Representative **Sheryl L. Allen** proposes the following amendments:

1. *Page 1, Line 16:*

- 16                   •       the promotion of international trade relationships with Utah ~~{-}~~ **; and**  
**requires the governor to consult with the commission before binding the state to an international**  
**trade agreement.**

2. *Page 3, Lines 67 through 82:*

- 67           36-26-103. Duties.  
68           The commission shall:  
69           (1) comply with the rules of legislative interim committees unless those rules conflict  
70           with this section;  
71           (2) study and make recommendations to the Legislature concerning:  
72           (a) the impact of international treaties adopted by the United States Senate on the  
73           Legislature's constitutional powers to regulate state affairs, public and private;  
74           (b) the creation, duties and powers, and oversight of a state trade representative or state  
75           point of contact; and  
76           (c) the promotion of international trade with Utah; ~~{-and-}~~  
77           (3) maintain active communication with:  
78           (a) the United States trade representative's office;  
79           (b) Utah's Congressional delegation;  
80           (c) Utah's state trade representative or state point of contact, if created; and  
81           (d) any other organization whose mission involves international trade in the United  
82           States as the commission considers appropriate ~~{-}~~ **; and**  
**(4) have no more than four paid meetings per year.**

3. *Page 3, after Line 86, insert:*

Section 5. Section **67-1-15** is enacted to read:

**67-1-15.** Approval of international trade agreement -- Consultation with Utah International Trade Commission.

**Before binding the state or giving the federal government consent to bind the state to an international trade agreement the Governor shall consult with the Utah International Trade Commission.**
