Rep. Ray called the meeting to order at 3:21 p.m.

MOTION: Rep. Dougall moved to approve the minutes of the February 1, 2008 meeting. The

motion passed unanimously with Rep. Harper absent for the vote.

Lisa-Michele Church, Executive Director, Department of Human Services, and Thomas Patterson, Executive Director, Department of Corrections, gave a presentation on the use of prevention activities in state programs. Committee members were encouraged to support programs that will give individuals the tools to live healthy and productive lives. Handouts were provided to committee members.

H.B. 131 Community Based Self Sufficiency Grants (Rep. J. Seelig)

MOTION: Rep. Dougall moved to amend the bill as follows:

- 1. Page 1, Lines 22 through 23:
 - 22 as an ongoing appropriation, \$\{\frac{750,000}{}}\\$401,500 from the General Fund for fiscal year
 - 23 2008-09 to fund the community based grant program.
- 2. *Page 3, Lines 82 through 84:*
 - 82 (vi) to support translation of health materials and information; {-and-}

83(vii) to facilitate the person's access to primary care services and providers, including

84 mental health services; and

(viii) to measure and report empirical results of its efforts

to satisfy the requirements of the grant.

3. *Page 5, Lines 138 through 139:*

- the elderly, persons with low incomes, and persons with chronic diseases; {and}
- (iv) meets other criteria determined by the department; and
 - (v) demonstrates the ability to empirically measure and report the results
 of all grant supported activities, including the number of individuals
 who obtain health care coverage;
- 4. Page 5, Line 144:
 - Department of Human Services; and
 - (iii) award the money appropriated for the grants in nine different grants as follows:
 - (i) four grants in the amount of \$50,000 each to be awarded to experienced and established grant applicants; and
 - (ii) five grants in the amount of \$30,000 each to be awarded to grant applicants that:
 - (a) are not as established or experienced as the applicants under Subsection (3)(c)(i); or
 - (b) represent smaller community based approaches than the applicants described in Subsection (3)(c)(i)
- 5. Page 5, Lines 149 through 151:
 - As an ongoing appropriation subject to future budget constraints, there is appropriated
 - from the General Fund for fiscal year 2008-09, \$ { 750,000 } to the Department of Health to fund
 - the community based grant program authorize by Chapter 18, Part 3,

 Access to Health Care.
