  - 84 <u>owns or is licensed to use; or</u>
  - 85 (c) assumes the responsibilities and obligations of a person described in Subsection
  - 86 (6)(a) [[<del>or (b)</del>]] <u>.</u>
- 0. Page 4, Lines 110 through 112:
  - (1) On or after July 1, 2011, a manufacturer may not offer a consumer electronic device
  - for sale in the state unless the manufacturer, either individually , through a group manufacturer organization, or through the manufacturer's

- 0. Page 5, Lines 136 through 138:

  - industry trade group establishes and implements, in accordance with Subsection (2), a public
