9	General Description:	
10	This bill amends the Health Care Providers Immunity From Liability Act.	
11	Highlighted Provisions:

13	• in certain circumstances, expands the application of immunity from liability during	
14	an emergency to health care facilities;	
15	<ul> <li>protects health care providers including facilities, from malpractice liability when</li> </ul>	
16	they respond to a natural disaster, pandemic event, or bioterrorism unless the health	
17	care provider:	
18	<ul> <li>is grossly negligent;</li> </ul>	
19	• caused the emergency; or	
20	<ul> <li>has engaged in criminal conduct; and</li> </ul>	
21	applies the limited liability protections to a health care provider even if:

32	Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:	
33	Section 1. Section <b>58-13-2.6</b> is enacted to read:	
34	58-13-2.6. Emergency care rendered by a person or health care facility.	
35	(1) For purposes of this section:	
36	(a) "Emergency" means an unexpected occurrence involving injury, the threat of injury,	
37	or illness to a person or the public due to:	
38	(i) a natural disaster;	
39	(ii) bioterrorism;	
40	(iii) an act of terrorism;	
41	(iv) a pandemic; or	
42	(v) other event of similar nature.	
43	(b) "Emergency care" includes actual assistance or advice offered to avoid, mitigate, or	
44	attempt to mitigate the effects of an emergency.	
45	(c) "Person" is defined in Subsection 26-21-2(18).	
46	(2) (a) A person, who in good faith, assists governmental agencies or political	
47	subdivisions with the activities described in Subsection (2)(b) is not liable for civil damages or	
48	penalties as a result of any act or omission unless the person rendering the assistance:	
49	(i) is grossly negligent;	
50	(ii) caused the emergency; or	
51	(iii) has engaged in criminal conduct.	
52	(b) The following activities are protected from liability in accordance with Subsection	
53	<u>(2)(a):</u>	
54	(i) implementing measures to control the causes of epidemic, pandemic, communicable	
55	diseases, or other conditions significantly affecting public health, as necessary to protect the	
56	public health in accordance with Title 26A, Chapter 1, Local Health Departments;	
57	(ii) investigating, controlling, and treating suspected bioterrorism or disease in	

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58	accordance with Title 26, Chapter 23b, Detection of Public Health Emergencies Act; or
59	(iii) responding to:
60	(A) a national, state, or local emergency;
61	(B) a public health emergency as defined in Section 26-23b-102; or
62	(C) a declaration by the President of the United States or other federal official
63	requesting public health related activities.
64	(c) Subsection (2)(a) applies to a person even if that person has:
65	(i) a duty to respond; or
66	(ii) an expectation of payment or remuneration.
67	(3) The immunity in Subsection (2) is in addition to any immunity protections that may
68	apply in state or federal law.
