Representative Lorie D. Fowlke proposes the following amendments:

- 1. Page 1, Lines 14 through 27:
 - 14 This bill:
 - changes the following parent-time days from even to odd years:
 - July 4;
 - Labor Day; <u>and</u>
 - {Thanksgiving} Fall Break; {-and-
 - second portion of Christmas break;
 - changes the following parent-time days from odd to even years:
 - Memorial Day;
 - July 24; **and**
 - Halloween; {-and
 - first portion of Christmas break;
 - 25 eliminates the following parent-time days:
 - 26 Columbus Day; and
 - Veteran's Day;
- 2. Page 8, Lines 219 through 221:
 - (ii) A step-parent, grandparent, or other responsible adult designated by the
 - 220 <u>noncustodial parent, may pick up the child if the</u> {<u>school</u>} <u>custodial parent</u> <u>is aware of the identity of the</u>
 - individual, and the parent will be with the child by 6 p.m.
- 3. Page 9, Lines 246 through 248:
 - 246 (iii) A step-parent, grandparent, or other responsible individual designated by the
 - 247 <u>noncustodial parent, may pick up the child if the</u> {<u>school</u>} <u>custodial parent</u> <u>is aware of the identity of</u> the

- 6. Page 17, Lines 496 through 512:

(6) In the event finances and distance preclude the exercise of minimum parent-time for the noncustodial parent during the school year, the court should consider awarding more time for the noncustodial parent during the summer time if it is in the best interests of the children.

{-(6)} Upon the motion of any party, the court may order uninterrupted parent-time with the noncustodial parent for a minimum of 30 days during extended parent-time, unless the court finds it is not in the best interests of the child. If the court orders uninterrupted parent-time during a period not covered by this section, it shall specify in its order which parent is responsible for the child's travel expenses.

{(7)} Unless otherwise ordered by the court the relocating party shall be responsible for all the child's travel expenses relating to Subsections [(5)] (4)(a) and (b) and 1/2 of the child's travel expenses relating to Subsection [(5)] (4)(c), provided the noncustodial [party] parent is current on all support obligations. If the noncustodial [party] parent has been found in contempt for not being current on all support obligations, [he] the noncustodial parent shall be responsible for all of the child's travel expenses under Subsection [(5)] (4), unless the court rules otherwise. Reimbursement by either responsible party to the other for the child's travel expenses shall be made within 30 days of receipt of documents detailing those expenses.

 $\{ (8) \}$ The court may apply this provision to any preexisting decree of divorce.

 $\{ \frac{(9)}{} \}$ Any action under this section may be set for an expedited hearing.

 $\{ (10) \}$ (11) A parent who fails to comply with the notice of relocation in Subsection (1) shall

be in contempt of the court's order.
