- provides that the deadline for filing an application to circulate a referendum petition challenging a state law occurs five days after{ the later of}:
- the last day of the legislative session at which the law passed;
- the day on which the governor signs the law; or

- the day on which the law becomes a law because the governor fails to veto or sign the law;
- extends the effective date, under certain circumstances, of a state law challenged by referendum; and
- makes technical changes.

Section 1. Section 20A-7-101 is amended to read:

20A-7-101. Definitions.

As used in this chapter:

- (1) "Action date" means, in relation to a state law that is the subject of a referendum petition:
 - (a) the day on which the governor signs the law; or
- (b) the day on which the law becomes a law because the governor fails to veto or sign the law, as provided in Utah Constitution Article VII, Section 8, Subsection (2).

[(1)] (2) "Budget officer" means:

- (a) for a county, the person designated as budget officer in Section 17-19a-203;
- (b) for a city, the person designated as budget officer in Subsection 10-6-106(5); or
- (c) for a town, the town council.
- [(2)] (3) "Certified" means that the county clerk has acknowledged a signature as being

the signature of a registered voter.

- [(3)](4) "Circulation" means the process of submitting an initiative or referendum petition to legal voters for their signature.
- [(4)] (5) "Final fiscal impact statement" means a financial statement prepared after voters approve an initiative that contains the information required by Subsection 20A-7-202.5(2) or 20A-7-502.5(2).
 - [(5)] (6) "Initial fiscal impact estimate" means:
- (a) a financial statement prepared under Section 20A-7-202.5 after the filing of an application for an initiative petition; or
- (b) a financial and legal statement prepared under Section 20A-7-502.5 or 20A-7-602.5 for an initiative or referendum petition.
- [(6)](7) "Initiative" means a new law proposed for adoption by the public as provided in this chapter.
- [(7)] (8) "Initiative packet" means a copy of the initiative petition, a copy of the proposed law, and the signature sheets, all of which have been bound together as a unit.
 - [(8)] (9) "Legal signatures" means the number of signatures of legal voters that:
 - (a) meet the numerical requirements of this chapter; and
 - (b) have been certified and verified as provided in this chapter.
 - [(9)](10) "Legal voter" means a person who:
 - (a) is registered to vote; or
- (b) becomes registered to vote before the county clerk certifies the signatures on an initiative or referendum petition.
- [(10)] (11) "Local attorney" means the county attorney, city attorney, or town attorney in whose jurisdiction a local initiative or referendum petition is circulated.
- [(11)] (12) "Local clerk" means the county clerk, city recorder, or town clerk in whose jurisdiction a local initiative or referendum petition is circulated.
- [(12)] (a) "Local law" includes an ordinance, resolution, master plan, and any comprehensive zoning regulation adopted by ordinance or resolution.
 - (b) "Local law" does not include an individual property zoning decision.
- [(13)] (14) "Local legislative body" means the legislative body of a county, city, or town.

- [(14)] (15) "Local obligation law" means a local law passed by the local legislative body regarding a bond that was approved by a majority of qualified voters in an election.

referendum.

- [(1) (a)] (2) A person seeking to have a law passed by the Legislature submitted to a vote of the people shall obtain:
- [(i)] (a) legal signatures equal to 10% of the cumulative total of all votes cast by voters of this state for all candidates for President of the United States at the last regular general election at which a President of the United States was elected; and
- [(ii)] (b) from each of at least 15 counties, legal signatures equal to 10% of the total of all votes cast in that county for all candidates for President of the United States at the last regular general election at which a President of the United States was elected.
- [(b)] (3) When the lieutenant governor declares a referendum petition sufficient under this part, the governor shall issue an executive order that:
- [(i)] (a) directs that the referendum be submitted to the voters at the next regular general election; or
- [(ii)] (b) calls a special election according to the requirements of Section 20A-1-203 and directs that the referendum be submitted to the voters at that special election.

- (b) a certification indicating that each of the sponsors:
- (i) is a voter; and
- (ii) has voted in a regular general election in Utah within the last three years;

- (d) [a] an enrolled copy of the law.

- (1) When each referendum packet is received from a county clerk, the lieutenant governor shall check off from the record the number of each referendum packet filed.
- (2) (a) After all of the referendum packets have been received by the lieutenant governor and the lieutenant governor has removed the signatures as required by Section 20A-7-306, the lieutenant governor shall:
- (i) count the number of the names certified by the county clerks that remain on each verified signature sheet; and
- (ii) declare the petition to be sufficient or insufficient no later than 60 days after the [end of the legislative session at which the law passed] {applicable trigger}action date.
- (b) Subject to Subsection 20A-7-301(2), if the law that is the subject of the referendum petition is due to take effect less than 60 days after the {applicable trigger}action date, the effective date of the law is extended to the day on which the lieutenant governor declares the petition to be sufficient or insufficient.

- [(e)] (d) If the total number of names counted under Subsection (2)(a)(i) does not equal or exceed the number of names required by Section 20A-7-301 or a requirement of this part is not met, the lieutenant governor shall mark upon the front of the petition the word "insufficient."
 - [(d)] (e) The lieutenant governor shall immediately notify any one of the sponsors of

the lieutenant governor's finding.

(3) (a) If the lieutenant governor refuses to accept and file any referendum petition, any

voter may apply to the supreme court for an extraordinary writ to compel the lieutenant

governor to do so within 10 days after the refusal.

(b) If the supreme court determines that the referendum petition is legally sufficient,

the lieutenant governor shall [file it,]:

(i) file the referendum petition, with a verified copy of the judgment attached to [it, as

of] the referendum petition; and

(ii) designate the filing date of the referendum petition as the date on which [it] the

referendum petition was originally offered for filing in the lieutenant governor's office.

(c) If the supreme court determines that any petition filed is not legally sufficient, the

supreme court may enjoin the lieutenant governor and all other officers from certifying or
