State Impact

Depending on the action of the board regarding the amount of the new fee, there may be a reduction of the State Parks' revenues. For example, if the new one-time fee is \$10, the Parks' revenues may be reduced by as much as \$101,900 in the first year and as much as \$166,500 the next year. It is anticipated that printing costs for the new permits will be approximately \$2,000.
