State Impact

The bill includes an appropriation of \$2,300,000 from the General Fund to the Department of Health to fund cancer educational materials and subsidized cancer screenings for individuals with incomes below 250% of the Federal Poverty Level. Beyond the appropriation, there are no other estimated fiscal impacts.

Individual, Business and/or Local Impact

The bill divides the appropriation between 2 cancer screening groups, which will serve approximately 3,200 individuals. The \$1,500,000 for breast and cervical cancer will provide screenings for approximately 2,700 individuals. The \$800,000 for the colorectal cancer will provide screenings for about 500 individuals.
