LONG TITLE
General Description:
This bill supplements or reduces appropriations previously provided for the use and operation
of state government for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2016 and ending June 30, 2017.
Highlighted Provisions:
This bill:
 provides budget increases and decreases for the use and support of certain state agencies;
 provides budget increases and decreases for the use and support of certain institutions of
higher education;
 provides budget increases and decreases for other purposes as described;
 authorizes capital outlay amounts for certain internal service funds;
 authorizes full time employment levels for certain internal service funds; and
provides intent language.
Money Appropriated in this Bill:
This bill appropriates \$540,382,500 in operating and capital budgets for fiscal year 2017,
including:
► \$65,102,300 from the General Fund;
► \$184,067,300 from the Education Fund;
► \$291,212,900 from various sources as detailed in this bill.
This bill appropriates \$1,182,700 in expendable funds and accounts for fiscal year 2017,
including:
► \$500,000 from the General Fund;
► \$682,700 from various sources as detailed in this bill.
