The House was called to order by Speaker Curtis at 5:00 p.m.

Roll call showed all members present except Representative Gregg Buxton, Jeff Alexander, and Bradley Last, excused.

Pledge of Allegiance and prayer by Representative Susan Lawrence.

On motion of Representative Urquhart, the House voted to continue with the same organization for the 2005 Second Special Session of the 56th Legislature as set up and constituted during the 2005 Annual General Session of the Legislature insofar as it pertains to the Speakership, Majority Leadership and Minority Leadership.

Speaker Curtis appointed Carole E. Peterson as Chief Clerk.

The Chief Clerk read the following:

CERTIFICATION

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, since the adjournment of the 2005 General Session of the Fifty–Sixth Legislature of the State of Utah, matters have arisen that require immediate legislative attention; and

WHEREAS, Article VII, Section 6 of the Constitution of the State of Utah provides that the Governor may, by proclamation, convene the Legislature into Special Session;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Jon M. Huntsman, Jr., Governor of the State of Utah, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the Laws of the State of Utah, do by this Proclamation call the Fifty–Sixth Legislature of the State of Utah into a Second Special Session at the State Capitol Complex, at Salt Lake City, Utah, on the 9th day of November, 2005, at 5:00 p.m., for the following purposes:

1. To consider a concurrent resolution approving, pursuant to Utah Code Ann. § 63–38b–303, a proposed settlement agreement involving the construction of the Legacy Parkway; and

2. To consider legislation giving the Utah Department of Transportation authority necessary to implement the proposed settlement agreement involving the construction of the Legacy Parkway.

On motion of Representative Lockhart, and as allowed by the Utah Constitution and the Joint Rules of the Legislature, the House voted to continue its practice of reading only the short title of bills and resolutions as they are introduced or considered on a House Calendar and not read the long title of the

bills and resolutions unless a majority of the House directs the reading of the long title, short title, or both of any House or Senate bill or resolution.

On motion of Representative Lockhart, the House voted to consider all House and Senate bills under suspension of the rules.

Representative Donnelson informed the House of Representatives that his committee had waited upon the Senate and informed them that the House was organized and ready to do business.

Representative Murray informed the House of Representatives that the joint committee had waited upon the Governor and informed him that the Legislature was organized and ready to do business.

REMARKS BY SPEAKER GREG J. CURTIS

Fellow citizens, members of the media and my distinguished colleagues of the Utah House of Representatives, welcome to the 2006 General Session of the Utah State Legislature.

It is an honor to stand here today to convene this 2006 General Session of the Utah House of Representatives. This year we begin our work in the same temporary chamber we found ourselves last year. Only this time, we have more familiarity with our surroundings and more experience with our duties. None of us can say we have not done this job before. So with this experience comes wisdom, and with wisdom, a greater expectation of performance. As we begin today, we have a fresh opportunity to press forward toward the highest standards of democratic representation. Our individual, personal adherence to the values of hard work, honesty and humility will be central to our ability to collectively earn and keep the trust and confidence of those whom we serve. While on the one hand, we may all agree on the need to maintain the highest standards of democratic representation, on the other hand we should still expect conflict and disagreement. In fact, we should not expect it, we should demand it. I think the public demands that within the four walls of this chamber and the committee rooms in which we meet, ideas will collide. Arguments will be born. But that reason will prevail. Just as the best swords are forged from the hottest fires, the best public policies are often born when divergent views collide, propelled by the strongest, deepest passion. However, none of this conflict and disagreement should be personal in nature. All of our questions, comments and concerns – should be fair, open and productive. There is nothing more damaging to the legislative process than when we lose our cool, question motives, malign character or spread half-truths. Just because someone disagrees with your idea does not mean they do not like you – it means they do not like your idea. Just because someone argues against your bill, does not mean you should argue against theirs. And just because someone votes against your motion, does not mean you should vote against theirs. Let the ideas collide, not the personalities. This is important because none of us has all the right

answers. None of us has all the best ideas. And no party's political philosophy is always best.

I remember when I started law school at the U. I was young, nervous — and about 40 pounds thinner. One of my first sections was a large contracts class where the professor stood before us and threw out tough questions from a thick case book. Someone in the first row would raise his hand and provide a brilliant bit of analysis. Then someone would raise her hand and greatly expand on that. And again, from the side of the classroom, an older student would offer his insights, again raising points I thought were better than anything I could muster. Initially, the cumulative effect of all this analysis and wisdom was intimidating. It appeared as though everyone, individually, knew more than me. So instead of thinking about *Hadley v. Baxendale*, I began worrying about *Curtis v. Graduation*. But then it occurred to me. While the entire case was in fact accurately dissected and analyzed, no one person in that classroom had all the right answers. One answer might have come from a retired teacher. Another from the kid who was home schooled. And then another from the Hispanic kid from Los Angeles. Together this classroom created a picture. But rather than just a single frame or two that each student held in his pocket, we put these frames together and made a movie. Working together in this House of Representatives, we, too, can make a movie. The only question is whether we are going to make something like *Citizen Kane*, or a bad movie, which I'll leave to your liking.

This year we have as many demands as ever before: education, transportation, human services — just to name a few. There are many proposals for new ways to spend more. We need to be sure that we come up with old ways to spend less. And one of the best old ways to spend less — is to take less. In fact, the best way to give something is to not take it in the first place. I was recently told the story of a college class here in Utah where a philosophy professor asked his students to go to the chalk board to draw a symbol of our government. Among all the amusing images you could imagine, at least one student drew something that did in fact bear some resemblance to one of our great American symbols: the bald eagle. Good idea, you might think. The only problem, however, was that instead of a strong, smart bird with powerful balanced wings, this bird wasn't smart and his wings were damaged and getting worse. This bird didn't know where he had been. He didn't know where he was going. And his entire journey was apparently paid for with someone else's money. And if that wasn't bad enough, this particular bald eagle flew in circles over a raging fire that it persistently tried to smother by dumping payloads of cash from each of its claws, leading, of course, only to hotter, higher flames. You might even say that this bird was falling into a burning ring of fire, and try as he may, he was going down, down, down. For this body to be responsible stewards of the public's wealth, we need to be careful not to become

this symbol. If we are going to spend, let's know where we are going and why. If we are going to solve a problem, let's agree that more spending is never all of the answer, and in many cases, it could make matters worse. There are plenty of great ideas we simply cannot afford. There are wonderful proposals that just have to wait. We cannot simultaneously promise to fund every new initiative, add to every existing program and build every new barn, bridge and building for every Tom, Dick and Harry. This is not easy. But public service is about making tough choices among competing priorities. Former U.S. Senator Phil Graham used to talk about which programs he decided to fund and which he decided to cut. He looked at every program in the federal government and then thought of someone in his home state. He thought of a guy named Dicky Flatt who ran a small print shop in the small town of Mexia, Texas. He ran his business from early in the morning until 8 o'clock at night, six days a week and every holiday. And whether you saw him at church or with the Boy Scouts he could never quite get the blue ink out of the creases in his fingers. So the Senator would look at each program and ask himself a simple question: "will the benefits to be derived by spending money on this program be worth taking money away from Dicky Flatt?" There were not a lot of programs that stood up to that test.

As we begin this legislative session, let us not forget that while we cannot improve upon the system of government that we have inherited, we can improve the outcome that the cynical might expect. Let there be no illusion about the difficulty of our task. It is not easy. But I have no doubt but that we will all do our very best to serve. In conclusion, I want to express my appreciation for all of you. I also want to express my love and appreciation for my wife Teresa, who is not here today. Public service places a large burden upon those who love us most. So it is appropriate that we demonstrate our thanks by serving in a way that makes them proud, and that makes us deserving of the warmth and serenity that they provide when we return home. May God bless us that we exercise wisdom in our work, and that it will be tempered by humility and justice. And may God bless the Great State of Utah.

(4) "Child" has the same meaning as "minor," as defined in this section.

(5) "Consumer" means a person who receives services offered by the division in accordance with this chapter.

(6) "Chronic physical abuse" means repeated or patterned physical abuse.

(7) "Chronic neglect" means a repeated or patterned failure or refusal by a parent, guardian, or custodian to provide necessary care for a minor's safety, morals, or well-being.

(8) "Chronic emotional abuse" means repeated or patterned emotional abuse.

(9) "Custody," with regard to the division, means the custody of a child in the division as of the date of disposition.

(10) "Day-care services" means care of a child for a portion of

the day which is less than 24 hours:

(a) in the child's own home by a responsible person; or

(b) outside of the child's home in a:

(i) day-care center;

(ii) family group home; or

(iii) family child care home.

(11) "Dependent child" or "dependency" means a child, or the condition of a child, who is homeless or without proper care through no fault of the child's parent, guardian, or custodian.

(12) "Director" means the director of the Division of Child and Family Services.

(13) "Division" means the Division of Child and Family Services.

(14) (a) "Domestic violence services" means:

(i) temporary shelter, treatment, and related services to persons who are victims of abuse and their dependent children; and

(ii) treatment services for domestic violence perpetrators.

(b) As used in this Subsection (14):

(i) "abuse" means the same as that term is defined in Subsection 30-6-1(1); and

(ii) "domestic violence perpetrator" means a person who is alleged to have committed, has been convicted of, or has pled guilty to an act of domestic violence as defined in Subsection 77-36-1(2).

(15) "Homemaking service" means the care of individuals in their domiciles, and help given to individual caretaker relatives to achieve improved household and family management through the services of a trained homemaker.

(16) (a) "Minor" means a person under 18 years of age.

(b) "Minor" may also include a person under 21 years of age for whom the division has been specifically ordered by the juvenile court to provide services.

(17) "Natural parent" means a minor's biological or adoptive parent, and includes a minor's noncustodial parent.

(18) (a) "Neglect" means:

(i) abandonment of a child, except as provided in Part 8, Safe Relinquishment of a Newborn Child;

(ii) subjecting a child to mistreatment or abuse;

(iii) lack of proper parental care by reason of the fault or habits of the parent, guardian, or custodian;

(iv) failure or refusal of a parent, guardian, or custodian to

provide proper or necessary subsistence, education, or medical care, including surgery or psychiatric services when required, or any other care necessary for the child's health, safety, morals, or well-being; or

(v) a child at risk of being neglected or abused because another child in the same home is neglected or abused.

(b) The aspect of neglect relating to education, described in Subsection (18)(a)(iv), means that, after receiving notice that a child has been frequently absent from school without good cause, or that the child has failed to cooperate with school authorities in a reasonable manner, a parent or guardian fails to make a good faith effort to ensure that the child receives an appropriate education.

(c) A parent or guardian legitimately practicing religious beliefs and who, for that reason, does not provide specified medical treatment for a child, is not guilty of neglect.

(d) (i) Notwithstanding Subsection (18)(a), a health care decision made for a child by the child's parent or guardian does not constitute neglect unless the state or other party to the proceeding shows, by clear and convincing evidence, that the health care decision is not reasonable and informed.

(ii) Nothing in Subsection (18)(d)(i) may prohibit a parent or guardian from exercising the right to obtain a second health care opinion.

(19) "Protective custody," with regard to the division, means the shelter of a child by the division from the time the child is removed from the child's home until the earlier of:

(a) the shelter hearing; or

(b) the child's return home.

(20) "Protective services" means expedited services that are provided:

(a) in response to evidence of neglect, abuse, or dependency of a minor;

(b) to a cohabitant who is neglecting or abusing a child, in order to:

(i) help the cohabitant develop recognition of the cohabitant's duty of care and of the causes of neglect or abuse; and

(ii) strengthen the cohabitant's ability to provide safe and acceptable care; and

(c) in cases where the child's welfare is endangered:

(i) to bring the situation to the attention of the appropriate juvenile court and law enforcement agency;

(ii) to cause a protective order to be issued for the protection of

the minor, when appropriate; and

(iii) to protect the child from the circumstances that endanger the child's welfare including, when appropriate:

(A) removal from the child's home;

(B) placement in substitute care; and

(C) petitioning the court for termination of parental rights.

(21) "Services to unwed parents" means social, educational, and medical services arranged for or provided to unwed parents to help them plan for themselves and the unborn child.

(22) "Severe neglect" means neglect that causes or threatens to cause serious harm to a minor.

(23) "Shelter care" means the temporary care of minors in nonsecure facilities.

(24) "State" means:

(a) a state of the United States;

(b) the District of Columbia;

(c) the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico;

(d) the Virgin Islands;

(e) Guam;

(f) the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands; or

(g) a territory or possession administered by the United States.

(25) "Severe emotional abuse" means emotional abuse that causes or threatens to cause serious harm to a minor.

(26) "Severe physical abuse" means physical abuse that causes or threatens to cause serious harm to a minor.

(27) "State plan" means the written description of the programs for children, youth, and family services administered by the division in accordance with federal law.

(28) "Status offense" means a violation of the law that would not be a violation but for the age of the offender.

(29) "Substantiated" or "substantiation" means a judicial finding based on a preponderance of the evidence that abuse or neglect occurred. Each allegation made or identified in a given case shall be considered separately in determining whether there should be a finding of substantiated.

(30) "Substitute care" means:

(a) the placement of a minor in a family home, group care facility, or other placement outside the minor's own home, either at the request of a parent or other responsible relative, or upon court order, when it is determined that continuation of care in the child's own home

would be contrary to the child’s welfare;

(b) services provided for a child awaiting placement; and

(c) the licensing and supervision of a substitute care facility.

(31) “Supported” means a finding by the division based on the evidence available at the completion of an investigation that there is a reasonable basis to conclude that abuse, neglect, or dependency occurred. Each allegation made or identified during the course of the investigation shall be considered separately in determining whether there should be a finding of supported.

(32) “Temporary custody,” with regard to the division, means the custody of a child in the division from the date of the shelter hearing until disposition.

(33) “Transportation services” means travel assistance given to an individual with escort service, if necessary, to and from community facilities and resources as part of a service plan.

(34) “Unsubstantiated” means except as provided in Subsections 62A-4a-1008(1)(a) and (1)(b)(ii), a judicial finding that there is insufficient evidence to conclude that abuse or neglect occurred.

(35) “Unsupported” means a finding at the completion of an investigation that there is insufficient evidence to conclude that abuse, neglect, or dependency occurred. However, a finding of unsupported means also that the division worker did not conclude that the allegation was without merit.

**STATE-OF-THE-STATE ADDRESS
BY GOVERNOR JON M. HUNTSMAN, JR.
DELIVERED JANUARY 17, 2006
AT WASHINGTON ELEMENTARY SCHOOL,
BOUNTIFUL, UTAH**

Lt. Governor Gary and Jeanette Herbert; President John and Karen Valentine; Speaker Greg and Teresa Curtis; Chief Justice Christine Durham and members of the Utah Supreme Court; Members of the Legislature; Guests and my fellow Utahns:

I begin tonight by recognizing our First Lady, Mary Kaye, whose support, hard work and commitment to service make all of us proud.

I also express a deep and heartfelt thanks to each of you for giving me the honor of a lifetime—that of serving you as your Governor. Thank you for your trust, support, constructive criticism, and interest.

To the Legislature, I truly appreciate the partnership that I have with you. There may be differences in how we see the world, but the bonds that unite us are many.

Tonight we are gathered to participate in the annual review of our State as called for by the Utah Constitution. As we begin what could be an historic legislative session, I am proud to report that the State of our State is exceptionally strong.

Last year we met in the Territorial Capitol in Fillmore and recognized the contributions that so many have made to make Utah a success, whether they were pioneers, miners, sixth-generation Utahns like my parents or newcomers like my in-laws.

This year, I thought it would be appropriate to gather here at Washington Elementary School in Bountiful to share a vision of a future where we work together to build a hopeful foundation for Utah's next generation.

Before we look ahead, let me thank those who wear our nation's uniform as members of our armed forces.

We have a special place in our hearts for those who serve, particularly for those who have given the ultimate sacrifice in preserving our nation's values. We salute your service and reverence your commitment.

My direction as Governor is simple and focused: First, to seek enhanced economic freedom for all Utah citizens; second, to ensure our education system matches our children's dreams with their unique, individual abilities; third, to provide a transportation system that will allow our State to maintain its position as home to America's best quality of life; and fourth, to leave to our posterity the greatest legacy of all—a sense of humanity—and respect for our land and our way of life.

Utah's economy has fully recovered and is strong. Unemployment rates and job creation are at near historic levels. Businesses like Adam Aircraft, Cabella's and Rossignol Ski Company located to our great State. They have found something in Utah that does not exist elsewhere, and have decided to make it their home.

Utah-born entities like Ogio, Merit Medical, and Sky West continue to expand and create more jobs. Recently, *Fast Company* magazine listed our capitol city as one of the nation's hottest business destinations. This label is applicable statewide. Others, including our competitors, are quickly learning that something important is happening here.

I also express thanks to the great efforts of many Northern Utah workers and United States Air Force personnel, Hill Air Force Base will remain open. By keeping Hill open, we have not only avoided what could have become an economic disaster for our State, we have preserved an opportunity for thousands of Utahns to contribute meaningfully to the security of our nation. We thank them; and our grateful nation salutes them.

With the eyes of the world on our economic accomplishments, now is the time to build on this success, create more high-paying jobs, and thereby provide greater economic freedom for our citizens.

It is important to send a signal about our commitment to long-term competitiveness. One important way we can become more competitive is to reform our antiquated tax code.

First, we need a personal income tax system that is simpler, flatter, and fairer. We need to provide one of the lowest income tax rates in the West—and one that leaves more money in the pockets of taxpayers.

The income tax funds public education. We must therefore commit to long-term growth and sustainability such that our schools are adequately funded. I emphatically urge that legislators approve a flatter personal income tax rate that would lower the percentage an individual pays from seven percent to five percent. It is the wise thing to do and now is the time to act.

The time is also right to take a look at another onerous tax. Speaker Greg Curtis and I were recently discussing the history of the sales tax in this State. We agree that there was a chapter opened in our State's tax history seventy-three years ago that now needs to be closed.

During the early 1930s Utah's fiscal house was in chaos. Half of all property owners could not pay their property taxes. Families were devastated as numerous farms, homes and businesses were forced into foreclosure. The State was facing bankruptcy. In desperation, the Legislature gave Governor Henry Blood the authority to impose a tax on the one thing people had to purchase in order to survive: food. Taxing food was a drastic measure adopted as a temporary fix for a very different time.

Like so many "temporary" public-policy fixes, the initial reason for adopting this measure has come and gone but the tax has remained. Seven decades later, it continues to burden our most vulnerable citizens.

I have good news tonight. The Great Depression is long gone, and our State is in strong fiscal shape.

By making modest adjustments to our allocation of existing revenue streams—for example, by increasing the share of sales-tax revenue retained by local governments, by collecting sales tax already due our State from online purchases, by using anticipated new revenue from economic growth, and by tapping into funds I have already set aside in my budget—we can provide Utahns immediate relief at the checkout counter. Now is the time and this is the session to remove the sales tax on food!

Our State can be both competitive and compassionate as we revise our tax code to be more family friendly and fiscally responsible. Reforming the tax code, however, is not enough to secure our long-term economic prosperity.

Securing our long-term prosperity will require both a strong commitment to education and a focus on innovation to make certain the next generation can achieve their dreams here in Utah.

In the early 1970s Governor Calvin Rampton and Utah Legislators, including Senator Mike Dmitrich, established Research Park near the University of Utah.

This revolutionary concept coupled the great ideas from researchers and academics with the keen commercial sense of entrepreneurs and skilled workers from our State.

The result of this coupling was groundbreaking. This “research-plus-business” combination led to the establishment of world-class businesses like Evans & Sutherland, NPS Pharmaceuticals, and Myriad Genetics. It also led to critically important research in cancer treatment, diabetes, genetics, as well as the robotic arm just to name a few. It was a risk that has paid great dividends for Utahns, and for humankind.

Today it is time to invest in the next generation of world-renown Utah innovation and ideas. As Winston Churchill said, “the empires of the future are the empires of the mind.” We now have the opportunity once again to be bold and visionary as we move toward the next generation of knowledge-based, high-paying jobs. Utah can lead the nation in areas where we have comparative research advantages.

USTAR—the Utah Science, Technology, and Research Initiative—will capitalize on the unique resources of our State, such as the Utah Population Database, Genomics, Informatics, Personalized Medicine, and the talented faculty and students at the University of Utah and Utah State University. We will be uniquely positioned to produce the next generation of both life-saving discoveries and award-winning researchers if we will take this crucial step forward.

This session, I ask you to pass the legislation sponsored by Senator Al Mansell and Representative David Clark to make USTAR a brilliant reality!

Second, we must focus on education. It is important to take the necessary steps to ensure that our education system matches the individual dreams and abilities of each child. As the parents of six children, Mary Kaye and I know that each child approaches the classroom differently.

Last year our State took a significant step forward in recognizing those differences when we enacted the Carson Smith Special Needs Bill. We must also provide our educators, like Principal Carolyn Ingles and her faculty here at Washington Elementary, greater resources to meet the unprecedented needs of our growing student population. That is why I have proposed a 5.5 percent increase in the amount of money we provide for each student.

During the holidays, I had the wonderful opportunity to have my whole family living under the same roof again. I have often quipped that, while not a

professional educator myself, I have been running my own clinical trials at home with children now in elementary, middle, high school, and college—each with unique personalities and abilities.

We recognize that today's youth will, on average, hold several jobs during the course of their careers, unlike earlier generations. This is a profound change in the training they will need as they prepare for the marketplace. While we cannot predict the job opportunities that our kids might encounter in the future, we can clearly make sure that they are prepared for a lifetime of learning.

The best way to accomplish this objective is to ensure that they develop a passion for knowledge. This passion must develop in a student's career, and it must reflect the increasingly important role that teachers will play in providing the necessary environment in which their students learn.

We have the need, we now have the resources, and it is time to act to make certain that Utah students are receiving a world-class education—one that will make them competitive with students from California to Connecticut and from Beijing to Brussels, and one that will help fuel their passions to ensure a generation of life-long learners.

Of course, increased funding alone is not enough to make certain that our children will thrive in the classroom. A particular group of our students are struggling with the fundamentals of literacy and numeracy.

If we do not help them in their early years, they will struggle to survive academically and many will fall through the cracks and end up short of their true potential. We can provide more for them now, and by so doing help eliminate any learning achievement gaps in their future.

That is why I propose a seven million dollar voluntary, all-day kindergarten program in our Title I schools like Washington Elementary here in Bountiful. Our students who desire extra assistance need it early in their academic careers. Test scores of kindergarten students at Parkview and Bennion Elementary in Salt Lake City, where all-day programs are available, tell a story of success. Our goal is simple: We want to encourage all of our students to become lifelong learners.

Good teachers are critical to turning this goal into a reality. In recognition of that fact, I am seeking funding to enhance teacher training and incentives in the areas of math and science during the fourth, fifth and sixth grades. Just as students in early grades need to master reading, children who are preparing to enter junior high school need to master the basic fundamentals of math and science. This is not all. We must carefully expand on the success of our many public charter schools.

All parents and educators must be willing to challenge our students with a more robust and rigorous curriculum. Building intellectual infrastructure by way of brainpower—whether at the elementary, secondary, or higher education level—is as crucial to our State’s success as building roads, bridges, and dams. If we fail our children, we have failed our future.

Third, we need a transportation system that meets our commitment to having the best quality of life in America. Our legislative hosts here in Bountiful, Senator Dan Eastman and Representative Sheryl Allen—working together with many others who are with us tonight—recently helped us reach across a divide and finally resolve a longstanding impasse.

There were many who said it could not, would not, be done; however, thanks to many of you, traffic will soon flow on the Legacy Parkway!

Building the Legacy Parkway is but one small part of our overall transportation plan. We must continue to invest in roads and rails so that our quality of life is not unduly limited by the amount of time we spend stuck in traffic. We must preserve routes for future roads, plan for public–private partnerships, and enhance the use of High Occupancy Vehicle lanes for hybrid or environmentally friendly vehicles.

In short, we cannot have sustained economic prosperity without an adequate transportation system. As the fifth fastest–growing State in the nation, we are adding the population equivalent of one City of Ogden per year. We cannot afford to stand back and watch traffic gridlock increase.

Just like education, when it comes to funding transportation, we must begin to pay now or we will all pay dearly in the future. My budget calls for unprecedented increases in transportation funding. When it comes to improving old roads and investing in new ones, the time is now!

Prior to being elected as Governor, I was involved in running a business where I learned some very valuable lessons. For example, when times were good, there was often a temptation to spend the profit on things that did not necessarily benefit the company. The prudent course was always to reinvest a large portion of the profit back into the basic infrastructure that produced the company’s products. This is known as “maintenance capital.”

We are now in a position to help catch up on some “deferred maintenance” in our State and invest maintenance capital in vital areas such as education, transportation and reformation of our Elvis–era tax system.

There is a clear difference between “growing government” and “maintenance capital.” Growth in government occurs when we increase the number of full-time State employees as a percentage of overall population.

Even though our State’s population grew by a staggering 3.2 percent last year, this year I recommend that we increase the number of full-time State employees by no more than 1.3 percent.

If Utah is to remain competitive, if we are to lead the way in promoting education, utilizing technology, and enhancing our transportation systems, it is essential that we invest our maintenance capital wisely.

Fourth, we need to create an environment that will leave the greatest legacy of all: A sense of humanity and respect for our land.

I have had many opportunities to visit our vast and diverse State this past year. I have enjoyed an early morning breakfast on the Fourth of July in Blanding. I have traveled to historic Range Creek with Senator John Valentine and Representative Brad King. And I have toured Utah’s remote West Desert with Cecil Garland, a rancher who loves the land and served as my guide. These, and many other experiences, have confirmed for me what we all know: Utahns love this land we call our home and we will fight to protect it!

When Utahns stand united, we get results. For over three decades, uranium mill tailings have sat precariously close to the banks of the Colorado River near Moab, endangering the lives of our citizens and our lands. This past year, with the help of U.S. Energy Secretary Sam Bodman and with the assistance of members of our congressional delegation, our State received a commitment that the tailings finally will be moved!

Thanks to the work of so many, we reached an agreement early last year that ensures class B and C radioactive waste will not find a home in Utah.

Even more recently, working closely with Congressman Rob Bishop and other members of our congressional delegation, we were successful in getting Congress to pass legislation that created the Cedar Mountain Wilderness Area. Many said the opposition was too great, the fight a waste of resources—a losing battle. The Goliaths were supposedly going to roll right over us and win.

The Cedar Mountain Wilderness legislation, which was signed into law by President Bush two weeks ago, not only makes it extremely difficult for anyone to bring spent nuclear fuel into Skull Valley, it also preserves the integrity of the Utah Test and Training Range, the only military installation of its kind in the United States.

I have a message for the nuclear waste folks who want to use our pristine State as a dumping ground: We do not produce spent nuclear fuel, we do not benefit from it, and we will not store this deadly material in Utah!

As we look toward enhancing our environment, we are mindful of our needs for the future. Southern Utah is one of the fastest-growing areas in the United States and we must secure the needs of our citizens there. My budget calls for lifting the current caps on water-project funding, which will allow us to expedite critical projects like the Lake Powell pipeline.

As your Governor, I am committed to responsible development of our energy resources and having an energy policy that meets our economic-development objectives. The advent of new and exciting technologies means that we are poised to enter a new era of energy development and growth.

I recently toured the oil fields located in Duchesne and Uintah Counties. Hundreds of new oil and gas wells dot the landscape. Representatives Gordon Snow and John Mathis told me that so many out-of-state workers have moved into the area that it is almost impossible to find a motel room. They and Senator Beverly Evans stressed the need to complete a Utah College of Applied Technology building in Vernal so that Utah residents can be better trained to enter the exploding job market there. I agree.

As the Chief Executive of our State, I pledge to continue working to ensure that the safety and well-being of our citizens are never compromised. We learned from the Katrina disaster that preparation is crucial. We will never forget the images we all witnessed on our televisions—strangers hanging on to one another for comfort and support with nothing to protect them from certain death except a rooftop of some nondescript building.

We watched when camouflaged-clad guardsmen and women, including some from our own State, finally swept in with their protective gear, waded through chest-deep, toxic waters with grateful strangers in their arms, and carried them off to safety. I was proud of our own State employees and citizens who swung into action at a moment's notice to provide critical care and support as hundreds of those evacuees made their way into our State.

Rest assured that, as a State, we are better prepared than ever before for any such catastrophic event. I have already spoken with Health and Human Services Secretary Mike Leavitt about hosting, in collaboration with our Department of Health a Governor's Summit in March to prepare for any possible avian flu pandemic. On this important issue, we in Utah will lead out, rather than stand back and react.

Before I close, I want to take a moment to thank our State employees. Whether it is Trooper Kevin Bradshaw, who patrols U.S. 89 through Fairview; Priya Noronha, a Human Services caseworker who is helping families devastated by meth addiction; or Steven Niebergall, a Utah Department of Transportation engineer who is working on the reconstruction of Interstate 84 in Morgan County, we appreciate your work and the work of your colleagues. We are anxious to make certain you receive the compensation you deserve.

Many find the world today complex, confusing, and even frightening, but let me reassure you that in Utah, our minds can be put at ease. Our State can compete in any market in the world.

As we continue to preserve freedom, value education and embrace technology, there will be no reason why our land-locked State cannot compete with any bustling port city in America, Asia, or Europe. To paraphrase my son Will, Utah rocks!

Let us never forget that, in spite of all we do as a State, the center of our universe is not in the Governor's Office, the Legislature, our businesses, or our schools; the center of our universe is in our respective homes.

It is in our homes that dreams are born, nurtured, realized, and eventually replaced by more dreams. Our commitment to our homes and each other ensures that our dreams will never be outnumbered by our memories.

May God bless the sovereign State of Utah and the United States of America.

(A) to each local taxing jurisdiction; and

(B) on the basis of the population of each local taxing jurisdiction as compared to the population of the state.

(ii) Subsection (4)(c)(i) applies to a transaction:

(A) made by a seller described in Subsection 59–12–107(1)(b);

and

(B) involving tangible personal property that is shipped from outside the state.

(d) (i) Notwithstanding Subsection (4)(b), for a transaction described in Subsection (4)(d)(ii), the location where the transaction is consummated is determined by allocating the total revenues reported to the commission each month that are generated by the tax imposed under this section on the transactions described in Subsection (4)(d)(ii):

(A) to local taxing jurisdictions within a county; and

(B) on the basis of the proportion of total revenues generated by the transactions described in Subsection (4)(b)(ii) that are reported to the commission for that month within a local taxing jurisdiction within that county as compared to the total revenues generated by the transactions described in Subsection (4)(b)(ii) that are reported to the commission for that month within all local taxing jurisdictions within that county.

(5) Reservoirs, dams, watergates, canals, ditches, flumes, tunnels, aqueducts and pipes for the supplying of persons, mines, mills, smelters or other works for the reduction of ores, with water for domestic or other uses, or for irrigation purposes, or for the draining and reclaiming of lands, or for the floating of logs and lumber on streams not navigable, or for solar evaporation ponds and other facilities for the recovery of minerals in solution.

(6) Roads, railroads, tramways, tunnels, ditches, flumes, pipes and dumping places to facilitate the milling, smelting or other reduction of ores, or the working of mines, quarries, coal mines or mineral deposits including minerals in solution; outlets, natural or otherwise, for the deposit or conduct of tailings, refuse or water from mills, smelters or other works for the reduction of ores, or from mines, quarries, coal mines or mineral deposits including minerals in solution; mill dams; gas, oil or coal pipelines, tanks or reservoirs, including any subsurface stratum or formation in any land for the underground storage of natural gas, and in connection therewith such other interests in property as may be required adequately to examine, prepare, maintain, and operate such underground natural gas storage facilities; and solar evaporation ponds and other facilities for the recovery of minerals in solution; also any occupancy in common by the owners or possessors of different mines, quarries, coal mines, mineral deposits, mills, smelters, or other places for the reduction

of ores, or any place for the flow, deposit or conduct of tailings or refuse matter.

(8) Telegraph, telephone, electric light and electric power lines, and sites for electric light and power plants.

(9) Sewerage of any city or town, or of any settlement of not less than ten families, or of any public building belonging to the state, or of any college or university.

(10) Canals, reservoirs, dams, ditches, flumes, aqueducts and pipes for supplying and storing water for the operation of machinery for the purpose of generating and transmitting electricity for power, light or heat.

(11) Cemeteries and public parks.

(12) Pipe lines for the purpose of conducting any and all liquids connected with the manufacture of beet sugar.

INTENT LANGUAGE FOR 3RD SUB. H.B. 46

On motion of Representative Barrus, the House voted to spread the following intent language upon the pages of the House Journal.

“An Energy Policy Working Group was established during the interim of 2005 at the direction of the Public Utilities and Technology Interim Committee

and the Natural Resources, Agriculture and Environment Interim Committee. Based upon the findings of the Working Group and discussions in the House and Senate, the following list of actions (in no order of priority) is recommended for consideration by the Utah Legislature and the Governor's Office:

- Create a central state repository for energy-related information
- State encouragement of energy development research at state universities through appropriations or incentives
- Form joint governmental/private partnership for transmission-related measures, including a single siting authority, interstate partnerships for siting, and state funding for transmission facilities
- Evaluate the state's role in advocating for energy transportation infrastructure projects in the NEPA process before federal, state and local authorities
- Study funding options for local governments' provision of transportation infrastructure for energy projects
- Study ways to eliminate barriers to rail transportation, including additional fees on trackage miles
- Coordinate regulatory processes, both within the state and on an interstate basis, to encourage the development of multi-state transmission facilities
- Create a single point in state government for those proposing energy-related projects to obtain information about, and assistance with meeting, federal, state, and local requirements
- Create a summary outlining various requirements of federal, state and local authorities for energy-related projects
- Provide some form of state support for those seeking federal assistance, including use of federal lands and funds, to develop Utah's resources and new technologies
- Streamline state review and approval processes for energy-related activities
- Ready state review systems in advance of new technologies to ensure timely review when new development is proposed

- Conduct full–cost analysis of resource development decisions, incorporating not only economic, but also environmental and health factors
- Promote cost–effective renewable energy resources, both central station and distributed, as part of the state’s energy portfolio
- Study the opportunities of developing energy from nuclear power generation in the state
- Creation of a renewable energy task force to examine the availability and cost of renewable energy sources
- Reduce barriers to cogeneration projects, including price discrepancies
- Create an energy efficiency committee to develop specific efficiency policies
- Adopt quantitative goals for state and local government energy efficiency programs
- Remove economic and regulatory barriers to utility companies’ demand side management programs
- Improve energy efficiency in state buildings
- Seek better enforcement of building codes to ensure compliance with energy efficiency provisions in those codes
- Perform a baseline Energy Study for residential and commercial buildings to identify areas for improvement
- Promote advanced vehicle fuels and technology, with emphasis on performance instead of specific technologies
- Promote public transportation, rideshare programs, and other trip reduction initiatives
- Identify mechanisms necessary to ensure low income consumers’ access to energy services
- Promote educational programs supporting energy efficiency initiatives
- Provide financial support for energy efficiency measures, including tax incentives and money to take advantage of federal matching funds”

INTENT LANGUAGE FOR H.B. 38

On motion of Representative Ferry, the House voted to print the following intent language upon the pages of the House Journal.

This statement memorializes the public discussions, including the work of the Legislative Water Issues Task Force, that led to passage of H.B. 38 and declares the Legislature's intent concerning the water rights that may be considered for reuse under this legislation. Utah's bedrock water law principle is that beneficial use is the basis, measure, and limit of all Utah water rights. Water rights owned by public agencies that meet community or district water needs and are granted for the "municipal purpose" beneficial use.

“Municipal purpose” or “municipal use” (hereafter “municipal purpose”) covers generally the uses of water within a municipality’s boundaries including, but not limited to, domestic, commercial, irrigation, stock watering, and industrial uses. “Municipal purpose” as used in this paragraph is different than “domestic use”. That is to say the Legislature intends that water rights with the “municipal purposes” beneficial use are eligible for reuse under this legislation, whereas water rights with “domestic use” and other types of beneficial uses are not.

Only a special district or a municipality may hold a water right that has, as its beneficial use, “municipal purpose.” Where water rights are originally approved for municipal purposes, the depletion of water under those rights is generally equal to the allowed diversion. Where water rights originally established for non-municipal purposes are changed to the “municipal purpose” beneficial use, depletion limits less than the original diversion amount are usually established to insure return flows are put back in a water system. This principle both recognizes the limitations of the original right and keeps whole any downstream water right holders. Only water rights with the “municipal purpose” beneficial use are eligible for reuse under this legislation. Where a municipality or district holds a water right with a beneficial use other than “municipal purpose,” a change application will need to be filed with and approved by the State Engineer before the water right is included as part of a water reuse application.

(h) encourage and conduct studies, investigations, and research relating to air contamination and air pollution and their causes, effects, prevention, abatement, and control;

(i) determine by means of field studies and sampling the degree of air contamination and air pollution in all parts of the state;

(j) monitor the effects of the emission of air contaminants from motor vehicles on the quality of the outdoor atmosphere in all parts of this state and take appropriate action with respect to them;

(k) collect and disseminate information and conduct educational and training programs relating to air contamination and air pollution;

JOINT CONVENTION

A Joint Convention of the Legislature was held in the House Chamber at 11:00 a.m. on May 24, 2006, to hear from President Vicente Fox of Mexico. Representative Alexander moved to have the speech by President Fox printed in the House and Senate Journals.

REMARKS BY PRESIDENT VICENTE FOX OF MEXICO

Honorable Jon Huntsman Jr., Governor of the State of Utah; Senator John L. Valentine, President of the Senate; Representative Greg J. Curtis, Speaker of the House; Distinguished legislative leaders; Members of this Honorable Legislature; Members of the Mexican Delegation; Ladies and Gentlemen:

On behalf of the people and the government of Mexico, a nation which is a partner and a friend of the United States of America, I express my most sincere appreciation for the opportunity to address this joint session of the legislature of Utah.

I bring to the people of this wonderful state, renowned for its natural beauty and rich heritage, the warmest greetings from all Mexicans.

Let this historic occasion mark my country's pledge to a stronger relationship between Mexico and Utah.

Let this historic occasion mark our joint commitment to making this relationship one in which we seek understanding while respecting our differences,

and working together to achieve the prosperity and security of our peoples, as we face the global challenges of the 21st century.

Mexico has long strived to build democracy and economic stability. The road has certainly not been an easy one, but every single step has been worth it. And today, our 103 million people live next door to you in peace and freedom.

Consider just how far we have come in six short years. Today your neighbor is a Mexico with free and fair elections; a Mexico with clear separation of power among the branches of government; a Mexico with the utmost respect for the rule of law, freedom of religion and freedom of speech; with government accountability and transparency as the rule and not the exception.

Today, Mexicans are free to express their opinions...and believe me, they do! If you doubt whether we have achieved freedom of the press in Mexico, I would be glad to read you some of the things they write about us in the Mexican newspapers.

But today we live in a completely different Mexico than we did just six years ago...a Mexico where every citizen has a say in government...a Mexico where those voters require that government serves the people.

Nothing less than a fully democratic Mexico is demanded by its citizens; nothing less than a fully democratic Mexico is demanded by its citizens; nothing less than a fully democratic Mexico has been the guiding principle of our administration.

Over the past five years, the promotion of human rights has been a centerpiece of government policy. This policy upholds a human rights culture in Mexico's society and aims at prosecuting all cases of human rights abuse by government authorities.

Moreover, we have opened ourselves to international scrutiny. During my administration, for the first time, Mexico called for the establishment of an office of the United Nations High Commissioner on Human Rights.

In recognition, last week Mexico was elected to preside over the new United Nations Human Rights Council...underscoring our commitment to human rights for all.

But no democracy can flourish fully unless it provides economic freedom; unless it frees the energy and hard work of its people...unless it unleashes a true entrepreneurial spirit.

Until recently, Mexico was trapped in a vicious cycle of economic crisis. But we have set out to change that...and today, Mexico has the soundest, safest, most stable economy of our lifetimes.

Thanks to a responsible management of public finances, we have achieved an inflation rate of 3.3%, the lowest in thirty seven years. We have single digit interest rates...and our economy is growing at a healthy 5.3%.

Mexicans want a government that costs less, and works better. Our administration's public deficit will be the lowest in thirty years, it will have spent more on improving the lives of our people than any other administration in Mexico's history.

Through the program, "Oportunidades", our federal government's main social program, over five million Mexican families in poverty – some twenty five million poor people – now receive health, education and nutritional support.

Over the last six years, spending on education has increased over 70%...we've put more than a billion books in Mexican classrooms...and today, one of every four students enrolled in our public system receives a scholarship to continue their studies. At the end of my administration, Mexico will be allocating at least 7.5% of its Gross Domestic Product to education.

We have also made progress regarding housing, based on the most ambitious program in Mexico's history.

In 2005 alone, we built 750 thousand houses for the same number of families. In less than six years, more than three million families have gained access to a decent home.

But as many of you know, before I became President of Mexico, I worked in a small business you might have heard of in the United States...Coca Cola.

As a businessman, I learned that the best social program in the world is a good job at decent wages.

That's a big part of our mission here today...to promote investment, business and trade that create jobs both in Mexico and right here in Utah.

Free trade and investment agreements with over forty countries make Mexico one of the world's most open economies, one which trades over 435 billion dollars a year.

Over the past five years, Mexico has received over 87 billion dollars in Foreign Direct Investment, most of which comes from its North American trading partners, the United States and Canada.

At the same time, Mexico is the second largest trading partner of the U.S., buying more products from this country than Germany, Italy, France and the United Kingdom combined.

During his visit to Mexico, in July 2005, Governor Huntsman expressed the importance of Mexico as a strategic partner in order to strengthen Utah's economic development and called on Mexican industry to work with an economy that is strong, modern and fast-advancing in sectors such as biotechnology, genetics, software development and medical equipment. He also insisted on the importance of deepening trade and investment ties with Mexico, as well as education and cultural exchange programs. In order to do this, we agreed to create the Utah-Mexico Partnership Working Group. To that end, during the last two days, I have had the opportunity to meet with many of Utah's business and political leaders. We have done business together. We have talked policy together. But more importantly, we have been truly moved by the personal commitment of your leaders to the Mexican people.

Thank you Governor Huntsman.

Dear friends: Mexico and the United States have a strong, dynamic – and yes – complex relationship. Over the years we have moved away from a notion of distant neighbors to one of the strategic partners. A new democratic government could not produce an old foreign policy. Mexico's redefinition of foreign policy has included a constructive approach towards the United States.

Since the beginning of my administration two important goals have guided our relationship with the United States: furthering the North American Agenda and achieving a better bilateral management of the migration issue between our countries.

In the beginning of the 21st Century, the need for improving our regional competitiveness and the threat from terrorism and criminal organizations, call upon us to regard regional prosperity and security as two key elements in our shared agenda.

The Security and Prosperity Partnership of North America, created last year by Canada, Mexico, and the United States, seeks to reduce the cost of doing business between our countries, breaking the bottlenecks at the border with more efficient and secure trade corridors, eliminating "the tyranny of small differences" between our regulations.

Now, let us talk frankly about our most pressing challenge....and our most promising opportunity....the key to real security and prosperity of these two neighbors.....migration.

One cannot underestimate the importance of this moment and how complex this issue is for our two nations. Therefore, I wish to clearly state my government's view on this matter.

Since the beginning of my administration, the government of Mexico has promoted the establishment of a new system that regulates the movement of people across our border in a manner which is legal, safe, and orderly. We have pursued this course with the firm conviction that a legal, safe, and orderly migration policy will benefit the security and prosperity of both of our nations. This belief is guided by a principle of shared responsibility, which acknowledges that both countries must do our share in the bilateral management of migration.

Through a joint initiative of the Executive Branch, federal legislators and civil society, a set of principles and recommendations were put forward to update Mexico's migration policy. This position was adopted as a joint resolution by our Congress in February of this year. Allow me to summarize its most important aspects.

1. Mexico does not promote nor support undocumented migration. In fact, Mexico absolutely must continue to expand jobs, economic growth and social opportunities so migration is no longer necessary.

2. Mexico acknowledges the sovereign right of each country to enforce its law and protect its borders, but considers, that among friends, neighbors, and partners, bilateral dialogue and cooperation is a key component for the successful management of migration.

3. Mexico must continue to develop and enforce migration laws and policy with full respect for human rights and the safety of citizens on both sides of the border and remains committed to fighting all forms of human smuggling and trafficking. Moreover, Mexico is working together with Mesoamerican countries to uphold these principles.

4. Mexico's migration policy must be adjusted in order to safeguard our borders under the principle of shared responsibility.

5. Mexico believes that it will take more than just enforcement to truly solve the challenges posed by the migration phenomenon, and that a comprehensive reform is in the interest of both nations.

Ladies and gentlemen, as never before, our societies call upon their governments to achieve a better management of migration and our border. Mexico wants to be part of the solution, not part of the problem.

Comprehensive reform will help both countries to concentrate our efforts and resources in addressing our shared security and prosperity concerns. We are your partners in security against terrorism. We are your allies in the war on drugs and crime. We are your partners in the drive for economic prosperity. Let us work together as neighbors and friends.

The United States rightly prides itself as a country whose strength and character comes from its diversity. Mexico is proud of its people here, whose working spirit and moral values contribute everyday to the economy and society of this great nation.

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, since the adjournment of the 2006 General Session of the Fifty–Sixth Legislature of the State of Utah, matters have arisen which require immediate legislative attention; and

WHEREAS, Article VII, Section 6 of the Constitution of the State of Utah provides that the Governor may, by proclamation, convene the Legislature into a Special Session;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, JON M. HUNTSMAN, JR., Governor of the State of Utah by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the Laws of the State of Utah, do by this Proclamation call the Fifty–Sixth Legislature of the State of Utah into a Third Special Session at the State Capitol Complex in Salt Lake City, Utah, on the 24th day of May 2006, at 2:00 p.m. for the following purposes:

1. To consider a provision authorizing (a) an appropriation of transportation funding, (b) an appropriation of funds from the Division of Housing and Community Development to the Division of Arts and Museums, (c) an appropriation for the Driver License Division, and (d) an appropriation for the Economic Development Incentive Fund;
2. To consider a provision appropriating \$2 million in Medicaid funding for emergency dental services for the aged, blind, and disabled;
3. To consider a provision authorizing funds for a parking structure at the State Capitol Complex in an amount not to exceed \$15 million;
