9	General Description:
10	This bill amends the Health Care Facility Licensing and Inspection Act by providing
11	measures to discourage identity theft and health insurance fraud, and to protect the
12	accuracy of medical records.
13	Highlighted Provisions:
14	This bill:
15	 defines the term, "medical facility";
16	 requires a medical facility to, prior to providing services to a patient, request
17	identification for:
18	• the patient; and
19	• an individual who consents to the provision of services to the patient, if the
20	patient lacks the capacity to consent;
21	 permits a medical facility to use methods to document or confirm a patient's
22	identity;
23	 prohibits a medical facility that is subject to the federal Emergency Medical
24	Treatment and Active Labor Act (EMTALA) from denying services to an individual
25	on the basis that the individual does not provide identification when requested;
26	 prohibits a medical facility that is not subject to EMTALA from denying services to
27	an individual on the sole basis that the individual does not provide identification

29	 provides that a medical facility is not subject to a private right of action for failing
30	to ask for identification; and
31	 prohibits the imposition of penalties if a medical facility does not request
32	documentation.

41	Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:
42	Section 1. Section 26-21-25 is enacted to read:
43	<u>26-21-25.</u> Patient identity protection.
44	(1) As used in this section:
45	(a) "EMTALA" means the federal Emergency Medical Treatment and Active Labor
46	<u>Act.</u>
47	(b) "Medical facility" means:
48	(i) a general acute hospital;
49	(ii) a specialty hospital;
50	(iii) a home health agency:
51	(iv) a hospice;
52	(v) a nursing care facility;
53	(vi) a residential-assisted living facility;
54	(vii) a birthing center;
55	(viii) an ambulatory surgical facility;
56	(ix) a small health care facility;
57	(x) an abortion clinic;
58	(xi) a facility owned or operated by a health maintenance organization;

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59	(xii) an end stage renal disease facility;
60	(xiii) a health care clinic;
61	(xiv) a physician's office;
62	(xv) a dental office; or
63	(xvi) any other health care facility that the committee designates by rule.
64	(2) (a) In order to discourage identity theft and health insurance fraud, and to reduce
65	the risk of medical errors caused by incorrect medical records, a medical facility shall request
66	identification from an individual prior to providing in-patient or out-patient services to the
67	individual.
68	(b) If the individual who will receive services from the medical facility lacks the legal
69	capacity to consent to treatment, the medical facility shall request identification:
70	(i) for the individual who lacks the legal capacity to consent to treatment; and
71	(ii) from the individual who consents to treatment on behalf of the individual described
72	in Subsection (2)(b)(i).
73	(3) A medical facility:
74	(a) if the medical facility is subject to EMTALA, may not refuse services to an
75	individual on the basis that the individual did not provide identification when requested;
76	(b) if the medical facility is not subject to EMTALA, may not refuse services to an
77	individual on the sole basis that the individual did not provide identification when requested;
78	(c) may not be penalized for failing to ask for identification;
79	(d) is not subject to a private right of action for failing to ask for identification;
80	(e) may document or confirm patient identity by:
81	(i) photograph;
82	(ii) fingerprinting:
83	(iii) palm scan; or
84	(iv) other reasonable means; and
85	(f) if the medical facility is subject to EMTALA, shall post a notice in the medical
86	facility's emergency department that informs a patient of the patient's right to treatment for an
87	emergency condition under EMTALA.
