8	General Description:
9	This bill requires the Department of Administrative Services to develop a plan for bulk
10	purchasing of prescription drugs and other cost-saving measures for the purchase of
11	prescription drugs by state entities.
12	Highlighted Provisions:
13	This bill:
14	 defines the state entities subject to the bulk purchasing plan;
15	 creates an advisory committee within the Department of Administrative Services
16	which consists of representatives of state entities subject to the bulk purchasing
17	requirements;
18	 instructs the Department of Administrative Services, with the advice of the
19	committee, to develop a plan for cost savings for state funded prescription drugs;
20	 prohibits the implementation of any prescription drug plan until:
21	 the department reports to the Legislative Auditor General;
22	• the Legislative Auditor General conducts an audit of the plan; and
23	• after July, 1, 2007; and
24	 provides protection of trade secrets and proprietary information regarding drug
25	prices, discounts, and rebates.
