3	Be it resolved by the Legislature of the state of Utah, the Governor concurring therein:
4	WHEREAS, the effects of father-absent households have contributed to poverty,
5	maternal and child health risks, incarceration, crime, teenage pregnancy, child abuse, drug and
6	alcohol abuse, lack of education, and childhood obesity;
7	WHEREAS, father-absent households create a substantial drain on societal and

29	WHEREAS, in Utah, many organizations have not been educated on the significant role
30	fathers play in resolving social issues in communities throughout the state;
31	WHEREAS, many fathers have not grasped how they, as role models, impact their
32	children;
33	WHEREAS, to the extent fathers struggle to accept and fulfill their responsibilities to
34	family members, communities in the state are at risk;
35	WHEREAS, a study conducted by the National Fatherhood Initiative reports that the
36	federal government spends \$100 billion every year to support father-absent households;
37	WHEREAS, the actual amount may be higher because the study did not measure the
38	impact of related costs like the criminal justice system, which is overwhelmed by men who
39	grew up in father-absent households;
40	WHEREAS, any serious effort to address poverty, child abuse, crime and recidivism,
41	drug abuse, teen pregnancy, or lack of education must make restoring fatherhood an integral
42	part of the solution;
43	WHEREAS, a father-absent household is not a single issue, and its social and economic
44	consequences are felt across society;
45	WHEREAS, 25 million men, or one out of three, grow up in homes where their
46	biological father does not reside;
47	WHEREAS, these children are significantly more likely to live in poverty, drop out of
48	school, and engage in risky behaviors; and
49	WHEREAS, government agencies and nonprofit organizations should understand the
50	dynamics of fatherhood programs like other social services programs to most effectively
51	address the impact father-absent households have on families and communities:
52	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislature of the state of Utah, the
53	Governor concurring therein, urge government agencies and nonprofit organizations to study
54	and more fully understand the dynamics of fatherhood programs that can address the
55	consequences of father-absent households, including poverty, child abuse, teen pregnancy, lack
56	of education, and domestic and community violence.
