28	Section 1. Section <b>53A-1-410</b> is enacted to read:
29	53A-1-410. Vending machine contents.
30	(1) The board shall adopt rules establishing standards for beverage and non-beverage
31	contents in a vending machine accessible to students at elementary and secondary schools.

33	(a) shall provide that a local school board shall adopt a vending machine policy
34	establishing standards for the beverage and non-beverage contents in a vending machine

51	(4) For a secondary school, the beverage contents of a vending machine accessible to
52	secondary students shall be limited to the following beverages:
53	(a) bottled water;
54	(b) a beverage containing no calories;
55	(c) a beverage containing no more than 10 calories per eight ounces; or
56	(d) no more than a 12 ounce serving of:

57	(i) fat-free or low-fat regular or flavored milk containing no more than 150 calories per
58	eight ounces;
59	(ii) a nutritionally equivalent milk alternative, as defined by the United States
60	Department of Agriculture in 7 C.F.R. Sec. 246.10, containing no more than 150 calories per
61	eight ounces;
62	(iii) 100% juice containing:
63	(A) no added sweeteners;
64	(B) no more than 120 calories per eight ounces; and
65	(C) at least 10% of the recommended daily value for three or more vitamins and
66	minerals; or
67	(iv) any other drink containing no more than 66 calories per eight ounces.
68	(5) For a vending machine accessible to secondary students, at least 50% of non-milk
69	beverages shall be:
70	(a) water;
71	(b) no-calorie; or
72	(c) low-calorie containing no more than 66 calories per eight ounces.
73	(6) The non-beverage contents of a vending machine accessible to students in a public
74	school shall include only a non-beverage item that contains:
75	(a) no more than:
76	(i) 150 total calories in the entire item for an item available in a vending machine
77	accessible to an elementary school student;
78	(ii) 180 total calories in the entire item for an item available in a vending machine

87	(7) Subsections (6)(b) and (c) do not apply to the following non-beverage items;

88	<u>(a) nuts;</u>
89	(b) nut butters;
90	(c) seeds; or
91	(d) trail mix with no added sugar, containing only fruit, nuts, or seeds.
92	(8) The board shall provide to a local school board the following information:
93	(a) nutritional information, guidelines, or standards from governmental or other
94	published sources for suggested vending machine contents appropriate for elementary and
95	secondary students;
96	(b) research studies regarding childhood obesity and foods of minimal nutritional
97	value; and
98	(c) any other health-related research or studies the board deems relevant.
99	(9) A local school board may adopt a vending machine policy that establishes standards
100	for beverage and non-beverage contents in a vending machine that are different than those
101	established by the board.
102	(10) If a local school board adopts a vending machine policy described in Subsection
103	(9), the local school board shall:
104	(a) consider the information described in Subsection (8) before adopting the policy;
