Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:

Section 1. Section **78B-2-314** is enacted to read:

78B-2-314. Statute of limitations -- Permanent or continuing trespass -- Damages.

{(1) }In accordance with Section 78B-2-305, an action for damage created by trespass shall be brought within three years of the <u>last</u> trespass incident <u>which includes a permanent or continuing trespass</u> that caused the damage.

(2) An action to enjoin a permanent or continuing trespass for which the statute of limitations for damages has run may, nonetheless, be brought within seven years after the first instance of trespass.
