Rep. Hughes called the meeting to order at 2:10 p.m. Committee members were introduced.

H.B. 81 School Employee Criminal Background Check (Rep. S. Allen)

MOTION: Rep. Newbold moved to amend the bill as follows:

- 1. Page 1, Line 18:
 - applicant or employee to pay for the costs of a criminal background check; {-and-}
 - <u>• allows the State Board of Education to require an educator to submit to a</u> criminal background check where reasonable cause exists; and

The motion to amend passed unanimously.

Rep. Allen explained the bill which modifies provisions regarding criminal background checks for employees of, or volunteers at, school districts, charter schools, and private schools.

Geoffrey Leonard, Utah Classified Employees Association, expressed concern with the cost of background checks to employees.

MOTION: Rep. Last moved to pass the bill out with a favorable recommendation. The motion passed unanimously with Rep. Newbold and Rep. Wimmer absent for the vote.

H.B. 42 School District Employees - Career Status Requirements (Rep. R. Menlove)

MOTION: Rep. Ipson moved to adopt 1st Substitute H.B. 42. The motion passed unanimously with Rep. Newbold and Rep. Wimmer absent for the vote.

Rep. Menlove said the bill gives flexibility to school districts when an educator is seeking career status.

Steve Peterson, Utah School Boards Association and Utah School Superintendents Association, spoke in support of the bill.

Susan Kuziak, Utah Education Association, spoke in opposition to the bill.

MOTION: Rep. Frank moved to pass the bill out with a favorable recommendation. The motion passed with Rep. Anderson, Rep. Black, Rep. Edwards, Rep. Moss, Rep. Poulson and Rep. Wheatley voting in opposition to the bill. Rep. Wimmer was absent for the vote.

MOTION: Rep. Moss moved to adjourn at 3:46 p.m. The motion passed unanimously with Rep. Wimmer absent for the vote.
