2010 General Session Fifty–Eighth Legislature

The Fifty–Eighth Legislature concluded its 2010 session on March 11... before midnight. The session was marked by a great deal of cooperation and bipartisanship, particularly on key issues such as ethics reform and the budget. This enabled us to achieve excellent results despite continuing challenges resulting from the economic downturn that began in 2008.

The legislature continued its practice of sensible financial management by closing an anticipated \$850 million shortfall with a combination of budget cuts, one-time reserves, and modest revenue increases. Because public education continues to be a high priority, the education budget was kept largely intact. While some

budget cuts were necessary, the base amount the state spends per student will remain the same. Other spending priorities included higher education, public safety, and health and human services.

We created a powerful new ethics policy for the legislature and other elected officials. These changes define standards, create new rules, and provide more openness to enable Utah's citizens to have continued confidence in their elected officials. Additionally, a resolution was passed that proposes to amend the Utah Constitution to establish a legislative ethics commission and define its authority. This proposal will be submitted to the voters in November of this year and, if approved, will take effect on January 1, 2011.

Issues before us, which we are continuing to pursue, include those mentioned above as well as energy development and reasonable environmental protection, while working to stimulate business and the economy. We are also exploring avenues to retain and reinforce our state's rights and obligations while working with the Federal government on issues of joint concern.

We express our heart-felt appreciation to Greg Bell (R–Davis County), Sheldon Killpack (R–Davis County), and Scott McCoy (D–Salt Lake County) who resigned their senate seats during the 2009 interim. Appointed to replace them were Stuart Adams (R–Davis), Jay Stevenson (R–Davis), and Ben McAdams (D–Salt Lake). These individuals came ready to work and proved themselves capable of handling their legislative responsibilities. I personally admire and deeply appreciate all my senate colleagues who so willingly and ably serve their constituents.

Last year I encouraged everyone to work hard throughout the year to "measure up." This year we have measured up. Utah recently received national recognition as the best-managed state in the union. Deer Valley Ski Resort is the #1 resort in North America. REAL Salt Lake won the 2009 Major League Soccer Cup. Utah has the second lowest drug and alcohol fatality rate in the nation, and Trooper Lisa Steed of the Utah Highway Patrol is the #1 DUI enforcement officer in Utah and possibly in the United States. During the legislative session we paid tribute to these and many other Utahns who have demonstrated a commitment to excellence.

Although this session was challenging, I feel we worked unitedly to make the tough decisions; and in so doing, we solved problems before they became a crisis.



WELCOMING REMARKS BY PRESIDENT WADDOUPS

As we begin this 58th session of the Legislature, I prepared a few comments that I would like to share with you about the direction we're going. Recently I was at a convention of senate presidents from around the country, and while I was there, Anna Kay and I had the opportunity to walk on the beach for a few minutes and pick up a few sea shells, and we brought some of those. We have on the screen, some of the sea shells that we were able to collect while we were there. Anna Kay has brought some for you to see if you'd like, and we'll hold those up. As you see them, they are all jumbled together - they are sea shells. You've seen them like that on the beaches as you wander through, and they're just sea shells. As we collected them and then divided them up and made them more individualized, they become more distinct as you see them individualized and all separate. You can see that they take a more defined personality. We have the starfish, that is certainly individualized; we have large ones, we have small ones. We have a variety of them, and yet they are still a group of sea shells. As you get more tuned in, you'll see that some of them are alike and yet the one on the right in this picture has picked up some riders to go along with - barnacles if you will; it picked up a few things. The one on the left is a more individual, clean shell. You also see that some are more rough than others. This one has little points on it, and it's different from the others. We have a smooth one – I like to see the smooth one. Some are smooth. We'll show you the two that are big that look very similar. As you look at them, they are pretty, they're attractive, and yet as you turn them over, you'll see that there's a real difference in them. One is very thin, one is very strong and solid – it has a real body to it.

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I think we could use these sea shells as a representation maybe of our body. We're all different, and yet we're all sea shells. We're all here serving a purpose, and we're all in this together now. We're going to be doing a work for the next 45 days that will set the direction for our state – the budget, the laws. And so, even though we're different and we have different roles, we're similar and we have similar roles also. As I compared us to those seashells, I was particularly impressed with the one that was very solid. It was perhaps the least attractive of any of the sea shells that we picked up, and yet it was impressive in that it was solid, it's heavy, it's able to do a job and withstand the pressures that are put on it.

As we walked on the beach, people would step on some of them and they would break immediately, except this big strong one. No one ever broke that by stepping on it. It would sink into the sand; it'd bounce back and be resilient. It performed its function while it was alive, and became a very nice collectable to bring home. So I'm hoping that we will all be strong like that sea shell, that we will all perform our functions and have value even after we're gone from here.

I heard a story recently that is indicative of the work that some of our finest do for us. It was about helicopter pilots and the work that they do. When a helicopter pilot is ready to take off for a flight, the first thing they do is check over their equipment, and inside of the helicopter on each one of the things that needs to be checked hangs a ribbon. This ribbon hangs on several switches within the helicopter, and they have to go in and check each one of the components of the helicopter before they take off and then they remove this; it says right on it, "remove pin before flight." They remove the pin, and they say, "Okay we have checked that component of our helicopter, we're ready now for flight." and then they go through every one of them.

I talked with the Colonel at the National Guard, and he tells me the book of flight procedures is that thick. I didn't think I wanted to read the book, but I thought this would be a good visual aid to show you of some of the work that goes forward in preparation.

Now, as we begin this session, many of us have been doing a lot of preparation. We've prepared bills, we've worked with staff. We have staff that have put in hours of work getting ready for us to be here. We are now checked out. We've all taken the oath of office, and we are now prepared to do the work of the citizens of the State of Utah. It's a time for the rhetoric to end, it's a time for us to soar, for us to do our work. We need to buckle in, hook in our seatbelts and be realistic, but do the work of the state. What is our core mission? What services must we provide? At what level will we provide them, and what services that we are currently providing are desirable and absolutely necessary? These are things we must evaluate.

This year we will deal with a lot of issues. We'll deal with the budget; money will be a high point of our session as we deal and struggle to balance our budget. We'll deal with taxes. Do some of them need to be changed, modified? Will some of them be raised? Will any of them be decreased? We've receive a lot of publicity from the efforts that our committees have done on ethics, and we will deal with ethics this year. We will have ethics legislation that will help create a better atmosphere of trust amongst the citizens.

One of the first bills that we will be dealing with this year will be a resolution that will go before the people dealing with a constitutional amendment on ethics reform, setting up a citizens' ethics committee. I think that will be an important message that we will send saying that we want to do your work, and we want to do your work in an ethical manner. Education will be a high point in this session; we will deal with public education. Last year - I just point out - in '09 we had a higher percentage of our budget going to public education than any year in the last decade. I didn't go back father than that, but almost 49 percent, 48 plus percent of the budget was spent on public education. We'll also deal with higher education; such things as USTAR, our various colleges around the state from our flagship, the University of Utah, to community colleges such as Salt Lake Community College and Snow College. We will deal with environmental issues. We'll deal with green energy, items such as solar energy and wind, geothermal. We'll have to perhaps deal with federal government mandates dealing with items such as cap and trade. We'll try and develop our natural resources, and items such as oil, natural gas, coal. We'll have to deal with our economy; how that will affect our citizens.

I was interested to read in September a quote by Jeff Thredgold when he said the recession is over, we will now start dealing with how to bring the economy back. Hopefully we will work towards bringing us back to a level where we were before that recession set in. Retirement will be a big issue. We have bills that will deal with retirement. We'll need to be actuarially sound. We won't deal with our retirement the way the federal government has dealt with social security; we will fund our system. We'll deal with transportation. The good news is, as we've been dealing with the budget for transportation that we sent out last year, the Transportation Department was able to send the dollars farther down the road. We're getting a longer rebuild of I–15 in Utah County. The Mountain View Corridor is going further than we expected it to with the funding that we put into it.

We will prepare for elections this fall. Many of you will be up for election. We will be competing with ideas and for the public approval. I would adjure us that we all use civility; that while we are here we will attack ideas; we will attack the programs that are out there, but we will not attack one another. We will not attack people, only ideas. We will do the people's work. We will be less partisan than what we see in Washington, D.C. We will work together.

I'd remind us all how we got here and why we were here. We were elected by the citizens of the State of Utah. We are here to do their work. We're to represent businesses, we're to represent our employers, we're to represent the citizens, and most importantly, we're here to represent our families, the people who are supporting us.

I'd like to express appreciation to my wife, Anna Kay, who has worried about this day more than I have in getting it all ready; making sure that the sea shells were all gathered up, making sure that I had notes for my speech; making sure that all the t's were crossed and the i's were dotted; making sure that I was working on the committees and the seat arrangements. She's been a great support to me and never let me lose track of where I'm going. Thank you.

Last year you will recall my theme was that we would "measure up," and we did the little rulers to encourage everyone to measure up. This year I think we've done that. I think we're Number One. Utah has been recognized as the Number One State in the Union. I've asked the pages if they would help us distribute a little reminder of being number one this year. I'd like all of the senators to have one, all of the staff to have one. It has the number 1 right on it. It is a little key chain that says, "Utah State Senate" on it, and it has our seal. On there, as we recognize people this year that are number one, we will try and hand out a little reminder that you can hook on the key chain to keep them all together or you can attach the key chain to your own keys, whatever works out best for you. But I think it's important that as we go forward in the positive mode now, that we talk about things that are number one, that we remember that these are real people and real programs that are impacted. So I would like to first recognize the first Number One of the year. Seeing as how we had the opportunity to have with us today the Number One National Guard Soldier of the Year, Sgt. Guy Mellor, I asked him if he would stay. They promised not to dock his pay if he stayed. Sgt. Mellor, I recognize you as the Number One National Guardsman in the United States of America.

I would encourage you, during the year, to find people that you can recognize as Number One. I asked the Colonel about Sgt. Mellor's background; how he got to be Number One National Guardsman in the United States. He competed for it; he trained; he worked physically; he worked mentally; he's in shape; he knows how to obey orders, and he knows how to lead. I think we will find that there are many Utahns that are Number One this year, and we'll have this opportunity again. Sgt., thank you for representing our state and for the service you render to our country. We're proud of you, thank you. With that, I'd like to deal with the work at hand. We can all write an elegant mission statement; we could do lots of things that are eloquent, but it is time now for us to get to work and to actually accomplish our mission. Thank you.

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On motion of Senator Niederhauser, the Senate voted to have President Waddoups' remarks spread upon the pages of the Senate Journal.

JOINT CONVENTION

The Joint Convention was called to order by President Michael Waddoups at 2:30 p.m.

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

On motion of Senator Jenkins, the Legislature resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole, with the President as Chairman, for the purpose of hearing from Chief Justice Christine Durham, Supreme Court.

REMARKS BY CHIEF JUSTICE CHRISTINE M. DURHAM

President Waddoups, Speaker Clark, and colleagues from the legislative branch of state government, let me begin by expressing my sincere appreciation for the invitation to address you on the state of Utah's judicial branch. I am pleased to be joined here today by my colleagues from the Supreme Court and from the Utah Judicial Council, the constitutional governing body for the judiciary.

As I have prepared to speak to you today, I have struggled to find language that would accurately describe the "state of the judiciary" - the condition in which we find ourselves at the beginning of 2010. The single word that seems most apt to me is "challenged." Like stress, challenge is very much a part of life. Social science research tells us that stress is, in and of itself, neither necessarily positive or negative; it can threaten well-being and normal functioning when it is overwhelming, but it is also responsible for motivating change and growth. Challenge works the same way for institutions. Significant challenge can put important things at risk, but it can also be a predicate for re-examining and re-evaluating priorities and established ways of doing things. In reporting to you this year on the state of the judiciary, then, I would like to acquaint you with the nature of our challenges and the steps we have taken and are taking to deal with them. Because of our constitutional role in government, our basic priorities do not change. We must protect access to justice and fairness in the courts while dealing with budget realities. Last year I quoted a colleague who described state courts as "the emergency room for society." As the impact of the recession is felt at every level, it is important to remember the human dimensions of access and fairness. Decreases in court services necessitated by shortfalls must inevitably increase backlogs in civil, criminal, juvenile and family cases. The resulting delays may threaten the basic constitutional rights of criminal defendants and civil litigants. They may prevent or delay the necessary adjustments of commercial interests, keep persons abused by domestic partners from prompt court protection, prevent disabled elderly people from receiving state-related benefits, result in delays in the protection of abused and neglected children, and hinder the timely disposition of criminal charges.

At the same time, there are a myriad of ways in which the courts can increase efficiency and effectiveness in times of challenge. Necessity, they say, is the mother of invention, and I am extremely proud of the way in which Utah's Judicial One example illustrates the way in which ideas born of necessity can result in better ways of doing things. During 2009 we moved to nearly exclusive reliance in our trial courts on digital recording for preservation of the court record. The immediate motivation lay in the significant cost savings that we achieved, which helped us deal with the cuts we were asked to take in our ongoing budget last year, and we were quite comfortable with the technology we had been phasing in over several years. We planned carefully for the transition, and as of July 1st we shifted entirely to an electronic method of preserving the record in court. Now, six months later, we are extremely gratified to report that these changes not only saved money but also resulted in greatly reduced transcript preparation times. Whereas the average time to prepare a trial transcript before the shift was 138 days, it now averages 16. This means that parties who used to wait almost five months for a written transcript of their court proceeding now have it in hand in just over two weeks. Litigants and the courts are much better served by this new process – one that grew out of budget necessity.

On another front, we have also accelerated our electronic access plans, moving as quickly as we can to implement statewide e-filing and electronic payment of fees and fines, all of which decreases the volume of work for our clerical staff. A little over a year ago, we also undertook a very significant restructuring of our entire clerical workforce, realigning responsibilities and moving to a team-based approach with significant cross-training. Again, we have seen more efficiency and better service as a result. This is particularly notable because our clerical staff is significantly smaller than it was 18 months ago, while our case filings have increased dramatically. Parenthetically, I also note that, consistent with our "e-everything" approach, this State of the Judiciary address, traditionally printed and distributed to you, is instead available on our website: www.utcourts.gov.

Our emphasis on electronic solutions to create both cost savings and better public service is attracting national attention. The National Center for State Courts just completed a series of studies of current best practices in electronic court innovation. Let me just read the titles of the four studies: "Study of Electronic Payments in Missouri, Colorado, Utah and Iowa;" "Study of E–Filing in Colorado and Utah;" "Study of E–Citations in Missouri, Iowa and Utah;" and "Study of E–Juror in Iowa and Utah." Not only are we on the cutting edge in the use these technologies, but also, unlike the other states in these studies, the Utah courts have in every instance developed and implemented them entirely in–house with existing resources. Another area in which innovation has permitted better service is support for self–represented litigants, whose needs always increase in SENATE JOURNAL

difficult economic times. Two years ago, we began a pilot program with a dedicated telephone help–line in two of our judicial districts. These lines are staffed by an able attorney who provides specific and practical procedural assistance to civil litigants navigating the complexity of the legal system. The users of this service have given it rave reviews and, by identifying grant funding, we have been able this year to expand it to two additional rural districts, so that geographically more than half the state now has access. It may be a reflection of the huge impact of these difficult financial times that more than 2,000 people have used this service in the last year.

One of the areas in which self-represented litigants using the help-lines frequently ask questions involves probate matters. A comprehensive study undertaken by the Judicial Council a year ago underscored the need for changes in the way guardianships and conservatorships are managed in the courts. Protection of the legal rights of people with disabilities, including the elderly, is a core responsibility of any humane government, and the Council brought together members of the bar, the provider community, and social services to look for ways to protect this at–risk population. The proposals resulting from that work will be brought before you during this session. Because some of the changes may require new resources, we understand that you might not be able to address them all this year, but we hope and expect that our work has resulted in a plan for protecting these most vulnerable citizens that can be implemented, perhaps over time.

As my comments about the potential need to postpone important reforms suggest, we do clearly understand the scarcity of public resources at this time. Therefore, like other entities in state government, we have tried to be responsible in seeking budget savings. To that end, we instituted first an employee hiring slowdown and then a complete freeze. At the same time, after consultation with the Governor, as the appointing authority, and with the President of the Senate, which body confirms judicial appointments, we delayed the filling of all judicial vacancies in 2009. These actions generated budget savings, but they also, of course, increased the workload of our existing judges and employees. I would like to note in particular how much I appreciate the willingness of our judges to step up to cover the increased workload created by those nine extended vacancies. I also want to be clear in saying – we need more judges. Our objective measures, including our judicial weighted caseload data tells us that, and that conclusion is confirmed by our hard working judges and staff every day.

We also realize that you are currently unable to respond to this need – and many others – in the current economic climate, so we are bringing you no new resource requests this session. Instead, we have looked for ways to use existing resources, including judges, more effectively. Several years ago, after Salt Lake City established its own Justice Court, removing tens of thousands of cases from the state docket, we recommended and you decided to move two judicial positions from the District Court in Salt Lake, which had then become over–staffed, to two districts elsewhere in the state, one juvenile and one district, where the need was greater. We now have a similar situation in the Second District (Weber, Davis and Morgan counties), where the creation of the Ogden Justice Court three years ago has resulted in a significant shift of cases out of the Second District Court, leaving its fourteen judges with only thirteen judges' worth of work.

During this same period of time, we have also been struggling with a significant understaffing problem in the Fifth District Juvenile Court (covering Washington, Iron and Beaver counties), where only two judges have been managing a burgeoning caseload resulting from dramatic population growth. While the Council has known for several years that a new judge in that district was a priority, we have been unable to address it - first, because the former courthouse in St. George would not accommodate a third judge and then, after the recession hit, because funding was simply not available. Now, with the forthcoming retirement of Second District Judge Jon Memmott in May, the Council has seen an opportunity to equalize the caseload burden in both districts by asking you to consider moving a judgeship from an overstaffed part of the state to an understaffed one. The decision to make this request to you has not been an easy one for the Council, but we see it as our responsibility to identify for you a way to put scarce judicial resources to the most effective use. Realistically, we do not anticipate that you will be able to provide us with the new judges we need for some time yet, and therefore placing our existing judicial positions where they are most needed was, in the end, a compelling argument for the Council. You of course will decide the policy questions that may attend such a shift.

I have highlighted some of the work the judicial branch is doing to fulfill our obligations to use strained public resources wisely and effectively. As I am sure you know, nearly every state in the country has been dealing with economic challenges, and Utah often receives positive attention for our good management. The judicial branch is no exception, and we have been asked on numerous occasions over the past years to consult with other state judiciaries on the work we have been doing to re–structure and re–engineer the work of our courts; I am proud not only of the sacrifice and commitment of our staff and our judges, but also of the recognition of our effectiveness by our peers around the country. We are, in the face of serious challenges, doing good work.

Continuing in the spirit of reporting on our challenged condition, I want to assure you that the Judicial Council has already begun planning for anticipated additional cuts in this fiscal year. It would be misleading to suggest that there's any "low hanging fruit" left; we have already eliminated 65 positions, which represents 6 percent of our workforce, implemented another hiring freeze, SENATE JOURNAL

undertaken significant re–organization of our clerical staff, accelerated technology solutions, and delayed filling judicial vacancies, as described earlier. At a three percent of COLA reduction level, we believe that we can avoid further personnel actions this year. At a level above that, we will not be able to absorb the loss except through furloughs, and the Judicial Council and our presiding judges throughout the state are currently assessing how those could be accomplished in an orderly fashion. Given the personnel–dependent nature of our work, and given that our case filings remain 15 percent higher than their 2008 levels, there is no question that further personnel actions would have an impact on delay and case backlogs, and consequently on people's lives and on the commercial sector.

I have focused so far on the immediate challenges in the courts. I think I would be remiss in not sounding some larger themes within the context of challenges to access to justice. The Judicial Council has undertaken over the last year and a half an extensive exploration of the adequacy of appellate representation in criminal cases in our state. That work has been undertaken by a broad–based task force with representation from the legislature, state and local government, the bar, law enforcement and the judiciary, which will be producing analysis and recommendations for reform in the coming year. At the same time. we are increasingly aware of systemic problems affecting indigent criminal defense at all levels, access to civil justice by the poor, and adequate interpreter services to provide language access to the courts. A number of recent studies have examined these questions on a national and state–by–state level, and it is clear that we in Utah will need to address them sooner rather than later. We hope to be responsible and pro–active in efforts to ensure that our citizens can trust and rely on their courts for civil and criminal justice under the rule of law.

As I conclude these remarks, I express to you my regret that for the second time in my tenure as chief justice I have had to focus relatively more on budget–related actions than on discussion of the innovations we have made and the services we provide every day to Utah citizens. In particular I would like to have dwelt more on describing the sacrifices and dedication of our hardworking court staff in every courthouse throughout this state. But these are extraordinarily difficult times, and I believed it imperative to share with you the steps we are taking to make it through them. I remain confident, however, that we will emerge from the challenges (soon, I hope) with a better, more streamlined, more efficient and more effective judicial system.

We in the judiciary understand that the economic challenges we face are being felt across all of state government; we acknowledge the daunting nature of your task in this session, and we stand prepared to do our part. We also, like you, are obligated to fulfill our constitutional role – to ensure access to justice – and we hope that you will be able to support us in that obligation. We greatly appreciated the collaborative problem-solving process we experienced in last year's legislative session, and look forward to continuing the work in the next few months.

Let me leave you with the favorite farewell of my husband's grandfather from Parowan. His life, like many of his generation, included many difficult times and some heart–breaking challenges. He never failed, however, as you left his presence, to enjoin you to "Keep on keeping on." Good advice for all of us.

JOINT CONVENTION

President Michael Waddoups called the Joint Convention to order at 6:30 p.m. in the Chamber of the Utah House of Representatives and recognized David Clark, Speaker of the House.

President Waddoups announced that a quorum of the House of Representatives and the Senate was present.

President Waddoups appointed a Joint Committee comprised of Senators Scott Jenkins, Wayne Niederhauser and Patricia Jones, and Representatives Kevin Garn, Brad Dee, and David Litvack to notify Governor Gary R. Herbert that the 2010 General Session of the Fifty–Eighth Legislature is in Joint Convention and ready to hear his State–of–the–State address.

President Waddoups acknowledged special guests and elected and appointed officials in attendance at the Joint Convention.

Senator Scott Jenkins made a motion that the Legislature resolve into a Joint Convention and Committee of the Whole for the purpose of hearing Governor Herbert's State–of–the–State address.

The Joint Committee escorted Governor Herbert to the House rostrum.

STATE-OF-THE-STATE ADDRESS BY GOVERNOR GARY R. HERBERT

Lt. Governor Bell; President Waddoups; Speaker Clark; Members of the Utah Legislature and of my Cabinet; Utah's Supreme Court justices; the State's First Lady, my wife Jeanette; my children, my mother and my fellow Utahns; I am humbled and honored to stand before you tonight as Utah's 17th Governor to offer this annual report to our great State.

Tonight, I first pay tribute to the many Utahns who have answered the nation's call to serve. Whether it's as a soldier in Afghanistan, a Utah National Guardsman in Iraq, a humanitarian volunteer in Haiti or Ambassador Jon and Mary Kaye Huntsman in the People's Republic of China, we give them all our heartfelt thanks.

I also recognize those who put their lives on the line every day to protect ours. We suffered a great loss when Millard County Sheriff's Deputy Josie Greathouse Fox of Delta lost her life in the line of duty. Her family is here with us tonight. Please join with me as we remember a life of service and pay tribute to our entire law enforcement community, whose sacrifice helps to keep us free and to keep us safe. In my inaugural address, I spoke about the importance of, and the need for, unprecedented partnerships. This will be a continuing theme for my administration. Our success will be measured by the way we unite stakeholders from across the state, and from across the aisle. We must join together to combat the challenges we face and to seize the opportunities ahead.

Over the past four months, we have formed several such partnerships. Let me highlight two of them.

First, we created the Advisory Commission to Optimize State Government. The goal of this group is to help the state do more with less in order to benefit all. It is headed by former Governor Norm Bangerter. This diverse and bipartisan group of civic and business leaders is taking an inside–out look at all areas of the state. Their efforts will improve our already well–managed state, and, now more than ever, we must achieve new levels of efficiency in state government.

Seated next to Governor Bangerter in the gallery tonight is former Salt Lake City Mayor Ted Wilson. He is leading my Balanced Resource Council. I have charged this group with building consensus on important issues, such as public lands, water, conservation and resource development.

These are matters that have become so polarized that progress has become all but impossible. This unprecedented partnership will provide a much-needed new "state of mind" on environmental issues.

This new mindset was recently successfully demonstrated by conservation groups, the Bureau of Land Management, Indian tribes, local governments and oil drilling companies. These groups came together to protect priceless Indian rock art in Nine Mile Canyon, while still allowing for responsible development of Utah's natural gas resources. This is a prime example of how partnership, combined with leadership, can achieve measurable results for our state.

Unprecedented partnerships are essential because we are facing unprecedented challenges. Although we continue to undergo tough economic times, our state – at its core – is strong. The economic tide is turning. We are poised for progress, and are, in fact, well ahead of most other states in the nation.

For the first time in three years, we are expecting an increase in revenue for the upcoming fiscal year. Housing is beginning to stabilize, the state's labor market is resilient and our unemployment rate remains below the national average. I know this is of small consolation to those who are out of work, but we will continue to make sound policy decisions to move this state – and your families – back to solid economic ground and toward a more hopeful future.

We are already taking the steps necessary to keep us in control of our own recovery. At my direction, state agencies have implemented plans to overcome projected budget shortfalls for the current fiscal year. Cabinet leaders are carefully managing reduced budgets while maintaining vital services for Utahns. We are exercising fiscal restraint at all levels, in all branches of government.

We recognize the tough times are not entirely behind us. Indeed, our future success is, in large part, tied to how we respond to these difficulties over the remaining days of this legislative session.

Past sessions may be best remembered for the creation of a university or the implementation of a new program. I think, in these challenging economic times, the 2010 session will primarily be remembered for the adoption of a balanced and responsible state budget.

How we accomplish this in a way that provides adequate funding for education, human services, public health and safety, transportation and other critically important programs will be as challenging as any task faced by a Legislature or Governor in generations.

Tonight, I ask you to join me in this unprecedented partnership. Because, by working together, we can, we must and we will succeed!

First and foremost, we must protect public and higher education.

Utah has long been committed to funding our public schools, our colleges and universities, and our technical institutions. In fact, few states in the country spend as much of their overall budgets on education as we do. Our unique demographics – which is a way of saying we have larger families – mean we must continue to increase funding to maintain and enhance the solid education and training our students receive.

In spite of our difficult budget situation, I call upon you, our great legislators, to maintain our current level of commitment to education!

Secondly, we must balance our budget responsibly, and in a way that does not stifle an economy that is finally beginning to show signs of recovery. We need to support our hard–working citizens and businesses, not stifle them with new tax burdens. We need to help them succeed, not hamper their success. And we need to think toward the future, not just of today.

We can accomplish this, and the budget I have submitted to you offers a framework of how it can be done. At this point in time, I strongly believe the best thing we can do for our State, our citizens, and our economic recovery is to exercise continued fiscal restraint and to not raise taxes!

There are many positive things happening throughout the state. Utah continues to be one of the best states for business.

Whether it's a small, family–owned company like PZ Printing in Carbon County, a cutting edge medical device manufacturer like Edwards Life Sciences, or an international company like Proctor and Gamble in Box Elder County, businesses have confidence in Utah as a safe and dynamic place to grow and invest. A key area of emphasis for my administration is growing business from within. I am pleased the majority of our economic development efforts over the past two years have been centered on protecting and expanding Utah businesses.

Just last month, MediConnect Global, a homegrown medical record management firm, announced it would expand its operations in Sanpete County. This expansion will add more than 300 full-time positions in Ephraim over the next several years. This is but one example of what is happening right now in Utah.

A healthy economy is critical to Utah's unparalleled quality of life. But another factor that makes living in the Beehive State so rewarding is our access to some of the best health care in the nation. Our medical professionals and hospitals are widely recognized as among the best in the country. We understand public access to these services is critical.

Rather than simply talk – or, more accurately, sometimes fight – about health care reform, Utah has stepped forward with solutions. Thanks to the efforts of medical professionals, citizens, members of the executive branch and Lt. Governor Greg Bell, and legislative leaders like Speaker Dave Clark, the Utah Health Exchange is now open for business.

This Utah–crafted solution is an innovative approach to increase transparency in the health care system, to increase access and to increase choice. Already, hundreds of Utahns have coverage in plans they have chosen for themselves. This is a revolutionary approach to health benefits that will soon be available to even more Utahns.

Our Exchange is one example of how states can – and should – lead the nation on health care reform. We don't want or need a one–size–fits–all program that will balloon our national deficit and provide questionable care to our citizens.

Several weeks ago, I traveled to Washington D.C. and met with top leaders in Congress and at the White House. I strongly emphasized that the federal government should not do what state governments are already doing well in areas such as health care. The continued encroachment of the federal government into our businesses, our lives and our pocketbooks must be challenged.

The voices of fiscal restraint and responsibility on critical issues like healthcare cannot be ignored. We simply can't spend what we don't have, and the tax-and-spend mindset that is so prevalent in Washington is not acceptable here in Utah!

Government closest to the people is the most effective. I have been fortunate to serve at that local level. And, for the past several years, I've had the privilege of serving in state government. Over the years, I have worked with hundreds of hard-working public employees and elected officials who carry out their duties with honesty and integrity. Very seldom have I encountered situations where the ethics of those who hold the public trust has been called into question. Still, breaches do occur and questions do arise. Often, better clarity would have provided better guidance.

To set that standard for the Executive Branch, today I signed an Executive Order that reaffirms and clarifies guidelines about accepting gifts, participating in lobbying efforts and identifying conflicts of interest. Now is as good a time as any to remind all state employees what constitutes acceptable and unacceptable conduct.

I encourage you, as lawmakers, to remove any perception of possible ethical issues by implementing meaningful and substantive ethics reform. I know that work is already underway on these bills, and I look forward to signing them into law this session.

There is also good news tonight for drivers: congestion will soon be reduced on your daily commute. Construction will begin this year on the expansion of I–15 in Utah County and the Mountain View Corridor in southern Salt Lake County, and road and bridge improvements are taking place from Brigham City to St. George.

Our investment in a solid transportation network will help eliminate congestion on roads and highways, saving time and money for businesses and commuters. It will also improve opportunities for mass transit.

But with a growing population, we must do even more. Thousands of additional cars and trucks on our roads each year leads to higher levels of air pollution – especially here along the Wasatch Front and in beautiful Cache Valley.

Later this week, elected officials from across the state will join Salt Lake City Mayor Ralph Becker and me on these Capitol steps as we address our air quality issues. We're going to ask for your help. Because this isn't a partnership between government and the people – it's between friends and neighbors and co–workers and even strangers. It is a partnership with people who realize we all have a responsibility to reduce pollution and to increase the quality of the air we breathe.

While on the subject of protecting Utah's extraordinary environment and unsurpassed quality of life, let me be clear: I remain opposed to the importation of foreign nuclear waste into Utah. Certainly, the challenges of being a state with a federally permitted nuclear waste disposal facility are complex and ongoing. My responsibilities on these issues, on the other hand, are quite simple, and they will not be compromised. As Governor, I will use all available state resources within the law to protect the health, safety and welfare of all Utahns, now and for generations to come.

Now, I'd like to expand our focus beyond the legislative session. For certainly, when the budget is adopted, the session has ended and the bills have been signed – or vetoed – other important work will remain.

I cannot say enough about the importance of supporting public education. I am bringing together individuals and groups from across the education community to craft new and innovative solutions to significantly improve the education we provide our children.

Utah teachers work hard, but they face classes that continue to grow in size, complexity and diversity. They need new tools to continue to be successful. While the solution to some problems does, in fact, come down to dollars and cents, there are other solutions that rely on common sense – not just more funding.

I am optimistic the Governor's Educational Excellence Commission, which I will personally chair, will find, develop and implement these solutions. Our state deserves a blueprint for success in education, and I believe this group will get us there.

We owe it to our students, and to the future of our State, to provide an education that prepares our youth to compete in the global marketplace. This will not happen, however, without renewed and sustained emphasis in the areas of science, technology, engineering and math. Indeed, many of the jobs available today – and those our students will seek in the future – already require these skills.

I call upon students, caregivers, parents, educators and business leaders to join me in addressing the critical need to immerse our students in these fields of study. If we all pitch in with the spirit of commitment this state is known for, we can be leaders in providing the most prepared and productive workforce in the nation. This is not just an investment of dollars, but of time, energy and innovation from all of us.

Also tonight, I call on the Utah Board of Regents and the Commissioner of Higher Education, Bill Sederburg, to present me with a report, due this fall, that shows how our colleges and universities plan to meet the growing need for students with associate's and bachelor's degrees to address the workforce demands of Utah employers in the 21st century.

On this front, I'm proud to say tonight that we are taking steps in the right direction. The recently launched Utah Cluster Acceleration Partnership provides a way for critical industry groups to communicate their current and future workforce needs to our educational institutions. This partnership will be the mechanism for education to hear, anticipate and answer industry's needs.

The Utah Cluster Acceleration Partnership is a true collaboration – with leaders from industry, state government, higher education and our research community – all working together to significantly increase the economic impact of our most important industry clusters.

Let me offer just one example. Utah's aerospace and defense-related industries generate billions of dollars in revenue annually and employ tens of thousands of Utahns across the state in high-paying jobs. This is good – but we can do even better. Private and public leaders have teamed up with Weber State University to increase the size of the aerospace industry in Utah. By focusing on workforce needs in this area, we will develop the talent and innovation necessary to become the premier player in the aerospace industry. As this happens, Utah becomes more than a place companies would like to be, it becomes a place they need to be.

Long-term planning is critical to Utah's continued success. I've outlined initiatives for education and economic development, and would like to conclude with my plan for energy.

Tonight, I am announcing what I hope will be one of the most impactful economic initiatives ever undertaken in our state. It is one that we in Utah are uniquely positioned to accomplish – it is the Utah Energy Initiative.

I am assembling the best minds in the state and charging them with creating a 10-year strategic energy plan whose purpose is threefold: to ensure Utah's continued access to our own clean and low-cost energy resources; to be on the cutting edge of new energy technologies; and to foster economic opportunities and create more jobs.

We have a rich abundance of diverse natural resources – everything from traditional fuels such as oil, gas and coal to renewables such as solar, wind and hydroelectric. Two new wind projects north of Milford and in Spanish Fork Canyon are now producing electricity. Geothermal is rapidly coming online. Blending solar and biomass with traditional fuels at existing generation sites shows great potential. Simply put, few other states have the energy resources with which we, in Utah, have been blessed.

But it is the innovation and the entrepreneurial spirit of Utah that truly distinguishes us. We have some of the best research and technology minds in the world. We must further harness and empower them. We must also engage Utah's rural areas in this effort, as there is no one who has more know-how, or more at stake, than those communities in Utah whose lifeblood is – and has historically been – the energy industry.

Just three months ago, Utah State University announced a partnership between the State, the Department of Energy and the Uintah Basin communities to construct a 70,000 square foot Entrepreneurial and Energy Research Center. The project's funding included a \$15 million donation from Vernal resident Marc Bingham.

What a perfect illustration of how government at all levels can work together with universities, industry and the private sector to accomplish together what none could achieve individually.

We are uniquely positioned in the Western Energy Corridor, which stretches from Canada on the north to New Mexico on the south. We have the generation capacity and the transmission systems, and we are at the crossroads of the energy commerce and transportation infrastructure. Billions of dollars of future capital investment will be required to maintain and expand our infrastructure. Regulatory systems must be in sync with our long-term energy vision.

As a state, one of our true economic competitive advantages is our relatively low cost of power. Our energy plan must focus on maintaining affordability, encouraging capital investment and protecting our environment. I will do my part to provide leadership both here in the state and also at the national level, through such alliances as the Western and National governors associations.

Utah can - and must - be at the forefront of solving the world's energy challenges.

We've come a long way since pioneers were required to toil and sweat and sacrifice to build homes and farms and communities in what was then the Utah Territory. Since that time, our people have done much to make us a great and significant state. That work continues today. It continues in this Capitol building and in homes and schools and offices and factories across the state.

Our best days are indeed ahead of us. I am bullish on Utah, and I have high hopes for our economic future. This optimism is based on data, good data, facts which show Utah turning the corner in the very near future. If Utah were a stock, and I were your stockbroker, I'd say buy! As Governor, I promise that, working with you, Utah will continue along the path of fiscal responsibility for which we are known. Through selflessness and working together in unprecedented partnerships, and in unprecedented ways, we will find renewed hope and also ensure that Utah remains the greatest State in this nation.

Thank you. May God continue to bless the Great State of Utah.

(iii) (A) A local district may divest itself of a groundwater right subject to a determination that the groundwater right is not required to facilitate the groundwater management plan described in Subsection (1)(c).

(B) The groundwater right described in Subsection (1)(c)(iii)(A) is subject to Section 73-1-4 beginning on the date of divestiture.

(iv) Upon a determination by the state engineer that an area is no longer a critical management area, a water right held by the local district is subject to Section 73-1-4.

Good morning Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, honorable Senators/Legislators, members of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Commission, ladies and gentlemen. I am delighted to have this opportunity to speak on behalf of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Commission in honor of the January 19th birthday of Dr. King. You made this possible by authorizing a full holiday for the state of Utah. Thank you for your thoughtfulness. The weight of speaking before you today reminds me of the tension between our struggles and the richness of our heritage.

Any kind of positive change begins with a vision, seeing the unseen, imagining the not yet. Our forefathers came in search of a better life, drew up the finest document for human rights in 1781, and later in 1791 added the Bill of Rights which sets forth personal civil rights. Those ten amendments to the Constitution are pregnant with those rights all of us cherish and seek to realize daily.

Can you imagine a slave-holding president who envisions a land of freedom and opportunity for all? Can you imagine a president conflicted by a divided union yet insisting on an Emancipation Proclamation to start the freeing of our fellow human beings? Can you imagine a Supreme Court ruling in the 1896 Plessy v. Ferguson case that racial "separate–but–equal" would be the law of the land and some 58 years later in Brown v. Board of Education in 1954 reversing itself to rule that "separate–but–equal was inherently unequal."

From day one, we have been as a people in pursuit of equality and on a quest for full civil rights. Thomas Jefferson was followed by Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass who were followed by Lyndon Johnson and Martin Luther King, Jr. Both President Franklin D. Roosevelt and Harry S. Truman were sufficiently concerned about "the highest standards of democracy with equality of treatment and opportunity for all" that they issued executives orders to move forward. Each sought to model for us the behavior that changed our world for the good of all. We have been moving steadily forward toward "equal protection under the law." Dr. King sums our journey up in his "Letter from Birmingham Jail" in these words, "I have no fear about the outcome of our struggle . . . we will reach the goal of freedom . . . because the goal of America is freedom."

So from December 1955 until his tragic assassination on April 4, 1968, Dr. King led a massive non-violent army in the pursuit of "beloved community." On August 28, 1963, he argued, "I have a dream that my four little children will one day live in a nation when they will not be judged by the color of their skin but by the content of their character." Although he refused to sign the civil rights act of 1990, President George Bush agreed that "Discrimination, whether on the basis of race, national origin, sex, religion, or disability, is worse than wrong. It is a fundamental evil that tears at the fabric of our society . . . "

Here we are in 2010 still on our quest for full civil rights, moving to redeem the promise of America, seeking to experience the fulness of justice, equality, dignity, acceptance, and respect. We seek to harness the strength of our diversity and live up to our brand of opportunity and freedom. Nobody I know seeks special privilege, just equal opportunity. Our goal is to learn what we need, work where we are qualified, live where we can afford, receive adequate health care, and be treated justly. We invite you to join us in our pursuit of our fullest potential.

We have used declarations of independence emancipation proclamations, executive orders, legislative acts, supreme court decisions.

Still the quest goes on. It seems to me what we need most is less mean-spiritedness, more good will, adjustment of attitudes, voices for the voiceless, and everybody coming alongside. (ii) complies with the requirements of Subsection 17B-1-205(1) and Section 17B-1-208;

(c) a resolution proposing the creation of a local district, adopted by the legislative body of each county whose unincorporated area includes and each municipality whose boundaries include any of the proposed local district; or

(d) a resolution proposing the creation of a local district, adopted by the board of trustees of an existing local district whose boundaries completely encompass the proposed local district, if:

(i) the proposed local district is being created to provide one or more components of the same service that the initiating local district is authorized to provide; and (ii) the initiating local district is not providing to the area of the proposed local district any of the components that the proposed local district is being created to provide.

(2) (a) Each resolution under Subsection (1)(c) or (d) shall:

(i) describe the area proposed to be included in the proposed local district;

(ii) be accompanied by a map that shows the boundaries of the proposed local district;

(iii) describe the service proposed to be provided by the proposed local district;

(iv) if the resolution proposes the creation of a specialized local district, specify the type of specialized local district proposed to be created;

(v) explain the anticipated method of paying the costs of providing the proposed service;

(vi) state the estimated average financial impact on a household within the proposed local district;

(vii) state the number of members that the board of trustees of the proposed local district will have, consistent with the requirements of Subsection 17B-1-302(2);

(viii) for a proposed basic local district:

(A) state whether the members of the board of trustees will be elected or appointed or whether some members will be elected and some appointed, as provided in Section 17B-1-1402;

(B) if one or more members will be elected, state the basis upon which each elected member will be elected; and

(C) if applicable, explain how the election or appointment of board members will transition from one method to another based on stated milestones or events, as provided in Section 17B-1-1402;

(ix) for a proposed improvement district whose remaining area members or county members, as those terms are defined in Section 17B-2a-404, are to be elected, state that those members will be elected; and

(x) for a proposed service area that is entirely within the unincorporated area of a single county, state whether the initial board of trustees will be:

(A) the county legislative body;

(B) appointed as provided in Section 17B-1-304; or

(C) elected as provided in Section 17B–1–306.

(b) Each county or municipal legislative body adopting a
