43	This part is known as the "[Electronic High School] Virtual Schools Act."				
44	Section 2. Section 53A-15-1002 is amended to read:				
45	53A-15-1002. Definitions.				
46	As used in this part:				
47	(1) "Board" means the State Board of Education.				
48	(2) "Electronic High School" means a rigorous program offering grade 9 - 12 level				
49	courses delivered over the Internet and coordinated by the board.

65	preponderance of its curriculum and instruction to its students through the Internet or other					
66	electronic means in a manner that fosters on-demand, interactive, self-paced, and					
67	individualized instruction.					
68	Section 3. Section 53A-15-1008 is enacted to read:

70	(1) The board is authorized to establish and coordinate the operations of Utah K-8					
71	Online, a virtual school for students in kindergarten through the eighth grade.					
72	(2) Utah K-8 Online may:					
73	(a) begin operation in the 2008-09 school year; and					
74	(b) have a maximum full-time equivalent student capacity of 1,500 students.					
75	(3) The board may contract with school districts, public schools, regional service					
76	centers, or private entities to provide services for Utah K-8 Online.					
77	(4) In accordance with Title 63, Chapter 46a, Utah Administrative Rulemaking Act, the					
78	board shall make rules providing:

State Impact

Enactment of this bill appropriates \$4,713,150 in ongoing Uniform School Fund to the Minimum School Program to support the Utah K-8 Online Virtual School. Enactment of this bill also appropriates \$100,000 in one-time Uniform School Fund in FY 2008 to the State Board of Education for school startup costs.

Estimates indicate that 900 to 1,000 potential K-8 Online Virtual School students participate in virtual education in the school districts. These students are currently counted in the enrollments of their district of residence and generate Weighted Pupil Units for Minimum School Program funding. Depending on the number of students that transition to the K-8 Online Virtual School, the state may realize a savings in WPU costs for the fiscal year following a student's transfer to the virtual school. Based on the current value of the WPU, the state may realize a savings of \$251,400 in WPU costs for every 100 students that enroll in the virtual school.
