This bill modifies the Public Safety Code regarding Peace Officer Standards and			
Training certification.			
Highlighted Provisions:			
This bill:			
 modifies the membership of the Peace Officer Standards and Training Council by 			
replacing one position to be filled by an officer from the Federal Bureau of			
Investigation with an additional at large position, appointed by the Governor; and			
 requires that an applicant for peace officer certification who requests a waiver of the 			
peace officer training course must provide proof of either of the following during			
the past four years:			
• the applicant completed the basic peace officer training program for which the			
applicant is seeking credit; or			
• the applicant was actively engaged in performing the duties of a peace officer.

2	Section 1. Section 53-6-106 is amended to read:		
3	53-6-106. Creation of Peace Officer Standards and Training Council Purpose		
4	Membership Quorum Meetings Compensation.		
5	(1) There is created the Peace Officer Standards and Training Council.		
5	(2) The council shall serve as an advisory board to the director of the division on		
7	matters relating to peace officer and dispatcher standards and training.		
8	(3) The council includes:		
9	(a) the attorney general or his designated representative;		
0	(b) the superintendent of the highway patrol;		
1	(c) the executive director of the Department of Corrections or his designated		
2	representative; and		
3	(d) 14 additional members appointed by the governor having qualifications,		
4	experience, or education in the field of law enforcement as follows:		
5	(i) one incumbent mayor;		
6	(ii) one incumbent county commissioner;		
7	(iii) three incumbent sheriffs, one of whom is a representative of the Utah Sheriffs

 - (4) (a) Except as required by Subsection (4)(b), the 14 members of the council shall be appointed by the governor for four-year terms.
 - (b) Notwithstanding the requirements of Subsection (4)(a), the governor shall, at the time of appointment or reappointment, adjust the length of terms to ensure that the terms of council members are staggered so that approximately half of the council is appointed every two years.
 - (c) A member may be reappointed for additional terms.
 - (d) When a vacancy occurs in the membership for any reason, the replacement shall be appointed for the unexpired term by the governor from the same category in which the vacancy occurs.
 - (5) A member of the council ceases to be a member:
 - (a) immediately upon the termination of his holding the office or employment that was the basis for his eligibility to membership on the council; or
 - (b) upon two unexcused absences in one year from regularly scheduled council meetings.
 - (6) The council shall select a chair and vice chair from among its members.
 - (7) Ten members of the advisory council constitute a quorum.
 - (8) (a) Meetings may be called by the chair, the commissioner, or the director and shall be called by the chair upon the written request of nine members.
 - (b) Meetings shall be held at the times and places determined by the director.
 - (9) The council shall meet at least two times per year.
 - (10) A member may not receive compensation or benefits for the member's service, but may receive per diem and travel expenses in accordance with:
 - (a) Section 63A-3-106;
- 83 (b) Section 63A-3-107; and
- 84 (c) rules made by the Division of Finance pursuant to Sections 63A-3-106 and 85 63A-3-107.
- 86 (11) Membership on the council does not disqualify any member from holding any 87 other public office or employment.

53-6-206. Waiver of training course requirement.
(1) The [director] division may waive the required basic peace officer training course
and certify an applicant who:
(a) provides proof that the applicant meets the requirements under Section 53-6-203
relating to qualifications for admission to the training course;
(b) provides proof that the applicant has completed a basic peace officer training
program that, [in the director's judgment] the division determines, is equivalent to the course
required for certification under this part;
(c) passes the certification examination; [and]
(d) passes a physical fitness test[-]; and
(e) provides proof that within the previous four years the applicant either:
(i) completed the basic peace officer training program for which the applicant is
seeking credit; or
(ii) was actively engaged in performing the duties of a peace officer.
(2) A waiver applicant may not exercise peace officer authority until all waiver process
requirements have been met and the applicant has been certified.
(3) If an applicant fails the examination under Subsection (1)(c), the [director] division
may not waive the required basic peace officer training course and the applicant shall comply
with all of the requirements in Subsection 53-6-205(1) to be certified as a peace officer in Utah
