Patient identity protection. 29 (1) (a) In order to discourage identity theft and health insurance fraud, a general acute 30 hospital shall request identification from an individual prior to providing in-patient or 31 out-patient services to the individual. 32 (b) If the individual who will receive services from the general acute hospital is a 33 minor under the age of 18 who is not permitted by law to consent to treatment, the general 34 acute hospital shall request identification from the individual who is consenting to treatment on 35 behalf of the minor. 36 (2) A hospital: 37 (a) may not refuse services to an individual on the basis that the individual did not 38 provide identification when requested; 39 (b) may not be penalized for failing to ask for identification; and

(c) is not subject to a private right of action for failing to ask for identification.
