35	(1) "Board" means the State Capitol Preservation Board created by Section 63C-9-201.
36	(2) "Capitol hill" means the grounds, monuments, parking areas, buildings, and other
37	man-made and natural objects within the area bounded by 300 North Street, Columbus Street,
38	500 North Street, and East Capitol Boulevard, and includes:

156	(1) The following individuals shall constitute the executive committee for the State
157	Capitol Preservation Board:

162	(a) set an established meeting schedule upon the majority vote of the members of the
