ļ	WHEREAS, Utah is known for its compassionate people who are generous and kind in						
	helping their neighbors in need;						
)	WHEREAS, Utahns have demonstrated an unsurpassed dedication to voluntary service;						
7	WHEREAS, according to the Utah Department of Health, approximately 215,000 or						



28	9% of Utahns lacked health insurance in 2003;					
29	WHEREAS, over 200,000 Utahns receive their health insurance from the Utah					
30	Department of Health at a budgeted cost of more than \$1.5 billion in fiscal year 2005;					
31	WHEREAS, Utah faces severe fiscal challenges in providing for rapidly expanding and					
32	very expensive education, health care, and transportation needs; and					
33	WHEREAS, the Sutherland Institute has released a report recommending that Utah can					
34	meet the basic health care needs for all of its indigent and needy uninsured residents while					
35	saving the state hundreds of millions of dollars, building true community, and without					
36	eligibility restrictions:					
37	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislature of the state of Utah					
38	urges think tanks, academicians, the insurance industry, and all others with an interest in					
39	providing universal health care for the poor to study the feasibility of implementing an					
40	authentic charity care system in Utah and report their findings to the Legislature by November					
41	30, 2005.					
42	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature specifically requests thoughtful					
43	consideration and direct input from these groups on:					
44	 the projected costs of all state government-provided health care services over 					
45	the next ten years;					
46	 how a proposed authentic charity care system should be governed, administered, 					
47	and sufficiently financed;					
48	 how volunteer medical professionals should be organized, coordinated, and 					
49	utilized in an authentic charity care system;					
50	 the projected capital and operating costs of providing the necessary number of 					
51	conveniently located, full-service, charity care facilities throughout the state;					
52	 how the principle of reciprocity should be administered in the new system; and 					
53	 the projected costs of implementing an authentic charity care system over the
