26	Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:



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Section 1. Section **52-4-203** is amended to read:

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28	52-4-203. Minutes of open meetings Public records Recording of meetings.
29	(1) Except as provided under Subsection (8), written minutes and a recording shall be
30	kept of all open meetings.
31	(2) Written minutes of an open meeting shall include:
32	(a) the date, time, and place of the meeting;
33	(b) the names of members present and absent;
34	(c) the substance of all matters proposed, discussed, or decided by the public body
35	which may include a summary of comments made by members of the public body;
36	(d) a record, by individual member, of each vote taken by the public body;
37	(e) the name of each person who is not a member of the public body, and upon
38	recognition by the presiding member of the public body, provided testimony or comments to
39	the public body;
40	(f) the substance, in brief, of the testimony or comments provided by the public under
41	Subsection (2)(e); and
42	(g) any other information that any member requests be entered in the written minutes
43	or recording.
44	(3) A recording of an open meeting shall:
45	(a) be a complete and unedited record of all open portions of the meeting from the
46	commencement of the meeting through adjournment of the meeting; and
47	(b) be properly labeled or identified with the date, time, and place of the meeting.
48	(4) (a) The minutes [and recordings] of an open meeting [are public records and] shall
49	be available [within a reasonable time after the meeting.] to the public no later than the earlier
50	<u>of:</u>
51	(i) the next scheduled meeting; or
52	(ii) 14 days after the end of the meeting.
53	(b) The recordings of an open meeting shall be available to the public within a
54	reasonable time after the meeting.
55	[(b)] (c) An open meeting record kept only by a recording must be converted to written
56	minutes within a reasonable time upon request.
57	(5) All or any part of an open meeting may be independently recorded by any person in
58	attendance if the recording does not interfere with the conduct of the meeting.

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(6) [Minutes] Written minutes or recordings of an open meeting that are required to be
retained permanently shall be maintained in or converted to a format that meets long-term
records storage requirements.
(7) Written minutes and recordings of open meetings are public records under Title 63,
Chapter 2, Government Records Access and Management Act, but written minutes shall be the
official record of action taken at the meeting.
(8) Either written minutes or a recording shall be kept of:
(a) an open meeting that is a site visit or a traveling tour, if no vote or action is taken
by the public body; and
(b) an open meeting of a local district under Title 17B, Limited Purpose Local
Government Entities - Local Districts, or special service district under Title 17A, Chapter 2,

Part 13, Utah Special Service District Act, if the district's annual budgeted expenditures for all

funds, excluding capital expenditures and debt service, are \$50,000 or less.
