8 **LONG TITLE**

9 **General Description:**

10 This bill modifies the Utah Agricultural Code to address the activities of the
11 Agricultural Advisory Board.

12 **Highlighted Provisions:**

13 This bill:

- 14 ▶ expands the duties of the Agricultural Advisory Board to encompass issues related
- 15 to acceptable livestock husbandry practices; and
- 16 ▶ makes technical changes.

23 **4-2-7**, as last amended by Laws of Utah 2005, Chapter 175

25 *Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:*

26 Section 1. Section **4-2-7** is amended to read:

27 **4-2-7. Agricultural Advisory Board created -- Composition -- Responsibility --**



28 **Terms of office -- Compensation.**

29 (1) There is created the Agricultural Advisory Board composed of 13 members
30 representing each of the following:

- 31 (a) Utah Farm Bureau Federation;
- 32 (b) Utah Farmers Union;
- 33 (c) Utah Cattlemen's Association;
- 34 (d) Utah Wool Growers' Association;
- 35 (e) Utah Dairymen's Association;
- 36 (f) Utah Pork Producer's Association;
- 37 (g) Utah Veterinary Medical Association;
- 38 (h) Livestock Auction Marketing Association;
- 39 (i) Utah Association of Conservation Districts;
- 40 (j) the Utah horse industry;
- 41 (k) the food processing industry;
- 42 (l) manufacturers of food supplements; and
- 43 (m) a consumer affairs group.

44 (2) The Agricultural Advisory Board shall advise the commissioner regarding:
45 (a) the planning, implementation, and administration of the department's programs[-];

46 and

47 (b) the establishment of policy related to the department assisting a political
48 subdivision on an issue related to acceptable livestock husbandry practices, as part of which the
49 Agricultural Advisory Board may consider:

- 50 (i) the humane care of livestock;
- 51 (ii) food safety;
- 52 (iii) local availability and affordability of food; and
- 53 (iv) best practices for livestock well being in farm management.

54 (3) (a) Except as required by Subsection (3)(c), members are appointed by the
55 commissioner to four-year terms of office.

56 (b) Representatives of the organizations cited in Subsections (1)(a) through (1)(h) shall
57 be appointed to the Agricultural Advisory Board by the commissioner from a list of nominees
58 submitted by each organization.

59 (c) Notwithstanding the requirements of Subsection (3)(a), the commissioner shall, at
60 the time of appointment or reappointment, adjust the length of terms to ensure that the terms of
61 board members are staggered so that approximately half of the board is appointed every two
62 years.

63 (d) Members may be removed at the discretion of the commissioner upon the request
64 of the group they represent.

65 (e) When a vacancy occurs in the membership for any reason, the replacement shall be
66 appointed for the unexpired term.

67 (4) The board shall elect one member to serve as chair of the Agricultural Advisory
68 Board for a term of one year.

69 (5) (a) The board shall meet four times annually, but may meet more often at the
70 discretion of the chair.

71 (b) Attendance of seven members at a duly called meeting constitutes a quorum for the
72 transaction of official business.

73 (6) (a) Members shall receive no compensation or benefits for their services, but may
74 receive per diem and expenses incurred in the performance of the member's official duties at
75 the rates established by the Division of Finance under Sections 63A-3-106 and 63A-3-107.

76 (b) Members may decline to receive per diem and expenses for their service.
