General Description:

This bill adds one juvenile court judge to the fifth judicial district.

- increases the number of juvenile court judges in the fifth judicial district to three.

AMENDS:

78A-1-104, as renumbered and amended by Laws of Utah 2008, Chapter 3

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:

Section 1. Section **78A-1-104** is amended to read:

78A-1-104. Number of juvenile judges and jurisdictions.

The number of juvenile court judges shall be:

- (1) two juvenile judges in the First Juvenile District;
- (2) six juvenile judges in the Second Juvenile District;



- 28 (3) ten juvenile judges in the Third Juvenile District;
- 29 (4) four juvenile judges in the Fourth Juvenile District;
- 30 (5) [~~two~~] three juvenile judges in the Fifth Juvenile District;
- 31 (6) one juvenile judge in the Sixth Juvenile District;
- 32 (7) two juvenile judges in the Seventh Juvenile District; and
- 33 (8) one juvenile judge in the Eighth Juvenile District.

State Impact

Enactment of this bill will add a new Juvenile Court Judge, 2 clerks, and a new attorney. The bill will require \$305,200 in ongoing General Funds for the Courts and \$142,400 for the Attorney General's Office in FY 2010 for a total impact of \$447,200 of ongoing General Funds.
