in the House of Representatives and 4 in the Senate) and Senator Bill Wright (R, District 13) who has served for 16 years (12 in the House of Representatives and 4 in the Senate). The Senate also welcomed Senator Sheldon Killpack who was appointed to replace Senator David Steele (R, District 21) who resigned in June of 2003. Senator Steele was elected in 1986.

During my tenure as President of the Senate, I can truly say that I did my very best to be fair and honest with everyone; and if I could ask to be remembered for one thing, it would be that I was successful in achieving that goal.



#### REMARKS BY PRESIDENT MANSELL

I was reading what I perceived to be a bit of a joke, but I thought it had a very interesting base.

Two men arrived at the Pearly Gates at about the same time, both wanting to know if they would be admitted to Heaven. St. Peter asked the first man his name, where he was from, and what he did in life. The man answered that his name was John Smith and that he was a taxi driver in New York City. St. Peter looked at his book and then gave the man a luxurious robe and a golden staff and bid him welcome into Heaven for his eternal reward.

St. Peter then asked the second man the same question, and he replied that his name was Thomas O'Malley, and that he was a Catholic priest in Chicago. St. Peter looked at his book and then gave the man a cotton robe and a wood staff and bid him enter into Heaven for his eternal reward.

Father O'Malley said, "Wait a minute. Why does that taxi cab driver get a silver robe and a golden staff while I, a Catholic priest and a man of God, got a cotton robe and a wooden staff." With that, I would just like to thank you for the opportunity again this year to be able to serve as your Senate President. It has been a pleasure to do so for the past three and a half/four sessions. There are days that I would happily give up this job, and then there are days that are quite fun and quite rewarding. As we go through this session, I hope that each of you will have the opportunity to get some enjoyment out of it.

I would just caution you again, as I have in other sessions, to make sure that as we deal with one another and as we deal with the public, that we do so in a civil manner, that we are able to disagree but not be disagreeable, that we are able to work with those who come up here to see us and be able to discuss information with them.

One of the great statements I've heard is a statement that says, "If everybody thinks alike, somebody isn't thinking." I happen to agree that it's true. So the fact that we don't all agree in what we are thinking is not a bad thing; but we need to make sure that as we go through this process and don't think alike, that we have active debate.

One of the things that I am not trying to do with this little bit of direction is to say that we should not have active debate—we certainly should have. We should have debate in a manner that is befitting the positions that we hold.

With that, I would just like to thank you again for your service here. I know it is a sacrifice for each and every one of you to be up here for the next 45 days. I have found over the years that I have been up here that it is a much greater sacrifice of time, reputation and effort than anything I would ever have imagined when I first came. So, I thank you for your willingness to come here and serve.

#### STATE OF THE JUDICIARY

It is a great pleasure to discuss the condition of Utah's judicial branch of government. I do so in my capacity as the Chair of the Utah Judicial Council, the body constitutionally charged with the power and obligation to make rules for the administration of the courts. Some of you may not be aware of the composition and role of the Council. It is a representative body composed of judges selected by each of the appellate and trial courts for three- to six-year terms, along with a lawyer selected by the Utah State Bar. The Administrative Office of the Courts provides staff support to the Council and, under the Council's direction, administrative support to all of the courts of the state. The Council operates by majority vote, and is responsible for the development of policy and procedure relating to the budget and the operations of the entire judicial branch. It relies upon information and input on priorities that come from governing Boards of Judges for each of the court levels – appellate, district, juvenile, and justice courts. As the chief administrative officer for the system, the chief justice has the obligation to preside over the Council's work, to contribute direction to its goals and policies, and to serve as a spokesperson for the judicial branch.

The governance system I have just described is probably the most "representative" or "democratic" system of judicial governance in the United States, in terms of the participation it permits and requires from all court levels, and the degree of cooperation and collaboration it encourages from all parts of the system. The Supreme Court, for example, has a number of constitutional responsibilities that belong solely to it, as opposed to the Council, such as the promulgation of rules of procedure and evidence, the management of the appellate process, the governance of the practice of law, and the power to impose sanctions for judicial misconduct upon recommendation from the Judicial Conduct Commission. In turn, the court relies on the administrative staff of the Council for support in the management of many of its separate constitutional duties such as the rule–making process. In sum, we have in Utah both a highly organized and a very collaborative system of governance for the judiciary.

What I believe to be the excellence of our governance structure is critical to the operation of a court system for the 21st century. Times have changed dramatically for state courts in the last thirty years. As is the case for the rest of the private and

public sectors, information management and sophisticated communication systems characterize our everyday business. We rely on professional training and education for our staff and our judges to keep up with always increasing demands for efficiency and effectiveness. In recent years, our people have consistently been asked to do more with less in terms of resources. We have actually had to downsize by 100 people, eight percent of our non–judicial workforce. I would like to publicly acknowledge the commitment to excellence and to public service that court personnel have shown during hard times.

Another significant development in the work of state courts with which you will be familiar is the still–growing initiative known as problem–solving justice. Far from being a departure from so–called "traditional" adjudication, I see problem–solving justice as a necessary and vital evolution of the core functions of courts; courts exist to provide peaceful and fair places for individuals and society to bring some of their most difficult and painful problems, and resolving problems sometimes requires more than merely disposing of cases. As long ago as 1971, a federal judge made the following observation about what was happening to American courts:

We expect courts to encompass every reach of the law, and we expect law to encircle us in our earthly sphere and to travel with us to the alien vastness of outer space. We want courts to sustain personal liberty, to end our racial tensions, to outlaw war, and to sweep contaminants from the globe. We ask courts to shield us from public wrong and private temptation, to penalize us for our transgressions and to restrain those who would transgress against us, to adjust our private differences, to resuscitate our moribund businesses, to protect us prenatally, to marry us, to divorce us, and, if not to bury us, at least to see to it that our funeral expenses are paid. (Hufstedler, Charles Evans Hughes Address, N.Y. County Bar Association, 1971)

We could all extend that list of expectations with no trouble at all, and it would contain just about every significant public and private problem anyone could identify. That said, however, it is important to remember that state court dockets tend to consist overwhelmingly of the stuff of everyday life – the repeated minor criminal acts of defendants who can't seem to get their lives together for reasons that include things like substance abuse and lack of education and employment skills, landlords and tenants with disagreements over rent and repairs, families that come to court when relationships go bad, and the tragic aftermath of domestic violence, child abuse, and juvenile delinquency. These categories account for a huge percentage, certainly half or more, of the cases in Utah's courts. And Utah's courts do a good job of staying on top of individual cases. Despite crowded dockets, our trial courts meet or exceed most national case—processing guidelines, and we have not seen the frightening delays that have compromised justice in other states. We could probably, in fact, continue to do nothing but fine—tune our case disposition systems, and still call ourselves a well—run court system.

We aspire to do more, however, and we have embraced the concept that behind the thousands of "everyday" cases I described earlier, there are tens of thousands of people in pain and distress, who cannot solve their problems themselves. Conventional case processing may dispose of legal questions connected to those problems, but it does little to address the real difficulties that cause people to return to court again and again. Nor does it adequately account for the increasing numbers of people who lack the resources to obtain meaningful access to the courts in the first place. Utah's courts today are invested not just in the disposition of cases, but also in case outcomes and in ensuring access to justice for everyone in our community.

As my counterpart in New York, Chief Judge Judith Kaye, said in a speech last year:

Problem—solving courts are courts. They strive to ensure due process, to engage in neutral fact—finding, and to dispense fair and impartial justice. What's different is that these courts have developed a new architecture — including new technology, new staffing and new linkages — to improve the effectiveness of court sanctions, particularly intermediate sanctions like drug treatment and community restitution. (Kaye, "Delivering Justice Today," Anderson Memorial Lecture, Yale Law School, April 2003)

Nowhere is this focus on outcomes more apparent in Utah's courts than in the juvenile arena. Due to months and years of work by the courts, the legislature, and child welfare advocates, children from non–functioning families, who a decade or two ago could have been expected to grow up in foster care and frequently to graduate from the juvenile to the adult criminal courts, can now be expected to reunite with their parents thanks to services and programs designed to help those parents, or to be permanently placed in loving, stable homes where their chances of success in life will be greatly enhanced. The following is a letter shared with me by the juvenile court judge who received it two years ago from a little boy I will call "Josh." I have also changed the other names in the letter.

## Dear Judge:

I'm just writing this letter to let you know a few things.

I remember the day I was taken away from Sally. I packed one Winnie the Pooh shirt, two toys, a bunny, and an angel teddy bear. I felt sad when I was taken away from Sally.

I went to the Christmas Box House for a day, then I left that night. I cried a lot, hugging my bear and bunny. Then I went to Mary Brown's house. She had three children. The oldest was named Jerry, the second oldest was named Matt, the youngest was named Debra. They were nice because we were close in age. I was sad when I left their house because they were nice.

Then I went to Mary and Jack Wilson's. They had one child; his name was Pete. He was one—and—a—half. They were very kind. It was hard for me to say goodbye. I was sad when I left.

I went to Susan and Bill Jones' house. They had other foster children. Their names were Jackson and Maddie. They were fun because we were close in age. It was hard to go because they were my friends, so I was sad.

Then I went to Kent and Joan Smith's house, my adoptive parents. They're great. I love them a lot more than they think and I feel safe and happy because they're loving and kind, and care about me a lot more than I think they do.

I just wanted you to know that.

Love, Josh

The little boy who wrote that letter was seven years old. He is the second youngest child of nine born to a single mother with serious functional deficits, probably related to cognitive impairments. One of the older children in the same family first came into the court system when she was two months old and the subject of a neglect referral. She literally grew up in a long series of foster care homes. Services were not provided to her mother, who was never able to regain custody (and was in fact unable to care for subsequent children), but whose parental rights were never terminated. Every twelve to eighteen months a court review would determine there was no change of circumstance and would continue previous orders for foster care. At age 18, this young woman appeared before the court and asked, heartbreakingly, why an adoptive family had never been found for her. Another of the brothers, four years younger, had a similar experience, but his court record begins to show delinquency referrals from age nine, including theft, possession of dangerous weapons, assault, alcohol, tobacco and truancy violations. If I have read his court records correctly, he was referred for delinquent acts 51 times during a nine year period during which he was in foster care. I can't help wondering where he is now, and suspecting that his life still brings him regularly to court. These events preceded the Child Welfare Act of 1994 and the present commitment of the courts to provide oversight and leadership in outcomes for children, the kind of outcome that permits Josh to declare, after so many "I was sad's", that he now feels safe and happy.

The courts' role in the process of problem solving is vital: the "Key Principles for Permanency Planning for Children" from the National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges identifies, among others, the following obligations of judges. I cite them in illustration of my point that courts no longer simply "adjudicate" cases.

- -Judges must ensure that the courts they administer provide efficient and timely justice for children and their families.
- -Judges must ensure that their juvenile and family court system has the capacity to collect, analyze, and report aggregate data relating to judicial performance,

including the timely processing of cases, to ensure the achievement of permanency for children who are under court jurisdiction.

- Judges must convene and engage the community in meaningful partnerships to promote the safety and permanency of children.
- -Judges must use their legal authority to ensure that social and protective services are immediately available to families whose children have been placed at risk of abuse or neglect.
- -Judges must provide oversight of children and families under court jurisdiction to ensure that these children are safe and have a permanent home in a timely fashion and that the parents/caretakers receive due process of law.

The striking characteristic of these principles is the expansive nature of the responsibilities they place on judges – not just for processing cases, but for protecting and helping people. I am told that research shows that almost everything that happens to move children in custody towards permanent resolution happens in the nine days before the next court hearing – whenever that hearing is – six, three, or one month later. The average length of time a Utah child used to spend in the limbo of foster care was two to three years. Now it is ten and a half months. That change is in significant part the result of your legislative work and the way judges now treat these cases.

I could talk about problem-solving courts in the adult arena also – drug courts, mental health courts, domestic violence courts – but I think it is very easy for all of us to understand the high stakes nature of what judges do when we think about it in terms we all experience – families and children. I know that child welfare issues will be a significant part of your agenda in this session, and I want to emphasize that the courts have a stake only in the following three things: (1) the safety and welfare of at-risk children; (2) the preservation of fundamental due process rights for parents and family members; and (3)adequate resources for good decision-making (including legal representation for all parties to court proceedings) and good outcomes. The juvenile judge who shared the letter I read to you earlier has been involved with Josh's family for over twenty years now, and tells me that there are children on her docket who represent the third and fourth generations of children from families for whom earlier methods have failed, many of whom literally grew up in foster care. This judge says that Josh's story, and that of two of his other siblings who have been permanently placed under the current scheme, may reflect the beginning of the end of large numbers of children lost in the limbo of foster care. The judge also, and less optimistically, predicts an upcoming "balloon" in the number of delinquency referrals as earlier generations of those children experience the aftermath of the lack of stability in their early lives.

Before I leave the subject of juvenile justice, I want to mention briefly an innovation of recent duration: the pilot program opening juvenile court proceedings to the public. The courts participating in the pilot have worked hard

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to create public awareness and protocols that have allowed, so far, a smooth transition. We hope the experiment will yield good information for the development of future practices in this area. We all benefit when the work of institutions that serve the public is visible and understandable. We are committed to the idea that the courts must be accountable, and we supported this legislation for that very reason.

I have said a good deal about the outcome focused nature of the ways courts and judges view cases these days. From an administrative perspective, we are also making efforts to focus on effectiveness and outcomes and to evaluate our use of resources. We need to be certain that we are investing limited time and money in programs that, first of all, work, but also, and more importantly, are in line with our highest priorities and needs. To that end, the Judicial Council has asked each of the court levels, and each programmatic entity within the court system (including the Council itself), to assess all aspects of court operations in terms of importance and effectiveness. We are undertaking this effort partially in response to the significant budget losses we have incurred over the past few years and in view of the likelihood that our state's economic recovery will not be instantaneous. We are also doing it because it seems to us to be good stewardship over our public responsibilities. Once again, our people constitute our most important asset, and the Judicial Council is depending on them to inform policy and budget priorities for today's and tomorrow's courts.

Finally, let me say a word about issues relating to access to justice and the delivery of legal services. We in the courts are well aware of the need to shore up and maintain public trust and confidence in our institutions. We are actively engaged in numerous public outreach and public educational programs designed to explain the courts, our constitutional system, and the importance of the rule of law to the larger community. We are also very sensitive to the changing characteristics of the people who need to use our services. Just as our dockets are filled by the stuff of everyday life, the people behind the cases are everyday people, sometimes without the resources to obtain legal representation. The courts have done much to facilitate access by pro se litigants, and to make information and forms available on line to the public. Likewise, there are numerous entities in the private and non-profit sector who offer discounted or free legal services for persons of limited means, and the Supreme Court and the Utah Bar have encouraged lawyers to perform pro bono services to meet some of the need. The Bar estimates, based on reported pro bono hours and contributions to the And Justice For All fund, that lawyers have donated \$10,000,000 in services and cash to provide legal services to the poor in Utah.

There have been and are now many conversations going on in Utah to address the problem of access to civil justice and the delivery of legal services. I believe the time has come for the creation of a broad-based community initiative to assess the need for legal services in Utah and to bring together the many strands of interest in this problem. We have remarkable resources, and admirable collaboration, in our state, including the Community Legal Center, which the legislature helped fund in its inception and which now houses four different legal service entities under one roof, the And Justice for All project, a cooperative fund–raising program that supports those entities, the clinical pro bono programs at our two excellent law schools, where students learn to be lawyers and provide valuable services at the same time, the Utah State Bar's projects on pro bono and delivery of legal services, the on–line court assistance programs, and the self–representation clinics currently being staffed by legal services lawyers, sometimes in the courthouses themselves, and other programs too numerous to mention. It is time to take these efforts to the next level, and to create a network of providers, stakeholders, lawmakers, community leaders, consumers, lawyers and court leaders who can address the issue of access to justice on a statewide level. Other states have begun this effort. Washington state, for example, has created such a network, known as the Access to Justice Board, whose five founding principles are:

- -Access to justice is a fundamental right in a just society.
- -Access to justice requires . . . [that] legal issues must be adequately understood, presented, and dealt with in a timely, fair, and impartial manner.
- -Access to justice depends on the availability of affordable legal information and services, including assistance and representation when needed.
- -Access to justice needs adequate funding, resources and support.
- -Equal justice under the law requires that justice be available to all people . . . regardless of the popularity of the cause involved, status, or other considerations or characteristics. (State of Washington Access to Justice Board Principles, adopted May 8, 2003)

Let me repeat the first principle: "access to justice is a fundamental right in a just society." The responsibility for guaranteeing and protecting it does not lie only with courts and lawyers. It belongs to all who aspire to live in a just society. I believe, however, that the Judicial Council, our court, and the Utah State Bar, which we supervise, can and should play a significant part in putting this issue on our statewide public policy agenda. I know that many of you also have long—standing concerns about access to justice, and I hope that we will find ways to strengthen the vision of a just society in our state and to form partnerships that work. As we begin to think about how to accomplish this, I look forward to productive conversations with your leadership on these important questions.

In conclusion, may I say how grateful I am, and we in the judicial branch of government are, for your service and for your courtesy in inviting me here today. We wish you success and look forward to working with you in the session ahead.

#### JOINT CONVENTION

President Al Mansell called the Joint Convention to order at 6:00 p.m. in the Chamber of the Utah House of Representatives and recognized Martin R. Stephens, Speaker of the House.

President Mansell announced that a quorum of the House of Representatives and the Senate was present.

President Mansell appointed a Joint Committee comprised of Senators Michael Waddoups, John Valentine, and Mike Dmitrich, and Representatives Greg Curtis, Jeff Alexander, and Brent Goodfellow to notify Governor Olene S. Walker that the 2004 General Session of the Fifty–Fifth Legislature is in Joint Convention and ready to hear her State–of–the–State address.

President Mansell acknowledged special guests and elected and appointed officials in attendance at the Joint Convention.

Senator Peter Knudson made a motion that the Legislature resolve into a Joint Convention and Committee of the Whole for the purpose of hearing Governor Walker's State-of-the-State address.

The Joint Committee escorted Governor Walker to the House rostrum.

# STATE-OF-THE-STATE ADDRESS BY GOVERNOR OLENE WALKER

President Mansell, Speaker Stephens, Minority Leaders Dmitrich and Goodfellow, Senators and Representatives, Chief Justice Durham and Supreme Court Justices, Lt. Governor McKeachnie, distinguished guests and my fellow Utahns, it is my pleasure to greet you this evening.

My friends, it is truly an honor to serve as your governor. Thank you for the generous offerings of friendship and encouragement so many of you have given me.

I reflect warmly on the years I sat in this Chamber as a legislator. I understand the process and the great obligation legislators have in passing laws and formulating a budget that will benefit the citizens of our great state.

As a state, we have weathered three years of tough economic times and have had to face challenging budget decisions. To this point, we have fared well. However, as we look toward the future, it is apparent we must ensure a strong foundation for the 21st century. I suggest we begin with the basics.

What are those basics? A conservative, realistic budget. Strong initiatives that focus on the basic needs of our citizens. And an innovative yet basic vision for tomorrow. Using these basics as building blocks, we will be offering a sound future for generations to come.

As I explained when I submitted my budget recommendations to the Legislature, I am committed to the following three priorities:

First, we must keep our Triple A bond rating. Why is this important? Simply because it not only saves the State of Utah, but also school districts, millions of dollars. To illustrate this, in June we issued \$407 million in bonds and got the remarkable rate of 2.83 percent. At the same time California, because of its credit

problems, issued bonds at a rate of 3.86 percent. Comparing the two rates, the savings to our state over the 15–year life of the bonds will be \$39,333,900.87!

To preserve that rating, we must limit our bonding, add to our reserves and bring balance to our budget by ensuring that we have sufficient resources to meet our basic obligations.

Second, it is also important that we retain our state and education employees. Too often, after we invest in their training and development, we lose some of our most capable people. I keep hearing, "I would love to stay, but this county or that city is making me an offer I can't refuse." It has been two years since state employees have had a raise. We must find a way to give them a modest 2 percent salary increase.

Third, maintaining quality education in our state is essential. Education is the basis for our future prosperity, and it is a key to individual success. I challenge the public, educators and business leaders to become an active part of the solution. Utah has a tradition of valuing education. Even though we are at the very bottom in spending per student, we have always been near the top in outcome.

That is changing. Our student test scores have declined. For example, the national "Quality Counts" report – referred to as the "states' report card on education" – shows Utah students scoring seven points below the national average in writing. How can Utah businesses succeed if we don't supply them with highly–skilled workers? How can our economy prosper? And, more importantly, what does this portend for the personal success of our students who will come out of the system? We are now 40 percent below the national average in per student funding. How far must we slip before we take action?

My budget recommendation for education has three main components. First, the modest salary increase for educators I just mentioned.

Second is simply an increase to cover the costs of additional students entering the system. In the past 10 years, 17,000 additional students entered our public school system. Next year alone, we expect 7,160 additional students. In other words, nearly half the total number of the last 10 years. One—hundred and forty—five thousand additional students are expected to start through our system in the next 10 years.

To illustrate this dilemma, I would like to introduce you to Kevin Doxey. He recently sent me the letter he had written to the editor of the Davis County Clipper:

Have you ever felt like you're crammed up in a can of sardines? Well, I feel like that about every day now at school. I am a sixth grader at Oak Hills Elementary School, and there are about 33 kids in my portable classroom. Our room is so full, there's practically no room to walk around.

Allowing class sizes to increase is not the answer to managing our growing student population. We must fund the growth and pay teachers to stay the course.

Education is not just about the number of students and teachers. It is also about the quality of education we provide. The third component of my education recommendation addresses this issue.

We have worked very hard the past two years to develop a plan for competency-based education, called Performance Plus. Although it is full of possibility for increased excellence in the classroom, this plan would have cost \$200 million in new money.

Last summer, teachers, administrators, board members and parents attended five education summits. Their message was that Performance Plus should start in the lower grades, concentrate on one basic area, and be practical in terms of funding. I have addressed each of these imperatives. I am asking not for \$200 million, but for \$30 million in new funding to focus on kindergarten through third grade reading to ensure that every child can read at grade level. Through third grade, children learn to read. After that, they read to learn – a lifelong necessity!

Can we achieve that aim in Utah? You bet we can! Let me introduce you to Michael, his adoptive mother Sharron and brother Jaden. Michael was 8 1/2 when he was removed from his parents who were addicted to drugs. At the time, they were living in a homeless camp near the Jordan River, without shelter, food or appropriate clothing. Michael often stole food so he and his younger brother could survive. He entered second grade not knowing the alphabet or any of the other basic skills of most kindergartners. At that point, he started a new life. Every day, he spent two to three hours doing remedial work with his teacher and foster mother, who later adopted him. Today as an eighth grader, Michael is a good student and performs at grade level. Other students deserve the same chance.

I am excited so many people are uniting behind my "Read with a Child" initiative. Volunteers at 30 boys and girls clubs statewide are reading for 20 minutes to every young person who enters their doors. During the coming year, you will hear on radio and TV, read in the newspapers, be reminded on billboards and, I hope, hear from your friends: "The most important 20 minutes of your day: Reading with a Child." I'd like to thank the many people who are working on this program, those who are funding it and those who are already reading with a child.

I also want to report that all of our minority councils – Asian, Native American, Black, Hispanic, Pacific Islander – have committed to make literacy and education their number–one priority for the coming year.

Hand in hand with this effort, over the past 11 years we have worked to improve foster care in our state; but as soon as an individual turns 18, he or she moves out of the foster care system. Statistics show that after two years of independence, 61 percent of these young adults still have not finished high school, 72 percent are unemployed and 60 percent of the young women have given birth. We have been joined by many volunteers in developing a comprehensive program to help these youth become successful adults.

We continue to add to the 164 online state services. Now a person can even buy a fishing license or register a vehicle at 3:00 a.m. Recently, I announced a Web site: Utah Cares. By accessing this site, a person can find assistance relating to food, housing, employment or any other service. In fact, during the holidays this Web site provided assistance to 300 people per day.

By July 1 of this year, we will have a statewide communication network in place. This network ensures that every rural part of the state can communicate with hospitals, emergency centers and urban law enforcement in case of a disaster, public safety threat, power outage or health emergency.

One of the most difficult tasks I've announced is the preparation of a total tax reform recommendation, which will be completed by August 1 of this year. I will then ask each of you to seriously consider and help perfect this recommendation. There will be an opportunity for public input. Just thinking about the complexity of our tax system and volatility of our revenues keeps me awake at night. Our tax reform efforts must make Utah business–friendly. A 21st century government needs a 21st century tax system. Utah needs tax reform!

Along with these considerations for the coming year, we must be good stewards of our environment. I will continue to do all I can to oppose contaminating our beautiful state with spent nuclear fuel rods.

In addition, I have designated 25 watersheds for improvement by the end of the year. Forty–five groups have already adopted a lake or stream. When the snow melts this spring, an army of volunteers will begin work on 25 key watersheds throughout the state. After the snows of December and January, we can hope that these streams and lakes will be filled to capacity!

By the end of April, more than 2,000 fourth—grade students will attend water fairs and be exposed to my watershed initiative. By the end of the year, we hope to reach more than 10,000 fourth graders, thus teaching a younger generation that our watersheds are truly our life sheds.

At the same time, we are intensifying the process of clarifying state and county roads that cross federal public lands. When completed, this effort will settle issues that have long been a source of conflict. We will continue to pursue resolution of other public lands issues. I want to give credit to Lt. Governor Gayle McKeachnie for spearheading this endeavor.

Basic to any of these efforts is the need to strengthen our economy. Our economic picture is brightening, but we still worry about job creation. The stability and strength of Utah families depends on the economic security provided by well–paying jobs. Job creation is just as important for our recently unemployed as it is for future generations.

We need to strengthen, support and build upon the economic assets we already have. We must assist our own companies to grow and expand. To this end, the focus of the Industrial Assistance Fund must be on helping Utah companies that will expand and hire Utahns.

This spring, we will bring the presidents of our colleges and universities together with our business leaders. This critical alliance will explore ways we can better utilize our opportunities to strengthen our universities and our businesses. I have asked our higher education research institutions to work together in developing ideas and in transferring research results to our Utah businesses. New and better processes can be shared in the marketplace. Creative ideas in research will flourish. As a result, Utah businesses win, Utah job seekers win, Utah consumers win.

Further, we will develop a Web site of Utah products to encourage businesses and consumers to "b-u-y, buy Utah!" We will give people a one-stop shop for information needed to start a new business or expand an existing one. We will especially focus on increasing the amount of venture capital available in this state.

We cannot forget another asset that feeds our economy: Our number one economic priority must be to save Hill Air Force Base from another military base downsizing. Hill is the state's largest employer, and we simply must keep it. We will work with our congressional delegation to be the most aggressive state in protecting the jobs of the hard—working military personnel and civilians who work there.

In all of our considerations, the economy of Utah should be viewed as one economy. The health of the whole is always related to the health of the component parts and vice versa. We must work together to strengthen our economy statewide.

Also, we must never forget that the world is still welcome in Utah, and we have to make certain the world knows that.

We have plans in place to enhance the contributions of out-of-state businesses to Utah. For example, with the support of the Outdoor Industry Association, we have organized a task force whose aim is to make Utah the global outdoor recreational area. Not only will such an emphasis make our economy stronger, it will also require us to protect those areas of our state that have unique outdoor recreational qualities.

I want to be very clear that together, no one or no state will out—work us, out—smart us or out—hustle us when it comes to increasing the number of good jobs in our state. By working as ambassadors of Utah, we have attracted important growth. For example, technology companies such as Siebel Systems and Cadence Design Systems attest that their move to Utah from Silicon Valley will result in increased job growth. Further, it was recently announced that Malt—O—Meal will expand in Tremonton, bringing 250 more jobs to Utah. At the other end of the state, Orgill, Inc., will create 300 jobs in Hurricane.

Utah, of course, is also part of the expanding global economy. No longer insular or provincial, we have grown up with connections to national and global affairs. We are engaging in international trade, cultural exchange and contributions to science and medicine. Thousands of Utah businesses are involved in international commerce. As the world turns more to the global

economy, we need to build our international image and support our businesses in their efforts to be effective players.

We also participate in the global scene by sending our troops, supplies and expertise abroad to bring peace in our time. Utahns are leaving their homes and lives as Americans to try to establish peace in a tattered world.

One of the most emotional experiences I have had since becoming governor is saying a few words to a group of men and women of the Utah National Guard as they left for service in Iraq. I had expected to see young faces. Instead there were many who were fathers, mothers and grandparents. Behind, they leave others to carry on for them. I would like you to meet a mother, Janet Summit, who is holding together a family of 10 children while her husband is serving in the National Guard. I know how difficult it was for them to say goodbye, and I hope that everyone in their home town of Delta will embrace this family. We appreciate all of our men and women who are serving our country and their families. May our troops return home safely to all they love.

I take seriously my responsibility as governor. I hope in all of our decisions and deliberations that we keep in mind we have the responsibility to chart the best course possible, not only for the coming 2005 budget year, but for the future of Utah. I am convinced that we in Utah can meet any challenge with unity and common sense.

To those in this Chamber tonight, the people of the state of Utah have entrusted us to keep them safe, to provide a quality education for our children, to build transportation systems, to provide necessary services and to build the economy. May we always remember the great trust the people of Utah have given us to make thoughtful decisions.

A prayer offered over half a century ago by Dr. Peter Marshall, chaplain in the United States Senate, still has relevance today:

...Save us from hotheads that would lead us to act foolishly, and from cold feet that would keep us from acting at all.

What better time than now to embark on these issues? As citizens and leaders of this state, we have a remarkable opportunity to shape Utah for a productive, prosperous, and positive future.

It begins with us.

It begins with the basics.

It begins now.

May God bless you, America, and this great state!

The Legislature intends these provisions to eliminate one avenue by which individuals have been fraudulently convincing others to pursue nonexistent tax advantages."

- (f) unless Subsection (2)(m) or (3) applies, issuing, or aiding and abetting in the issuance of, an order or prescription for a drug or device to a person located in this state:
- (i) without prescriptive authority conferred by a license issued under this title, or by an exemption to licensure under this title;
- (ii) with prescriptive authority conferred by an exception issued under this title or a multistate practice privilege recognized under this title, if the prescription was issued:
- (A) without first obtaining information, in the usual course of professional practice, that is sufficient to establish a diagnosis, to identify underlying conditions, and to identify contraindications to the proposed treatment; or
- (B) based on a questionnaire completed by the patient on the internet, or toll-free telephone number, when there exists no other bona-fide patient-practitioner relationship; or
- (iii) in violation of Subsection (2)(m), when the licensed person who issued, or aided and abetted another in the issuance of the prescription has violated Subsection (2)(m) on more than 100 prescriptions within a thirty day period of time; and
- (g) Subsection (2)(f) does not apply to treatment rendered in an emergency, on-call or cross coverage situation, provided that the

person who issues the prescription has prescriptive authority conferred by a license under this title, or is exempt from licensure under this title.

- (2) "Unprofessional conduct" means conduct, by a licensee or applicant, that is defined as unprofessional conduct under this title or under any rule adopted under this title and includes:
- (a) violating, or aiding or abetting any other person to violate, any statute, rule, or order regulating an occupation or profession under this title:
- (b) violating, or aiding or abetting any other person to violate, any generally accepted professional or ethical standard applicable to an occupation or profession regulated under this title;
- (c) engaging in conduct that results in conviction, a plea of nolo contendere, or a plea of guilty or nolo contendere which is held in abeyance pending the successful completion of probation with respect to a crime of moral turpitude or any other crime that, when considered with the functions and duties of the occupation or profession for which the license was issued or is to be issued, bears a reasonable relationship to the licensee's or applicant's ability to safely or competently practice the occupation or profession;
- (d) engaging in conduct that results in disciplinary action, including reprimand, censure, diversion, probation, suspension, or revocation, by any other licensing or regulatory authority having jurisdiction over the licensee or applicant in the same occupation or profession if the conduct would, in this state, constitute grounds for denial of licensure or disciplinary proceedings under Section 58–1–401;
- (e) engaging in conduct, including the use of intoxicants, drugs, narcotics, or similar chemicals, to the extent that the conduct does, or might reasonably be considered to, impair the ability of the licensee or applicant to safely engage in the occupation or profession;
- (f) practicing or attempting to practice an occupation or profession regulated under this title despite being physically or mentally unfit to do so;
- (g) practicing or attempting to practice an occupation or profession regulated under this title through gross incompetence, gross negligence, or a pattern of incompetency or negligence;
- (h) practicing or attempting to practice an occupation or profession requiring licensure under this title by any form of action or communication which is false, misleading, deceptive, or fraudulent;
- (i) practicing or attempting to practice an occupation or profession regulated under this title beyond the scope of the licensee's competency, abilities, or education;

- (j) practicing or attempting to practice an occupation or profession regulated under this title beyond the scope of the licensee's license;
- (k) verbally, physically, mentally, or sexually abusing or exploiting any person through conduct connected with the licensee's practice under this title or otherwise facilitated by the licensee's license; or
- (1) acting as a supervisor without meeting the qualification requirements for that position that are defined by statute or rule[-]: or (m) unless Subsection (3) applies, issuing, or aiding and abetting in the issuance of, an order or prescription for a drug or device:
- (i) without first obtaining information in the usual course of professional practice, that is sufficient to establish a diagnosis, to identify conditions, and to identify contraindications to the proposed treatment; or
- (ii) based on a questionnaire completed by the patient on the internet, or toll free telephone number when there exists no other bonafide patient–practitioner relationship or bona fide referral by a practitioner involved in an existing patient–practitioner relationship.

- (e) retain an executive director and appropriate legal, actuarial, and other personnel as necessary to provide technical assistance in the operations of the pool;
- (f) establish rules, conditions, and procedures for reinsuring risks under this chapter;
- (g) cause the pool to have an annual audit of its operations by the state auditor;
- (h) coordinate with the Department of Health in seeking to obtain from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, or other appropriate office or agency of government, all appropriate waivers, authority, and permission needed to coordinate the coverage available from the pool with coverage available under Medicaid, either before or after Medicaid coverage, or as a conversion option upon completion of Medicaid eligibility, without the necessity for requalification by the enrollee;
- (i) provide for and employ cost containment measures and requirements including preadmission certification, concurrent inpatient review, and individual case management for the purpose of

making the pool more cost-effective;

- (j) offer pool coverage through contracts with health maintenance organizations, preferred provider organizations, and other managed care systems that will manage costs while maintaining quality care;
- (k) establish annual limits on benefits payable under the pool to or on behalf of any enrollee;
- (l) exclude from coverage under the pool specific benefits, medical conditions, and procedures for the purpose of protecting the financial viability of the pool;
- (m) administer the Pool Fund;
- (n) make rules in accordance with Title 63, Chapter 46a, Utah Administrative Rulemaking Act, to implement this chapter; and
- (o) adopt, trademark, and copyright a trade name for the pool for use in marketing and publicizing the pool and its products.
- (2) (a) The board shall prepare and submit an annual report to the Legislature which shall include:
- (i) the net premiums anticipated;
- (ii) actuarial projections of payments required of the pool;
- (iii) the expenses of administration; and
- (iv) the anticipated reserves or losses of the pool.
- (b) The budget for operation of the pool is subject to the approval of the board.

On motion of Senator Blackham, the following summary of standing committee and Senate Third Reading discussion materials was placed in the Senate journal.

S.B. 55 (along with S.B. 232) is the result of a "Task Force" (working group) effort to completely repeal, rethink, reorganize and then enact a new Governmental Immunity Act. The Task Force was composed of 27 lawyers and two non–lawyers who, together, represented virtually all stakeholders in the governmental immunity arena. The Task Force had trial lawyers, city attorneys, county attorneys, locally–elected officials, assistant Attorneys General, representatives from the state Risk Management Office, and others. The committee met on over ten occasions over the interim and devoted literally scores of hours in meetings and hundreds of hours in drafting, negotiating and redrafting this compromise bill.

S.B. 55 is the first time that the concept of governmental immunity has received a comprehensive review in over twenty years. In truth, the current law,

which was originally drafted in 1965, has been eclipsed by modern governmental practices, by too many confusing amendments and by unpredictable changes in Supreme Court interpretations. We needed a new approach.

S.B. 55 unanimously passed out of the Senate Government and Operations Committee on Tuesday after members of the Task Force, as well as other interested citizens, testified in support of the bill for an excess of an hour and a half. No one spoke in opposition to the bill. All were complementary of the process and the substance.

I would like to briefly summarize some of the comments:

Ed Havas of the Utah Trial Lawyers Association testified from the claimants' perspective, that the bill offers several improvements over the current Governmental Immunity Act. Among them:

- It clarifies the notice of claims provision, making clear that the notice must be sent to the "office" of the relevant governmental representative, and that such notice may be conveyed by mail in accordance with existing statutory provision for submissions to government;
- It calls for the creation of a database of the proper recipient of notices of claim, along with the address to which the notice of claim must be sent, for each governmental entity. This database will be accessible through the Department of Commerce, both electronically and in hard copy, helping claimants avoid misdirected notices:
- It codifies the "discovery" rule with regard to when a cause of action arises against a governmental entity, and thereby clarifies when the statute of limitations begins to run;
- It shortens the time for a governmental entity to respond to a claim (or be deemed to have denied it) from 90 days to 60 days, permitting the action to go forward sooner; and
- It generally simplifies the language, removes surplusage and arcane language, and reorders the provisions into a more understandable, more easily accessible statute.

He characterized the bill as "a good first step" and represented that the group would like to continue during the 2004 interim, to explore the possibility of enacting a measure to deal with catastrophic injuries such as in a case where there are multiple claimants whose injuries exceed the maximum award allowed by the Governmental Immunity damage caps. I would like to see the Task Force explore this issue, as well as others that they determine, over the interim.

Jodi Hoffman of the Utah League of Cities and Towns and David Church of the Utah Local Governments Trust testified that:

- S.B. 55 will make it more likely that injured plaintiffs will receive redress.
- It protects truly discretionary (and by that I mean broad policy and budgetary) decisions of government. Should a small community construct flood control measures for a twenty year storm, a fifty year storm, or a hundred year storm, or should it stay out of the flood control business altogether?
- S.B. 55 reaffirms the state's interest in a comprehensive approach to Governmental Immunity; clear and rational waivers thereof; and clear notice, reporting and discovery rule provisions.
- While everyone on the Task Force had their own interests, the group was able to achieve a broad mix of compromises and trade—offs to arrive at a bill that represents a legitimate effort to produce a broad policy objective through its individual provisions. It is a complex bill.
- S.B. 55 is sound policy regarding claims against government that will produce broad justice while guarding government's ability to act for the public good without fear of unexpected and potentially crippling taxpayer burdens.

Assistant Attorney General Brent Burnett offered an historical overview of Governmental Immunity in Utah. He offered his experiences with the development of the law and his insights into the current confusion in the law. Andrew Morse of Snow, Christensen offered a law review article which summarized and a chart which detailed the history of Governmental Immunity in Utah and how injured parties have more rights to sue under SB55 than they did before the Governmental Immunity Act was passed in 1965. Further Andrew Morse testified that since the Laney v. Fairview City was decided, the insurance market has responded to court—injected uncertainty in the Governmental Immunity realm by increasing premiums 230% for 70% of the prior coverage.

Joe Johnson, Mayor of Bountiful (a Power city) as well as Reed Searle, Executive Director of the IPA testified about the historical development of the IPA, the current need for municipal power and the fact that the IPA board is hesitant to serve at all without SB55. IPA is an Interlocal Cooperative Agency that has issued over \$16,000,000,000 in municipal bonds. While everyone had assumed that bodies such as IPA had been covered by the prior Governmental Immunity Act, there was increasing uncertainty in recent years. SB55 embodies our desire to have one comprehensive Governmental Immunity Act that covers all claims against government.

In sum, S.B. 55 has been well negotiated, debated by experts in the field and drafted as consensus legislation. It is a good bill that serves a broad public policy. We need this bill; and we need to support a process like the Governmental Immunity Task Force that has worked well for the citizens of Utah. I ask for your support for S.B. 55.

- (b) Beginning on July 1, 1998, \$250,000 of the revenues generated by the increase in the cigarette tax under this section enacted during the 1997 Annual General Session shall be annually deposited into the account.
- (c) The Department of Health shall expend the funds deposited in the account under Subsection (5)(b) for a tobacco prevention and control media campaign targeted towards children.
- (d) The following revenue generated from the tax increase imposed under Subsection (1) during the 2002 General Session shall be deposited in the Cigarette Tax Restricted Account:
- (i) 22% of the revenue to be annually appropriated to the Department of Health for tobacco prevention, reduction, cessation, and control programs;
- (ii) 15% of the revenue to be annually appropriated to the University of Utah Health Sciences Center for the Huntsman Cancer Institute for cancer research; and
- (iii) 21% of the revenue to be annually appropriated to the University of Utah Health Sciences Center for medical education at the University of Utah School of Medicine.
- (e) Any balance remaining in the Cigarette Tax Restricted Account at the end of the fiscal year shall be appropriated during the next fiscal year for the purposes set forth in Subsections (5)(d)(i) through (5)(d)(iii) in proportion to the amount of revenue deposited into the account for each purpose.
- (f) The Legislature shall give particular consideration to appropriating any revenues resulting from the change in tax rates under Subsection (2) adopted during the 2002 Annual General Session and not otherwise appropriated pursuant to Subsection (5)(d) to enhance Medicaid provider reimbursement rates and medical coverage for the uninsured.
- (g) Any program or entity that receives funding under Subsection (5)(d) shall provide an annual report to the Health and Human Services Interim Committee no later that September 1 of each year. The report shall include:
- (i) the amount funded;
- (ii) the amount expended;
- (iii) a description of the effectiveness of the program; and
- (iv) if the program is a tobacco cessation program, the report required in Section 63–97–401.

#### INTENT LANGUAGE FOR 1ST SUB. S.B. 176

In passing 1st Sub. S.B. 176, Financial Institutions Amendments, it is the intent of the Legislature that the renaming of "industrial loan corporations" as "industrial banks" under this bill is not to have substantive legal effect on industrial loan corporations chartered under Utah law that are depository institutions as of the effective date of the bill. Under this bill an industrial bank is required to be a depository institution. Industrial loan corporations that are not depository institutions as of the effective date of the bill are grandfathered under this bill as "industrial loan companies" and would be subject to Title 7, Chapter 8, Industrial Banks, to the same extent as industrial banks except for provisions related to receiving and holding deposits.

It is the intent of the Legislature that all state and federal laws that before enactment of this bill, reference or apply to a Utah industrial loan corporation that is a depository institution as of the effective date of the bill, continue to reference or apply after passage of this bill, without any substantive legal change.

#### INTENT LANGUAGE FOR H.B. 239

"In passing H.B. 239, TAX OF SEXUALLY EXPLICIT BUSINESS, the Legislature intends the following:

- (1) The Legislature recognizes that it takes a combination of remedies to preserve the health, promote prosperity, improve the morals, and provide peace and good order to all in the state.
- (2) It is the intent of this act to tax sexually explicit businesses and escort services to provide a revenue for treating individuals who have been convicted of

sex offenses. The provisions of this act have neither the intent nor the effect of imposing a limitation or restriction on the content of any communicative materials, including sexually oriented materials. Similarly, it is not the intent nor the effect of the act to restrict or deny access by adults to sexually oriented materials protected by the First Amendment, or to deny access by the distributors and exhibitors of sexually oriented entertainment to their intended market. Neither is it the intent nor the effect of this act to condone or legitimize the distribution of obscene material.

# (3) The Legislature finds:

- (a) the Supreme Court of the United States has upheld the regulation of sexually oriented businesses because of the deleterious effect they have on a community;
- (b) sexually oriented businesses have a deleterious effect on the community, causing increased crime, including unlawful sexual activities;
- (c) it is in the best interest of the citizens of this state to provide counseling to individuals who have committed a sex offense;
- (d) most sex offenders continue to commit sex offenses if they do not receive treatment:
- (e) sex offenders treatment is expensive, if an offender has to pay for treatment, restitution and normal living expenses, they generally cannot afford the treatment; and
- (f) it is reasonable to tax sexually explicit businesses and escort services in order to provide counseling for individuals who have committed a sex offense."

### COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE GOVERNOR

Mr. President and Speaker Stephens:

March 23, 2004

"This is to inform you that on March 23, 2004, I vetoed S.B. 115 SPECIAL ELECTION DATES, and have transmitted the bill to the Lieutenant Governor for filing.

The intention of Senate Bill 115 is to increase voter turn—out for special elections, which is commendable. General obligation bond elections dominated the discussion concerning this bill. However, the provisions of this bill extend beyond bond elections. It applies to any special election.

Limiting special elections to one date in both June and November severely limits the financial flexibility of local governments. It is conceivable that mid-year budget pressures could force a school district, for example, to seek a voted leeway to keep its budget in balance. Election dates in June are too late in the fiscal year and November dates may be too early in the fiscal year to realize the need for additional revenues. The only mid-year alternative is to cut teachers.

The state generally defers to locally elected governments as to matters particularly pertinent to the local community including locally levied taxes and bond issues. This bill attempts to come between these governments and their own citizens.

Just as the state dislikes federal mandates, we need to carefully consider the mandates we place on local governments. I believe this bill interjects the state's will on local governments and limits their ability to meet their own needs in a prudent manner."

"This is to inform you that on March 23, 2004, I vetoed S.B. 239 S03, Unfair Business Practices, and have transmitted it to the lieutenant governor for filing.

Senate Bill 239 introduces new terms that are not well-defined and could be used to initiate frivolous litigation. These new terms have not been adjudicated by the courts and could be used in ways opposite to the intent of the sponsor of the bill.

Utah enjoys a legal climate where business litigation is relatively predictable. This bill would cause uncertainty and complexity to our legal climate and could be a disincentive to internal business growth and the relocation of business to our state.

In order to preserve the predictability of the Utah legal climate I am vetoing this bill."

"This is to inform you that on March 23, 2004, I vetoed line item 65 of appropriation in H.B. 1, SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATIONS ACT, and have transmitted the bill to the Lieutenant Governor for filing.

Item 65 includes the intent language that "recommends the USOE to contract a review body that has satisfied the Interim Education Committee's RFP process." I am troubled by the legislature issuing an RFP and selecting a vendor in behalf of a state agency.

The founders of our nation rightly recognized the potential for one branch to seek to increase its authority at the expense of another. Human nature being what it is, the founders provided us with checks and balances. The success of our democracy depends on continuous, unbending allegiance to separation of powers and checks and balances. Because this line item in H.B. 1 takes a small step in the wrong direction, I feel compelled to veto.

I find it unfortunate that the appropriation to the Jean Massieu Charter school is a part of this line item. I hope that the Utah State Office of Education can find

non-lapsing funds to assist this school in meeting its needs. However, I feel the separation of powers issue outweighs the appropriation of this money.

I am very supportive of competency-based education and pledge to continue efforts to make it a reality. However, the implementation of competency-based education is a responsibility of the executive branch within the policy guidelines established by the legislature."

"This is to inform you that on March 23, 2004, I vetoed the following line item appropriations in H.B. 3, SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATIONS ACT II, and have transmitted the bill to the Lieutenant Governor for filing.

Item 18 To Department of Administrative Services – Purchasing

The Legislature intends that all departments and divisions, except for the division of Juvenile Justice Services, in state government be encouraged to contract with private non-state governmental entities to provide services to the citizens of the State of Utah. The Legislature further intends that a report be presented to the Executive Appropriation Committee in October 2004 on the extent that departments and divisions used private non-state governmental entities to provide services to the citizens of Utah. The Legislature also intends that the report describe (1) additional services that the departments and divisions reasonably believe could be delivered by private non-state governmental entities, and (2) which services cannot be delivered by private non-state governmental entities.

The scope of this language is very broad. It is unclear if the intent is to contract for program services, or go so far as to look at employee leasing as an alternative to hiring employees. The Division of Purchasing does not have the staff nor the resources to coordinate such a report without additional funding.

I agree that departments and divisions should constantly review their operations to identify cost savings and to promote efficiencies. The Privatization Board also exists to review services provided by the state that could be contracted with the private sector. If areas of concern exist, the Privatization Board should review them and make recommendations for change.

Item 30 To Department of Commerce – Commerce General Regulation From General Fund Restricted – Commerce Service Fund – Public Utilities Regulatory Fund

Schedule of Programs:

Public Utilities 150,000 Committee of Consumer Services (150,000)

The Legislature intends that the Division of Public Utilities use these funds to assess the impact of Public Service Commission decisions on Utah's business climate.

Item 31 To Public Service Commission

From General Fund Restricted – Commerce Service Fund – Public Utilities

Regulatory Fund 20,000

Schedule of Programs:

Committee of Consumer Services 20,000

The Legislature intends that these funds be used to pay for the annual telecommunications report.

The offsets to these items were deleted with a floor amendment. This action makes the technical change to clean up these items.

Item 85 To State Board of Education – State Office of Education

From Uniform School Fund, One–time 1,000,000

Schedule of Programs:

Student Achievement 1,000,000

It is the intent of the Legislature that the USOE use this one-time appropriation to contract with a private entity which meets the qualifications of the RFP approved by the Education Interim Committee. It is further the intent of the Legislature that this funding be used strictly to implement the proposal in the school districts, and not for software program development.

I am troubled by the legislature issuing a RFP and selecting a vendor in behalf of a state agency. The founders of our nation rightly recognized the potential for

one branch to seek to increase its authority at the expense of another. Human nature being what it is, the founders provided us with checks and balances. The success of our democracy depends on continuous, unbending allegiance to separation of powers and checks and balances. Because this line item in H.B. 3 takes a small step in the wrong direction, I feel compelled to veto.

I am very supportive of competency-based education and pledge to continue efforts to make it a reality. However, the implementation of competency-based education is a responsibility of the executive branch with the policy guidelines established by the legislature.

While I am not vetoing "Item 82 To Department of Administrative Services – Finance Mandated" which calls for a legislative tuition tax credit study, I am not happy that this money is appropriated to an executive branch department. If the legislature chooses to conduct a study, it should appropriate the funds to the Legislative Fiscal Analyst's or Legislative Research and General Counsel's office. Money appropriated to the executive branch should not be mandated and controlled by the legislature. Again, this is a separation of powers issue."

"This is to inform you that on March 23, 2004, I decided, after careful consideration and study, to veto H.B. 115, CARSON SMITH SPECIAL NEEDS SCHOLARSHIPS, and have transmitted it to the lieutenant governor for filing.

I am very sympathetic to the families of special needs children. I want to see that special needs children receive the educational assistance they need, and so I have left the \$1.4 million funding intact for the Legislature to re—authorize. I have asked the State School Board to set up a system to contract with special needs providers. This will accomplish the educational objectives of the bill for special needs children.

Unfortunately, H.B. 115 raises constitutional questions, federal law compliance and funding issues that I cannot allow to become law.

The attached legal analysis outlines two constitutional questions. First, the use of Uniform School Fund money for Utah State Board of Education (USBE) administration of the program appears to be a violation of Utah Const., Art. X, Sec. 5(4). Second, the bill places USBE as the oversight body for a program of

private schools and private school students without designating the schools or programs as part of the public education system. This raises serious questions concerning the constitutional role and authority of the USBE.

Parents who place their child in a private school normally give up the rights and safeguards afforded them by the federal Individuals With Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). However, due to the extensive involvement of the USBE in the program created by HB 115, it is unclear to what extent IDEA rights and safeguards will apply to those students who receive a scholarship and attend a private school. Should it be determined that IDEA law does apply, multiple unanswered questions concerning administration and funding of the program are raised.

The bill creates a three year entitlement for a student when a scholarship is awarded. However, the bill provided only one—time funding for fiscal year 2005. Language in the bill states that, "The legislature shall annually appropriate money to the board from the General Fund to make scholarship payments." These provisions imply ongoing funding requirements for a future Legislature."

"This is to inform you that on March 23, 2004, I decided, after careful consideration and study, to veto H.B. 140, CHILD AND FAMILY SERVICES AND RELATED JUDICIAL CODE AMENDMENTS, and have transmitted it to the Lieutenant Governor for filing.

While I appreciate the concerns and concepts expressed in H.B. 140, I believe the bill has several technical flaws and should be further developed before becoming law. Significant questions and confusions linger about some of the major policy changes made in this bill. For example, I am particularly concerned about the new provisions having to do with a "mature minor". If this bill becomes law, it risks opening the door for minors, contrary to their parents' wishes, to seek judicial approval for health care decisions such as access to abortion, contraceptives, or other treatments. Such a major policy change deserves full and thorough discussion in an open public hearing before being added to the laws of our state.

There are a number of other concerns as well. The Judicial Council has pointed out that the bill now creates conflicting language as to the timing and

manner for a judge to appoint the guardian ad litem. Such confusion has the potential to delay important court processes. The Judicial Council has also stressed that the bill purports to define the ethical responsibilities of attorneys, a function that constitutionally belongs to the Supreme Court. Serious questions have also been raised as to provisions allowing one party to influence the legal representation of another party the way this bill does. In addition, H.B. 140 may create new costs for the Juvenile Court, but provides no funding to pay for them.

Given the importance of these issues relative to the child welfare system in Utah, I strongly encourage the legislature to grapple with these topics during the next few months through either committees or its normal audit process. I appreciate Representative Christensen's efforts and concerns on these issues and pledge the full cooperation of the executive branch in seeking continuous improvement in the state's child welfare system."

"This is to inform you that on March 23, 2004, I vetoed H.B. 158, Water Shares in a Municipal Water Company, and have transmitted it to the lieutenant governor for filing.

There is no reasonable basis for a statute that only applies to mutual water companies operated in counties of the first class. This bill would have the effect of allowing an exemption from Public Service Commission regulation, mutual water companies in Salt Lake County and exposing all other mutual water companies in the rest of the state to regulation. The cost of this regulation both to the state and to the water companies is excessive for the benefit derived.

If the bill were to be signed, the Public Service Commission would likely forbear enforcement of the bill for one year until they could get clarifications from the Legislature because of the inequities and uncertainties that would be created.

The Public Service Commission does not have the resources to regulate all the mutual water companies outside of Salt Lake County."

#### COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE GOVERNOR

Mr. President and Speaker Stephens:

March 23, 2004

"This is to inform you that on March 23, 2004, I vetoed S.B. 115 SPECIAL ELECTION DATES, and have transmitted the bill to the Lieutenant Governor for filing.

The intention of Senate Bill 115 is to increase voter turn–out for special elections, which is commendable. General obligation bond elections dominated the discussion concerning this bill. However, the provisions of this bill extend beyond bond elections. It applies to any special election.

Limiting special elections to one date in both June and November severely limits the financial flexibility of local governments. It is conceivable that mid—year budget pressures could force a school district, for example, to seek a voted leeway to keep its budget in balance. Election dates in June are too late in the fiscal year and November dates may be too early in the fiscal year to realize the need for additional revenues. The only mid—year alternative is to cut teachers.

The state generally defers to locally elected governments as to matters particularly pertinent to the local community including locally levied taxes and bond issues. This bill attempts to come between these governments and their own citizens.

Just as the state dislikes federal mandates, we need to carefully consider the mandates we place on local governments. I believe this bill interjects the state's will on local governments and limits their ability to meet their own needs in a prudent manner."

"This is to inform you that on March 23, 2004, I vetoed S.B. 239 S03, Unfair Business Practices, and have transmitted it to the lieutenant governor for filing.

Senate Bill 239 introduces new terms that are not well-defined and could be used to initiate frivolous litigation. These new terms have not been adjudicated by the courts and could be used in ways opposite to the intent of the sponsor of the bill.

Utah enjoys a legal climate where business litigation is relatively predictable. This bill would cause uncertainty and complexity to our legal climate and could be a disincentive to internal business growth and the relocation of business to our state.

In order to preserve the predictability of the Utah legal climate I am vetoing this bill."

"This is to inform you that on March 23, 2004, I vetoed line item 65 of appropriation in H.B. 1, SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATIONS ACT, and have transmitted the bill to the Lieutenant Governor for filing.

Item 65 includes the intent language that "recommends the USOE to contract a review body that has satisfied the Interim Education Committee's RFP process." I am troubled by the legislature issuing an RFP and selecting a vendor in behalf of a state agency.

The founders of our nation rightly recognized the potential for one branch to seek to increase its authority at the expense of another. Human nature being what it is, the founders provided us with checks and balances. The success of our democracy depends on continuous, unbending allegiance to separation of powers and checks and balances. Because this line item in H.B. 1 takes a small step in the wrong direction, I feel compelled to veto.

I find it unfortunate that the appropriation to the Jean Massieu Charter school is a part of this line item. I hope that the Utah State Office of Education can find non–lapsing funds to assist this school in meeting its needs. However, I feel the separation of powers issue outweighs the appropriation of this money.

I am very supportive of competency-based education and pledge to continue efforts to make it a reality. However, the implementation of competency-based education is a responsibility of the executive branch within the policy guidelines established by the legislature."

"This is to inform you that on March 23, 2004, I vetoed the following line item appropriations in H.B. 3, SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATIONS ACT II, and have transmitted the bill to the Lieutenant Governor for filing.

#### Item 18 To Department of Administrative Services – Purchasing

The Legislature intends that all departments and divisions, except for the division of Juvenile Justice Services, in state government be encouraged to contract with private non-state governmental entities to provide services to the citizens of the State of Utah. The Legislature further intends that a report be presented to the Executive Appropriation Committee in October 2004 on the extent that departments and divisions used private non-state governmental entities to provide services to the citizens of Utah. The Legislature also intends that the report describe (1) additional services that the departments and divisions reasonably believe could be delivered by private non-state governmental entities, and (2) which services cannot be delivered by private non-state governmental entities.

The scope of this language is very broad. It is unclear if the intent is to contract for program services, or go so far as to look at employee leasing as an

alternative to hiring employees. The Division of Purchasing does not have the staff nor the resources to coordinate such a report without additional funding.

I agree that departments and divisions should constantly review their operations to identify cost savings and to promote efficiencies. The Privatization Board also exists to review services provided by the state that could be contracted with the private sector. If areas of concern exist, the Privatization Board should review them and make recommendations for change.

Item 30 To Department of Commerce – Commerce General Regulation From General Fund Restricted – Commerce Service Fund – Public Utilities Regulatory Fund

Schedule of Programs:

Public Utilities 150,000 Committee of Consumer Services (150,000)

The Legislature intends that the Division of Public Utilities use these funds to assess the impact of Public Service Commission decisions on Utah's business climate.

Item 31 To Public Service Commission

From General Fund Restricted – Commerce Service Fund – Public Utilities

Regulatory Fund 20,000

Schedule of Programs:

Committee of Consumer Services 20,000

The Legislature intends that these funds be used to pay for the annual telecommunications report.

The offsets to these items were deleted with a floor amendment. This action makes the technical change to clean up these items.

Item 85 To State Board of Education – State Office of Education

From Uniform School Fund, One–time 1.000,000

Schedule of Programs:

Student Achievement 1,000,000

It is the intent of the Legislature that the USOE use this one-time appropriation to contract with a private entity which meets the qualifications of the RFP approved by the Education Interim Committee. It is further the intent of the Legislature that this funding be used strictly to implement the proposal in the school districts, and not for software program development.

I am troubled by the legislature issuing a RFP and selecting a vendor in behalf of a state agency. The founders of our nation rightly recognized the potential for one branch to seek to increase its authority at the expense of another. Human nature being what it is, the founders provided us with checks and balances. The success of our democracy depends on continuous, unbending allegiance to separation of powers and checks and balances. Because this line item in H.B. 3 takes a small step in the wrong direction, I feel compelled to veto.

I am very supportive of competency-based education and pledge to continue efforts to make it a reality. However, the implementation of competency-based education is a responsibility of the executive branch with the policy guidelines established by the legislature.

While I am not vetoing "Item 82 To Department of Administrative Services – Finance Mandated" which calls for a legislative tuition tax credit study, I am not happy that this money is appropriated to an executive branch department. If the legislature chooses to conduct a study, it should appropriate the funds to the Legislative Fiscal Analyst's or Legislative Research and General Counsel's office. Money appropriated to the executive branch should not be mandated and controlled by the legislature. Again, this is a separation of powers issue."

"This is to inform you that on March 23, 2004, I decided, after careful consideration and study, to veto H.B. 115, CARSON SMITH SPECIAL NEEDS SCHOLARSHIPS, and have transmitted it to the lieutenant governor for filing.

I am very sympathetic to the families of special needs children. I want to see that special needs children receive the educational assistance they need, and so I have left the \$1.4 million funding intact for the Legislature to re—authorize. I have asked the State School Board to set up a system to contract with special needs providers. This will accomplish the educational objectives of the bill for special needs children.

Unfortunately, H.B. 115 raises constitutional questions, federal law compliance and funding issues that I cannot allow to become law.

The attached legal analysis outlines two constitutional questions. First, the use of Uniform School Fund money for Utah State Board of Education (USBE) administration of the program appears to be a violation of Utah Const., Art. X, Sec. 5(4). Second, the bill places USBE as the oversight body for a program of private schools and private school students without designating the schools or programs as part of the public education system. This raises serious questions concerning the constitutional role and authority of the USBE.

Parents who place their child in a private school normally give up the rights and safeguards afforded them by the federal Individuals With Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). However, due to the extensive involvement of the USBE in the program created by HB 115, it is unclear to what extent IDEA rights and safeguards will apply to those students who receive a scholarship and attend a private school. Should it be determined that IDEA law does apply, multiple unanswered questions concerning administration and funding of the program are raised.

The bill creates a three year entitlement for a student when a scholarship is awarded. However, the bill provided only one–time funding for fiscal year 2005. Language in the bill states that, "The legislature shall annually appropriate money to the board from the General Fund to make scholarship payments." These provisions imply ongoing funding requirements for a future Legislature."

"This is to inform you that on March 23, 2004, I decided, after careful consideration and study, to veto H.B. 140, CHILD AND FAMILY SERVICES AND RELATED JUDICIAL CODE AMENDMENTS, and have transmitted it to the Lieutenant Governor for filing.

While I appreciate the concerns and concepts expressed in H.B. 140, I believe the bill has several technical flaws and should be further developed before becoming law. Significant questions and confusions linger about some of the major policy changes made in this bill. For example, I am particularly concerned about the new provisions having to do with a "mature minor". If this bill becomes law, it risks opening the door for minors, contrary to their parents' wishes, to seek

judicial approval for health care decisions such as access to abortion, contraceptives, or other treatments. Such a major policy change deserves full and thorough discussion in an open public hearing before being added to the laws of our state.

There are a number of other concerns as well. The Judicial Council has pointed out that the bill now creates conflicting language as to the timing and manner for a judge to appoint the guardian ad litem. Such confusion has the potential to delay important court processes. The Judicial Council has also stressed that the bill purports to define the ethical responsibilities of attorneys, a function that constitutionally belongs to the Supreme Court. Serious questions have also been raised as to provisions allowing one party to influence the legal representation of another party the way this bill does. In addition, H.B. 140 may create new costs for the Juvenile Court, but provides no funding to pay for them.

Given the importance of these issues relative to the child welfare system in Utah, I strongly encourage the legislature to grapple with these topics during the next few months through either committees or its normal audit process. I appreciate Representative Christensen's efforts and concerns on these issues and pledge the full cooperation of the executive branch in seeking continuous improvement in the state's child welfare system."

Mr. President and Speaker Stephens:

"This is to inform you that on March 23, 2004, I vetoed H.B. 158, Water Shares in a Municipal Water Company, and have transmitted it to the lieutenant governor for filing.

There is no reasonable basis for a statute that only applies to mutual water companies operated in counties of the first class. This bill would have the effect of allowing an exemption from Public Service Commission regulation, mutual water companies in Salt Lake County and exposing all other mutual water companies in the rest of the state to regulation. The cost of this regulation both to the state and to the water companies is excessive for the benefit derived.

If the bill were to be signed, the Public Service Commission would likely forbear enforcement of the bill for one year until they could get clarifications from the Legislature because of the inequities and uncertainties that would be created.

The Public Service Commission does not have the resources to regulate all the mutual water companies outside of Salt Lake County."
