State Impact

Enactment of this bill will require additional appropriations totaling \$37,560,805. The bill appropriates an additional \$30,000,000 or 13,158 weighted pupil units for class size reduction which is \$30,000,240 at a WPU value of \$2,280. Additional costs include associated social security and retirement costs at \$5,554,657; and additional state contribution to voted and board leeways at \$2,005,908.
