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#### **LONG TITLE**

#### **General Description:**

This bill amends the Pharmacy Practice Act.

## **Highlighted Provisions:**

This bill:

- amends provisions related to exemptions from licensure;
- ► defines <del>{cosmetic drug}terms</del>;
- exempts prescribing practitioners from licensure under the Pharmacy Practice Act
  when a practitioner dispenses a cosmetic drug or an injectable weight loss drug to
  the practitioner's patient; and
- requires certain drug labeling and record keeping standards for the dispensing practitioner.

**58-17b-309**, as last amended by Laws of Utah 2005, Chapter 71

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:

Section 1. Section **58-17b-309** is amended to read:

58-17b-309. Exemptions from licensure.

- (1) For purposes of this section {, cosmetic}:
- (a) "Cosmetic drug":
- ({a}i) means a prescription drug that is for the purpose of promoting attractiveness or altering the appearance of an individual; and
  - (<del>{b}ii</del>) does not include a prescription drug that is:
  - (<del>{i}</del>A) a controlled substance;
  - (<del>{ii}</del>B) compounded by the prescribing practitioner; or
- ({iii}C) medically necessary to promote the proper function of the body or prevent or treat physical illness or disease.
  - (b) "Injectable weight loss drug":
  - (i) means an injectable prescription drug prescribed to promote weight loss; and
  - (ii) does not include a prescription drug that is a controlled substance.
- [(1)] (2) In addition to the exemptions from licensure in Section 58-1-307, the following individuals may engage in the acts or practices described in this Subsection [(1)] (2) without being licensed under this chapter:
- (a) a person selling or providing contact lenses in accordance with Section 58-16a-801; [and]
- (b) an individual engaging in the practice of pharmacy technician under the direct personal supervision of a pharmacist while making satisfactory progress in an approved program as defined in division rule[:]; and
- (c) a practitioner who prescribes and dispenses a cosmetic drug or an injectable weight loss drug to the practitioner's patient in accordance with Subsection (4).
- [(2)] (3) In accordance with Subsection 58-1-303[(1)] (2)(a), an individual exempt under Subsection [(1)] (2)(b) must take all examinations as required by division rule following

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completion of an approved curriculum of education, within the required time frame. This exemption expires immediately upon notification of a failing score of an examination, and the individual may not continue working as a pharmacy technician even under direct supervision.

- (4) A practitioner is exempt from licensing under the provisions of Subsection (2)(c) if the practitioner:
  - (a) (i) writes a prescription for a cosmetic drug or an injectable weight loss drug; and
- (ii) informs the patient that the prescription may be filled at a pharmacy or dispensed in the practitioner's office;
  - (b) dispenses a cosmetic drug or injectable weight loss drug:
  - (i) only to the practitioner's patients; and
  - (ii) in a package labeled with:
  - (A) the practitioner's name, address, and telephone number;
  - (B) the date the drug is dispensed;
  - (C) the patient's name;
  - (D) the name and strength of the drug; and
  - (E) directions for the drug's use, and any cautionary statements;
  - (c) enters into the patient's medical record:
  - (i) the name and strength of the drug dispensed; and
  - (ii) the date the drug was dispensed; { and }
- (d) keeps the cosmetic drug or injectable weight loss drug in a locked cabinet or room, controls access to the cabinet or room, and maintains an ongoing inventory of the cabinet's or room's contents.
