H.B. 19 Post Conviction Remedies Amendments (Rep. K. McIff)

Rep. McIff presented the bill to the committee with the assistance of Mr. Mark Shurtleff, Attorney General.

MOTION: Rep. Ray moved to pass the bill out favorably. The motion passed unanimously,

with Rep. Lockhart absent for the vote.

H.B. 22 Inmate Health Insurance Amendments (Rep. P. Ray)

MOTION: Rep. Ray moved to amend the bill as follows:

- 1. Page 1, Lines 12 through 14:
 - This bill modifies the Insurance Code by requiring an insurance company providing
 - health or dental policies to coordinate benefits for an insured individual housed in a
 - correctional facility <u>, county jail,</u> or who is in the custody of the Department of Corrections.
- 2. Page 1, Lines 17 through 20:

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- provides that, if an insured is otherwise eligible for health or dental benefits under a
- policy, an insurer may not exclude coverage for an insured who:
- is an inmate housed in a correctional facility; {-or-}
- is an offender in the custody of the Department of Corrections; or
 - is an inmate housed in a county jail.
- 3. Page 1, Lines 22 through 23:
 - an inmate housed in a correctional facility; {-or-}
 - an offender in the custody of the Department of Corrections; or
 - an inmate housed in a county jail.
- 4. *Page 3, Lines 86 through 89:*
 - 86 (6) If an insured is otherwise eligible for benefits under a health or dental policy, the
 - 87 <u>insurer may not exclude coverage if the insured is an:</u>
 - 88 (a) inmate housed in a correctional facility as defined in Section 64-13-1; {or}
 - 89 (b) offender in the custody of the Department of Corrections {-}
 - (c) inmate housed in a county jail.
- 5. Page 4, Lines 107 through 108:
 - (i) inmate housed in a correctional facility as defined in Section 64-13-1; {or}
 - (ii) offender in the custody of the Department of Corrections : or
 - (iii) inmate housed in a county jail.

H.B. 37 Criminal Background Checks on Motor Vehicle Dealers and Salespersons (*Rep. R. Lockhart*)

Rep. Willey moved to amend the bill as follows:

 - requires every applicant for a motor vehicle {-dealer or} salesperson license to submit
- 2. Page 1, Line 20:
 - 20 Division:
 - <u>requires certain persons that renewed a motor vehicle salesperson</u>
 license to submit fingerprints to the Motor Vehicle Enforcement Division;
- *3. Page 1, Lines 24 through 27:*
 - compare motor vehicle { dealer and } salesperson applicant fingerprints with certain

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- 25 criminal databases and inform the Motor Vehicle Enforcement Division of its
- 26 findings; and
- maintain a separate file of motor vehicle { dealer and } salesperson fingerprints and
- 4. *Page 2, Lines 30 through 32:*
 - 30 { provides that } requires the Motor Vehicle Enforcement Division { shall pay the costs incurred
 - 31 by the Bureau of Criminal Identification from fees paid by those submitting
 - 32 fingerprints \ to:
 - - remit the fees collected to the Bureau of Criminal Identification;
 - <u>requires the Motor Vehicle Enforcement Division to suspend the salesperson license of a salesperson who fails to submit the fingerprints as required;</u>

 - (b) A person required to renew a salesperson license on or before June 30, 2010 shall submit fingerprints to the division on or before November 30, 2010.
 - 54 {<u>(b) For purposes of Subsection (1)(a), an applicant for a dealer's license</u> includes every
 - 55 <u>owner, partner, officer, or director of the dealer.</u>}
- 8. *Page 3, Lines 74 through 76:*
 - 74 { (5) The division shall pay the costs incurred by the Bureau of Criminal

Identification

- 75 <u>under Subsections (3) and (4) from fees charged by the division to those submitting</u>
- 76 <u>fingerprints.</u>}
 - (5) In addition to any fees imposed under this chapter, the division shall:
 - (a) impose on individuals submitting fingerprints in accordance with this section the fees that the Bureau of Criminal Identification is authorized to collect for the services the Bureau of Criminal Identification provides under Subsections (3) and (4); and
 - (b) remit the fees collected under Subsection (5)(a) to the Bureau of Criminal Identification.
- 9. Page 3, Line 84:
 - 84 (2) (a) On December 1, 2010, the administrator shall suspend the license of a salesperson who fails to submit to the division fingerprints as required under Subsection 41-3-205.5(1)(b) on or before November 30, 2010.
 - (b) If the administrator finds that there is reasonable cause to deny, suspend, or
- 10. Page 3, Line 87:
 - 87 {-(b)} <u>(c)</u> Reasonable cause for denial, suspension, or revocation of a license includes, in
- 11. Page 4, Line 106:
 - 106 $\{ \frac{\text{(c)}}{\text{(b)(ix)}} \}$ Any action taken by the administrator under Subsection $\{ \frac{\text{(2)(b)(ix)}}{\text{(2)(c)(ix)}} \}$ shall remain in
- 12. Page 6, Lines 175 through 179:
 - 175 (14) check certain criminal records databases for information regarding motor vehicle
 - 176 { dealer and } salesperson applicants, maintain a separate file of fingerprints for motor vehicle
 - 177 { dealers and } salespersons, and inform the Motor Vehicle Enforcement Division when new
 - 178 <u>entries are made for certain criminal offenses for motor vehicle</u> { <u>dealers and</u> } <u>salespersons in</u>
 - accordance with the requirements of Section 41-3-205.5.
